China Torn By Opposite Factions

Marshall's Report Offers Little Hope For Chinese

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall said outspokenly today that unhappy China is torn by two opposite factions, each determined to win by force.

The only solution for China, Marshall declared, is a capture of the government by the pro-Communist faction. He said both sides have to realize that he thus was calling indirectly on Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek to open the liberal door to power in the government.

General Recalled
Marshall's 2,000-word review of Chinese conditions, he found, in China as a special presidential envoy. It was issued through the State department today after the White House had announced last night that President Truman was calling the general home to report. He should arrive here by plane in a few days.

Few top officials believed he would return to China. There was already speculation as to whether he would return to private life or seek to re-enter public life. He had been in China since 1945, and had been in the United States since 1946.

Report Frank
The report, characterized by reports on China as an amazingly frank and candidly very sincere review. It set out the dilemma in which American policy now finds itself in dealing with internal Chinese politics.

Between the dominant reactionary group in the government, Marshall said, and the stream-lined Communist, who is more state and more open, but far more and well-organized, are to be found the long suffering and poverty-stricken masses of the people of China.

Lufkin Firm Files Counter-Claim In Portal Suit

Industry moved today to counter millions of dollars in portal-tax suits with claims against individual Michigan workers for time spent lunching, washing and "loafing."

Following a pattern outlined last week by the Lufkin Rule of Saginaw, a Detroit firm sought in federal court today to identify individual portal-tax claimants among its employees.

The Lufkin company, followed by the Palmer Bee Co. of Detroit, have asked in court that mass injunction claims against both of them be broken down into individual suits in which each worker sues in his own name.

Lufkin said its counter-claim will total at least as much as the \$818,000 in portal pay being sought by the CIO United Auto workers.

Taber Plans Large Tax Reduction

Congressman Says One Million Civil Employees Will Go

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—Rep. Taber (R-N.Y.), chairman of the House appropriations committee, threatened tonight to "use a sledgehammer" on President Truman's expected proposal for a \$37,000,000,000 budget. Taber called for lumping 1,000,000 employees off the federal payroll.

Signalling the first major clash between the Democratic administration and the Republican-controlled Congress, Taber told newsmen:

"If the President presents anything like a \$37,000,000,000 outlay for expenditures next year, we will use a sledgehammer as well as a meat axe to bring down that figure."

"My budget figure is \$29,140,000,000," Taber said, "and I haven't changed it."

Balanced Budget
"We are going to cut down government expenditures to a point where the budget can be balanced, a payment made on the national debt, and we will still have room to reduce taxes."

Government officials predicted Mr. Truman will submit to Congress on Friday a budget close to the \$37,000,000,000 mark. This would be for the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1947.

The officials also predicted Truman would take a stand against Republican plans to cut personal income taxes by 20 percent for a total of \$3,350,000,000 this year.

Taber said Republicans hope to cut the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1 by \$12,000,000,000 under the estimated \$41,000,000,000 expenditures in the current fiscal year.

"We now have nearly 2,300,000 civilian employees, we do not need over 500,000 at the most," he said. "We can surely cut 1,800,000 off this number without damaging the efficiency of the government."

Constitution Change Asked

LANSING, Jan. 7 (AP)—A proposal to ask the voters to order a revision of the state constitution at the spring election was filed in the Senate today.

Senator Haskell L. Nichols, Jackson Republican, who sponsored the resolution, asserted his interest in re-writing the state's 37-year-old basic law was heightened by the state's current financial difficulties, resulting from passage of the sales diversion and veterans' bonus amendments.

Two other measures, resulting from the same financial impasse, went into the house bill hopper.

Sponsored by Rep. Sherman A. Loupee, Dowagiac Republican, they would divert to the state treasury income from the intangibles tax and the 1945 ten-per cent liquor tax, both of which were designed to compensate local units of government for the legislature's failure to grant them a share of the sales tax.

Temporary Aid To Vets, Small Business Cut

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (AP)—The Office of Temporary Controls wiped out today most of the priority system which was set up to assist industrial reconversion after the war and to aid veterans or small businesses to become established.

The action lifts military priorities as the principal preference ratings supported by the Federal government in obtaining material and equipment. Home building priorities were abolished previously.

The civilian production division of OTC announced, however, that these features of the civilian priority system were being retained:

1. Priorities for items needed to fill military orders which can not be deferred without serious results to the health and welfare of military personnel.

2. Priorities for items necessary for essential utility services in an emergency to eliminate serious hazard to the life, health or safety of a large number of people.

3. Priorities for material or equipment required in connection with the veterans emergency housing program to maintain or increase production of a building material or product which has been determined to be in critically short supply.

CPA said that civilian priorities already issued would remain valid. No new ones will be issued, however, for production materials, maintenance, repair, and operating supplies. CPA capital equipment or construction materials or equipment for the purpose of starting or maintaining any individual plant or business, or to alleviate individual hardship, except as otherwise announced.
