## Basic College Fees Change

Professor John F. A. Taylor of literature and fine arts department has announced a change in the scheduling plans for next year. The course will be organized into three units: literature, music and visual arts. They will be taught in separate units. Incoming students will be automatically divided into three units and in the course of the year will spend a term studying each unit.

Under the present system each student term is organized into one-week periods which are not studying one of the phases. Finally this was intended to provide the student with a more complete understanding of the arts. However, it has confused students and broken into the program of the instructors. The three parts of the course are complementary, each to the other. Students entering the first will be assigned to registration to one of the three parts of the course. Board Reports Good Results On Exams

Comprehensive examinations are over, and judging from the figures available, they are not as hard as reported. Paul Dressel, head of the Board of Examiners, said that of the 4900 students who took these tests last term, approximately 90 per cent passed.

Special permission was given to an average of 400 students in each college, ranging from 12 in Literature and Fine Arts to 710 in Social Science.

## History Of Civilization Interprets 'Cut' Rule

The "due cognizance" clause which appears in rule two of the new cut system has raised a question in the minds of many students as to just what they can do and what they can't do. The Department of the History of Civilization has made a definite answer to these questions with their interpretation.

The first three unexcused absences will reduce the standing of the student by a half-letter grade. Each unexcused absence incurred thereafter will result in a further reduction at the rate of one half-letter grade for every two absences.

In Basic 163 this formula will be applied to the grade used for recommending or withholding students from the comprehensive examination.

In the case of late registrants, absences will be counted from the first day on which the class meets.

The instructor will regard as excusable only those absences incurred for urgent and necessary reasons of an emergency character. Absences connected with outside employment are not excusable.

## Stalin Sees No Reason For Strife

Assurances Given Elliott Roosevelt At Tete-a-Tete

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (AP)—

Elliott Roosevelt says Josef Stalin told him in a personal interview that "relations have improved between the Russian and American people and the danger of a new war is not real."

Reporting in the Express, a London newspaper, Elliott Roosevelt said that Stalin was quoted as saying, "In the Kremlin the son of the late president also quoted Stalin as of looking through 12 questions saying that the danger of atomic war is not real."

Rules Apply  
Russia should be subject to the same rule of respect and control as any other nation.

In answer to a question as to the present state of relations between the United States and Russia, Stalin was quoted as saying, "Between the American and Russian peoples, no deterioration has taken place, but on the contrary, relations have improved."

As to relations between the two governments, there have been no misunderstandings. Certain deterioration has taken place and then great pains were taken that their relations would even deteriorate still further. But I see nothing

## Former U of M Star Badger's Top Scorer With 17 Points

Wisconsin, Western conference, pace-setters, outlasted a hapless Michigan State team last night in Jenson Fieldhouse to wallop the Spartans, 58-48, before a crowd of 7,668 partisan fans.

Glen Selbo, Badger ace guard, broke fast from a unique tip-off formation to score a Wisconsin field goal before the game was five minutes old. Selbo, who played with Michigan last year, was the leading point maker of the game with eight field goals and a free toss for a 17-point total.

Wisconsin held its initial lead until Don Waldron, Spartan guard, looped one through to tie the game at 7-7 with five minutes played. But just seconds later Eugene Menz, Badger forward, shot for Selbo, and sent them to a lead they never relinquished.

Four on Boards  
First half play saw loose Spartans rebound play. Good strategy was employed by the Spartans in the form of a defense which pinned up the Wisconsin team down in its own back court, while the Spartans offense played a short, deliberate game with several pass exchanges before a shot was attempted.

First half play ended by Michigan State's ability to produce field goals due in part to the stellar defense work of Badger center Ed Mull. The Spartan style slowed the game sufficiently to hold the Spartans score to 20-17 with Don Waldron hitting a spectacular long shot just before the period ended.

The R-day Workshop will be broadcast every Thursday afternoon from 4 to 4:30 over WKAR. The productions are sponsored by the Alpha Epsilon Rho, the national honorary radio fraternity.

Four Work Better  
Spartans' floor work was generally inferior to that of the Badgers, with Otto White, veteran guard, coming in to break up several plays. Wisconsin defense threw up a net of rebounding arms that snatched Michigan State passes and shots, resulting in fast exchanges of the ball on many occasions. Michigan State fired off 18 of them to 24 from Wisconsin, but the Badgers' 24 tallied on 64 shots.

Five in the second half was factored by the Spartans playing better basketball. Behind 12 points at the half, Michigan State worked hard to overcome the Badgers but Don Cook, scoring wizard, found the range for four field goals in the second half.

Wisconsin held its widest margin of 16 points at three different stages of the second half, with Selbo leading the Badgers.

Navy Plane Crashes  
OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 20 (AP)—A four-engine navy transport plane, en route to the east coast from Moffett Field, Calif., crashed and burned in a fog-obscured landing today but all 21 passengers abroad were believed to have survived.

More than an hour after the crash complete details were yet unavailable. Navy officials, however, said all personnel aboard had been taken to naval hospital facilities.

New Committee Formed  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—A democratic cry of "gag rule" mingled with renewed Republican demands for budget and tax cutting today as an unprecedented congressional committee organized to review President Truman's \$37,500,000,000 budget and put its own ceiling on spending.

Senator O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.) emerged from the executive session shouting to newsmen "a gag rule has been adopted at the beginning of this Congress. The committee has voted to give carte blanche authority to a 20-man subcommittee, with members of the full committee denied an opportunity to voice their views. The subcommittee will not even tell the whole committee when it is meeting."

To which Rep. Keefe (R., Wis.), who was not named to the subcommittee, replied: "O'Mahoney is crazy as a bedbug if he says it's a gag rule."

# State Natators Score Two Road Triumphs: Top Purdue, Indiana

Smashing victories over Purdue and Indiana over the week-end raised the Spartan swimming team to a .667 percentage against Big Nine opposition. Michigan State's strong squad defeated Purdue 54-30 Friday night and made the Hoosier trip a complete success by winning the University of Indiana Saturday, 61-25.

The only Spartan defeat came a week ago against Michigan when the Wolverines won the first event to score a 45-30 win. The outstanding performance of the team was turned in by Keith Carter, Purdue breaststroke, whose time of 2:22.6 set a national college freshman record for the 150 yard event. The old mark of 2:25 was held by Al Craig, of Michigan.

**Dave Seibold Shattered**  
Dave Seibold, Spartan swimmer, set a new record of 2:28.3 set two weeks ago against Cincinnati.

Michigan State won six of nine events against the Boilermakers. Purdue swimmers took the 300 yard medley relay in the fast time of 1:58 and Major Willis took first place in the diving.

James Duke, Michigan State swimmer, was the only double winner as dual meet records were shattered in all events. Duke placed first in the 50 yard free style in a time of 24.1 and was clocked in 53.4 while winning the contest.

**Robert Hoogerhyde Win**  
Abe Gilbert and George Hoogerhyde broke existing records to give Michigan State a first in both 220 and 440 yard free style.

Gilbert's time of 2:14, lowered the record to 2:14.3 for the 220 yard event. Hoogerhyde was clocked in 4:52.3 in the 440 yard event, a comparatively slow time of 5:11.5, also set last year.

Michigan State captured the 440 yard relay in the last event of the meet. The Spartan team of Gilbert, Hoogerhyde, Willis and Duke won the relay in 3:39.6.

Michigan State's most concerted effort came with about four seconds gone when Bob Geahan and five points between Wisconsin tallies, to bring the Spartans eight points behind at 47-43.

**Meris Runs Wild**  
The automatic time out was called with four minutes remaining in the game the score stood at 44-43. In these last minutes Meris went wild to score five points for the Spartans but time ran out with the score standing 49-43.

Wisconsin racked up their 11th straight victory, beating the Spartans, 49-43, in a game that was a battle of attrition. The Spartans, who were leading 44-43 at the end of the third quarter, were outscored 5-0 in the fourth quarter. The Spartans' defense was unable to stop Wisconsin's offense, which scored on three touchdowns and a field goal.
