Prof. Ben Euwema will accept a position as deen of the School of Liberal Arts 'at Pennsylvania State college beginning fall term, Dean Lloyd C. Emmons of the school of Science and Arts ammoniced this week.

Professor Euwema has been issued and the school of Science and Arts ammoniced with Michigan State since 1937 when he came as an assistant professor in the English department. He was advanced to associate professor in 1939 and to full professor in 1942.

On July 1, 1944, he was appointed setting director of the division of language and literature in the School of Science and Arts and became director in September, 1945. He also served for a time as head of literature and fine arts in the basic college.

A native of Oak Park, Ill., Euwema was graduated from Calvin college in 1925, and received his master's degree from the University of Michigan in 1928.

He taught at Westminster college, New Wilmington, Pa., in 1928, and was professor and head of the English department from 1931 to 1936. He received the doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Chicago in 1934. Before coming to Michigan State he also was an associate professor at Kent State university, Ohio, for one year.


