## Riot Flares On Vessel In Palestine

British Tommies  
Fight Immigrants

HAIFA, PALESTINE, Nov. 26 (AP)—Bonfires blazed atop Mount Carmel tonight as Haifa Jews demonstrated their support of 3,700 immigrants who fought a frenzied but unsuccessful battle aboard their blockade runner this afternoon with club-wielding British tommyes.

Ten soldiers were injured and one was missing and believed dead in the hour-long melee, which broke out a half hour after the immigrant ship, the 2,000-ton Hamer Hayra (Lachita), entered Haifa harbor under the escort of two British destroyers.

Many Jews Injured  
Army sources confirmed the death of one 16-year old Romanian Jew, from injuries suffered when he jumped from the ship. Five injured Jews were rushed to a hospital, and seventeen others to a sick bay. Scores were puff-blown from fear gas.

The troops used tear gas and fire hoses to subdue the immigrants. Nearly 100 Jews leaped into the water during the height of the fighting, in a last desperate attempt to reach the Holy Land, or scrambled to the deck of a tug which was warping the ship up to a quay. All were recaptured.

Refugees Put on Transports  
After order was restored, troops began transferring their refugees to three British transports. One by one, the immigrants were taken from the Hamer Hayra and searched. They were then placed aboard transports, presumably for ultimate deportation to Cyprus Island.

The immediate departure of the British ships was stayed by a habeas corpus action, brought in Palestine supreme court by Jewish Palestine residents. The action requires the government to show cause why the refugees should be deported.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—Behind-the-scenes talks looking toward a possible end to the coal strike were widely rumored in the capital tonight as the government pressed for speed in John L. Lewis' consent of a coal pact, ending the strike.

The air was full of reports of private efforts to get negotiations rolling between Lewis and the government. No official confirmation was forthcoming and some of the personnel in the coal picture denied knowledge of such efforts.

Unofficial Talks Denied  
However, an Cleveland, Ohio, C. W. Bates, banker and industrialist, declined to comment on reports that he had expected to confer with Lewis. Bates, who had a reserved opinion on the strike, which indicated that Bates was interested in ending the coal strike, it would be a relief to him.

In a hard fought battle yesterday afternoon on Post field in Battle Creek before 3,500 spectators, Michigan State's Jayvee football squad defeated a highly rated Percy Jones squad to the tune of 25-0. The soldiers had a perfect record with eight wins up to this.

The second half was a different story. Starting with the third play on a reverse Westby took the ball from Sherrod on his own 20 and galloped 80 yards for a touchdown. NEW YORK, Nov. 26 (AP) — The synthetic Larry MacPhail-Branch Rickey feud went another round today when the red-hot Yankee president insisted he had withheld news of Bucky Harris' signing as a New York in anger for 12 days "as a personal favor to Leo Durocher."

## 'S' Out To Even Grid Slate Against Battered Cougars

Striving to finish the current season with an even five victories as against the five defeats already suffered this year, Michigan State will tangle with the Cougars of Washington State Saturday.

The Pacific coast team, coached by Phil Sorboe, a former Cougar and all-Pacific coast quarterback, will arrive in East Lansing by air, bringing a poor record but an explosive squad of gridlers.

Washington State has won but one game this season, a 32-0 rout of hapless Idaho, but the team has looked impressive in defeat, especially against Stanford at Palo Alto, November 16. The Indians vanquished the Cougars but only after a scoreless battle and by a single point, 21-20.

The other defeats were also close contests, except an annihilation by California, 41-13. The Cougars lost to Southern California by a single touchdown, 13-7, to Washington, 21-7, and were nosed out by Oregon State 13-12.

Coach Sorboe, however, will not play against Washington State, as he is recovering from a recurrence of a knee injury and will not play.

## VA Announces Dental Program For Ex-GI's Ailing Dentures

Things have changed a bit since the G.I. could walk into the Dental clinic, and get his teeth fixed, but veterans can still have their dental work done at the expense of the government.

To be eligible for the veterans administration dental program, a veteran must have been discharged within the past year, and have a service connected "tooth ache."

The procedure for veterans desiring to have their teeth repaired is generally as follows, Hurler stated.

1. Veterans must apply for

dental work, on a form obtained from the VA office in Demonstration hall or Lansing.

2. The local veterans administration office completes the form, and forwards it to the VA regional office. For this area, the regional office is in Detroit, and a reply is generally expected to be received within three weeks.

3. The regional VA office sends the veteran an authorization for a local dental examination from a dentist on approved VA lists.

4. The dentist sends a report to VA.

5. The dentist receives a letter of authorization from VA stating the amount of work approved. This is based on facts obtained from the veterans service record.

6. Upon receipt of the letter of authorization, the dentist may proceed with the work approved.
