Speech Contest On World Peace Due This Week

National oratorical contests will be held this year under direction of the National Peace Speech Association which was organized last spring. The purpose is to promote world peace by sponsoring oratorical and extempore speaking contests in the colleges throughout the nation.

Michigan is in the East Central region which also includes Indiana, Ohio, Wisconsin, Michigan, State and local contests which will be held about the middle of January for MSC contests and will decide the representative for the national tour.

The Michigan Junior Chamber of Commerce under the leadership of Professor Paul Bagwell, acting head of the department of speech, dramatics and radio, is providing \$1000 in prize money for the Michigan contests in oratory. Local Junior Chambers of Commerce are also helping to promote the contest in cities where colleges are located.

Students who are interested in writing peace orations should consult Professor Charles Hampton, department of written and spoken English, and those who desire to participate in the extempore speaking contest should consult Professor Menchhofer.

Separate contests will be held for men and women. Topics concerning any phase of world peace may be chosen by the students writing orations.

ETO General To Move GHQ To Capitol

BERLIN, Jan. 6 (AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay, new commander-in-chief of American forces in Europe, said today he would move his headquarters from Frankfurt to Berlin, but had no immediate plans for reorganizing the military government set up in Germany.

Clay and his staff would confer at length with the retiring command in Gen. Joseph T. McNamara, before making any changes. McNamara has been named senior representative to the military staff committee of the United Nations.

To Share Berlin

Clay said he intended to name a troop commander to relieve him of details in connection with that function of the European theater command, but only after talking first with McNamara.

Several hours before a Washington announcement of his appointment, Clay held a news conference in his capacity as deputy military governor.

The construction of Snyder-Phillips halls, which are to be almost the exact counterpart of Mason-Abbot men's dormitories, have at last reached that stage of completion where interior and exterior masons give way to plasterers and plasterers.

The new dormitories, which will house 1200 men, are the scene of increased activity. The workers strive to make at least one of them ready to receive bodies of eager men from Jenson gym and the quonset by the middle of this term.

Radiators in the new buildings are painted off-white, proof that heating system have been installed, and glass has been fitted into hundreds of dorm windows.

Although the halls and rooms are still littered with cement dust and shavings, trim oak woodwork is swiftly taking the place of rough-hewed dormitory and cement walls are being converted to smooth plaster and painted a rich cream.

In the large kitchens, which will serve the hungry denizens of both dorms, bright yellow tiles are being cemented on the walls, and the great stoves are being bolted into place.

Marshall Ends Chinese Duties At Truman Call

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (AP)—President Truman today summoned General George C. Marshall home from China to report on conditions in that war-torn country where American hopes for an early unification of the Nationalists and Communists forces suffered a major setback.

The White House announced the President's action, but when reporters inquired of Press Secretary Charles Ross whether Marshall would return to China, Ross said he could not amplify the official disclosure in any way.

Special Ambassador

Marshall, the army's wartime chief of staff and one of the architects of Allied victory over Germany and Japan, went to Nanking in December, 1945, as President Truman's special ambassador to try to promote unity of the two great factions dividing the country.

Officials here do not feel that he has failed in his efforts but say rather that in the American view it is the Chinese who have thus far failed to achieve the political organization of their country which the United States considers essential to peace in the far east.

Work Stalemated

Indications were that the President's action in directing Marshall to come home was based on the general estimate that at least for the time being he had done all he could toward the accomplishment of a uniform, political order throughout China.
