Great numbers lived dangerously, in resistance movements, in suffering, in exile, as refugees, in languishing in prison, or in war camps, or in forced labor, or in concentration camps.

In China they studied under great handicaps and hardships in evacuated universities. Of students in 28 war-stricken countries in Europe and Asia who have survived, fully 40,000 are dead.

King Bares New Rulings For Veterans

Absences Reduce
Length of Leaves.
Require Reports

MSC students attending college under the GI bill must face deductions from their annual leave for all class absences, Tom King, counselor for men, announced yesterday.

The absence law is one of two rulings made by Veterans' administration recently. It also has announced a requirement that "re. part of progress" grades be filed when a veteran leaves school before completing his term's work.

In Retroactive

In enlarging on the absence rule, King said that it is retroactive to last September. He added that a record of all veteran absences must be kept in order that the annual leave can be reduced on a formula basis.

The formula will be applied as follows:

The number of absences in a course will be multiplied by five and divided by the number of times the class meets. The result will be the number of days to be deducted from annual leave.

Would Lose Day

Thus, a student missing six meetings of a course that meets 30 times a term will have one day deducted from his leave.

According to King, the Veterans' administration has decreed that there shall be no exceptions to this rule.

As for the second ruling, King stated, "Any GI who leaves school without completing a term's work must have a report of progress sent to the V.A. by the college before it can collect money for the student's tuition."

Would Mean Failure

He pointed out that in some cases this would require failing grades in a course that would ordinarily have been regarded as dropped.

Both new rulings have been "vigorously protested" by the college administrative group, King concluded.

Wildcat Coach Sends Reserves
Into Game After First Half

LEXINGTON, Ky., Jan. 27 (AP)—Kentucky turned loose one of its sharpest exhibitions of basketball razzle-dazzle of the season here tonight to another Michigan State under an 86-36 score.

Wildcat Coach Adolph Rupp started pouring his reserves into the game early in the first half, but the steamroller last none of its momentum until the official time out with four minutes to go. At that point Kentucky's lead was 82-18.

Roberts Scores First

After scoring the first basket on a well-placed overhead shot by Robin Roberts, the Spartans got tangled up in the Wildcats' fast break and didn't register another field goal until shortly before halftime. Kentucky's lead was 50-11 at intermission.

Second and third line reserves kept pouring it on for the Cats as the second half opened. They scored 16 points while Michigan State went scoreless during one streak.

Fourteen Score

Fourteen players contributed to the Wildcats' score, with just two men on the squad failing to tally. Bob Brannum was high with 14 points but several other players were closely bunched behind him.

It was Kentucky's 19th victory in 20 starts and served as a warm-up for Saturday night's nationally important Kentucky-Notre Dame game at Louisville.

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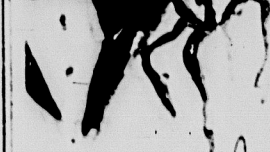
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
