King Bares New Rulings For Veterans

Absences Reduce Length of Leaves, Require Reports

MSC students attending college under the GI bill must face deductions from their annual leave for all class absences, Tom King, counselor for men, announced yesterday.

The absence law is one of two rulings made by Veteran's administration recently. It also has announced a requirement that "report of progress" grades be filed when a veteran leaves school before completing his term's work.

In Retrospective

In enlarging on the absentee rule, King said that it is retrospective to last September. He added that a record of all veteran absences must be kept in order that the annual leave can be reduced on a formula basis.

The formula will be applied as follows:

The number of absences in a course will be multiplied by five and divided by the number of times the class meets. The result will be the number of days to be deducted from annual leave.

Would Limit Day

Thus, if a student missing six meetings of a course that meets 30 times a term will have one day deducted from his leave.

According to King, the Veteran's administration has decreed that there shall be no exceptions to this rule.

As for the second ruling, King stated, "Any GI who leaves school without completing a term's work must have a report of progress sent to the V.A. by the college before it can collect money for the student's tuition."

Would Mean Failure

He pointed out that in some cases this would require filing failing grades in a course that would ordinarily have been regarded as dropped.

Both new rulings have been "vigorously protested" by the college administrative group, King concluded.

Eleven Killed in Crash

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Jan. 27 (AP) — Eleven men were killed today when an army B-29 carrying restricted equipment crashed in flames as it tried to lift from Kirtland field on a routine mission.

Col. Perry M. Housington, commanding officer, said two men were taken from the flaming wreckage alive but one of them died shortly after reaching the base hospital.

Atom Policy Unchanged

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP) — Warren R. Austin, chief American delegate to the United Nations, said today following his first conference with secretary of state Marshall that the United States policy for international atomic control remained unchanged.

Austin told reporters that "I'm not quoting General Marshall — I'm just saying that's the situation."

Biddle Gets UN Post

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP) — Former Attorney General Francis Biddle will become the United States representative on the United Nations social and economic council, a government official told reporters today. Biddle would succeed John G. Winant, wartime ambassador to Great Britain.

LOGANSPORT, Ind., Jan. 28 (AP) — Pennsylvania railroad officials reported "a bad wreck" to night near Walton, Ind., between Logansport and Kokomo. All available ambulances and doctors in Logansport were ordered to the scene.

HERNIE SAYS-**SRS Will Find Out 'What's Cooking'**

THERE'S ALWAYS BEEN A LOT OF speculation on how MSC students feel about various campus issues, but little has ever been done to make an authoritative cross-section of campus opinion. That is, until now.

For several months the department of sociology and anthropology has been quietly organizing the Social Research Service, which will conduct unbiased polling among students and faculty on current events.

The State News is anxious to see this service become a permanent fixture and is working closely with the new research organization. We will print all results and occasionally help to formulate topics on which polls will be made.

SRS HAS STARTED work on the first of its series which will be a cross-section of campus opinion on the cutting issue. Other topics will touch upon pertinent problems which concern campus wide interests.

Dick Charles, professor of the social work department, has two expositions and will handle the handling of the operations of SRS. The pair, Dick Schuler and Dick Gibson, have had between them nearly 20 years of experience in this sort of work.

After earning his doctor's degree at Michigan University, Schuler combined the teaching of social psychology and research work at Michigan State University. There he worked mostly on radio audience opinion studies.

For a portion of the way he was with the Office of War Information's census branch, or civilian morale, and later, for the Department of Agriculture on the research of living standards.

GIBSON, WHO HOLDS a doctorate from Cornell, was a head officer for three years and worked exclusively on public opinion and morale studies.

It's easy to see why SRS' opinions on SRS will prove to be a definite plus. These men know just as well as anyone else the methods and problems of conducting surveys.

Student Faculty Drafts New Student Party Rules

The twelve members of the Student Faculty social committee which has the authority to govern all affairs at which mixed groups are in attendance has revised and simplified the social rules of Michigan State.

The committee has the authority to administer the rules, approve facilities used for parties, pass on infractions and recommend attendant penalties, deal with petitions for parties and supervise the registration of social functions.

The following rules are applicable only to functions in which mixed groups are in attendance.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

A party must be registered.
