

## National Leaders Will Introduce NSO To MSC Thursday

Council Sponsors Official Debut;  
Smith, Hanlon Lead Discussion

The National Students Organization will make its formal debut on the Michigan State campus in Music auditorium Thursday night.

Jim Smith, University of Texas, president of the group's National Continuation Committee and Tom Hanlon, University of Chicago, coordinator, will conduct an informal discussion, centering on organization, aims, and progress of the nationwide student organization.

Lead National Movement

Both have been leaders in the nationwide movement to give voice to student problems. Sponsored by the Student Council, the meeting will commence at 7:30 p.m. in Music auditorium.

Joe Pernack, Highland Park sophomore, will preside.

Smith, as president of his school's Student Council, was instrumental in the movement to keep NSO centered exclusively on problems as they relate to students at the conference.

Settled Negro Question

In Texas, he led the fight to admit Negro students into the law school. At the Chicago conference, he proposed a compromise which kept Negro students out of the law school but allowed them to attend law school in the summer.

At this summer's meeting of the NSO, Smith will preside.

Hanlon, largely a behind-the-scenes organizer of the Chicago conference, has been in contact with almost all of the various factions of the NSO movement since its inception. At the present time, he is working for the resolution of political issues at the University of Chicago.

Eight hundred delegates representing every college and university in the United States will be in attendance.

Council Makes Arrangements

A date has not yet been chosen. Several musicians are working among them the University of Wisconsin and Wayne University. See NSO, Page 1.

Pay Issue To Go To Highest Court  
Say Legal Men

DETROIT, Feb. 10 (AP)—Legal men today said that the preliminary decision that the Supreme Court will hear the case of nearly 40,000 Detroiters who lost their jobs during the Detroit strike is a landmark case.

Edward Lamm of Toledo, counsel for the strikers, said that the case is a landmark case.

Legal observers predicted that the case would go to the Supreme Court.

Business, labor and government spokesmen meantime expressed sharply divergent views regarding the action of federal judge Frank A. Picard at Detroit who Saturday dismissed the strikers' appeal that they be compensated for time spent at the plant before their actual work day had begun.

## NLRB Decides Against Strike Pledge Violators

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The National Labor Relations Board ruled today that workers who strike in violation of a no-strike pledge in their union contracts can be fired without the protection of the Wagner act.

The Wagner act, which created the NLRB, guarantees the workers' right to picket and bargain collectively with their employers.

The case was brought before the board, however, by the CIO-United Automobile, Airtail and Agricultural Implement workers. The CIO union had requested the board to investigate the representation of Dyson employees.

Not A New View

The NLRB in a unanimous decision, handed down while Congress is considering proposals to change the act, did not take a new position. It reiterated a view which was expressed in a case a year ago, and which had previously been set aside by the Supreme Court.

The timing of today's ruling was considered significant, however, in view of criticism that the Wagner act is too weak against management.

Not Entitled

The board ruled that 14 employees of Dyson, a manufacturer of machine tools, were not entitled to reinstatement.

Committee Asks Action On Eisler

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—The House committee on Un-American Activities today called for quick prosecution of Communist Gerhart Eisler and for a "Moscow-directed fifth column."

In a letter to Attorney General Clark, Committee Chairman J. B. Connally (R-N.J.) described Eisler as an agent of the communist international and "a mysterious person of supreme authority in the affairs of the Communist party of the United States."

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## UN Committee Exceeds Limits With Greece

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Feb. 10 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council ruled today that the U. N. Balkan investigating commission had exceeded its authority in asking the Greek government to postpone the execution of 11 condemned political prisoners.

By a vote of 9 to 0, with Russia and Poland abstaining, the council approved a United States proposal stating that the commission should make such requests only in the event there is reason to believe that examination of condemned persons would assist the commission in its work.

Request Made

The commission had made its request in Athens on the ground that postponement of the executions would facilitate its work by creating a favorable atmosphere in pacifying demonstrators and petitioners claiming before its quarters in the Greek capital.

Today's ruling was made at the request of the commission, which asked for clarification of its position after the Greek government had protested against what it called interference in the internal affairs of the country.

Cash Deals

The final vote came after a sharp clash between U. S. delegate to Herschel A. Johnson and Soviet delegate Andre A. Gromyko.

Wake Of Storm Blocks Roadways, Claims 12 Lives

A blizzard-capped cold wave reigned in Michigan Monday leaving in its wake blacked and slippery highways which contributed to a traffic toll of at least nine deaths.

In addition, two firms blamed on over-heated stoves claimed three lives.

Meanwhile, natural gas jets to 60 Detroit plants were to be reopened Tuesday morning. The plants had been gasless since Friday in an unprecedented move by the Michigan Consolidated Gas company to insure an adequate supply for home heating.

The action kept 100,000 Detroit area workers idle Monday. Almost all were called back to work following the announcement from Consolidated president, Henry Fink.

The State Highway department and the Automobile Club of Michigan reported all state trunk line highways opened for necessary travel.

Court Decisions Listed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—Dividing sharply on what constitutes government support of religion, the Supreme Court held today that public tax money may be used for public transportation to Catholic parishes as well as public schools.

Senate to Investigate Wayne

LANSING, Feb. 10 (AP)—A resolution calling for a committee to investigate communist activities at Wayne University was introduced in the state Senate tonight.

Rumors of communist activities at the university have come to our attention, Senator Nathan F. Callahan, Detroit Republican and author of the resolution said.

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### Former Axis Nation Stripped Of Colonies, Yugoslav Frontier

PARIS, Feb. 10 (AP)—The allies signed peace treaties today with Italy and four other German satellites in a history-making ceremony, but the ink was scarcely dry before violence flared in Rome and in Pola, Italian naval base ceded to Yugoslavia.

The Italian accord, which strips that country of her colonies and a large portion of Venezia Giulia at the head of the Adriatic, was signed at a morning session in the brilliantly lighted red and gold Salon de l'Horloge, room of the French foreign office.

Twenty Nations Participate

Treaties for Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Finland—all paying the price for helping Adolf Hitler to wage Europe's war—were signed in that order during the afternoon session. The United States was a party to all except the Finnish pact. Twenty allied nations participated.

A British broadcaster was shot and killed at Pola by an Italian woman and angry Italian students assaulted the Yugoslav legation at Rome in protest against the Italian pact. Italy reserved a 10-minute interval of mourning over the terms of the treaty.

Italy, Yugoslavia Protest

Representatives of Italy and Yugoslavia, which had threatened not to sign the Italian treaty, reluctantly affixed their signatures, although both nations had protested against the new Italian-Yugoslav frontier, which creates an international zone around the port of Trieste.

Yugoslav foreign minister Stane Simic signed without comment, but carried a note to the Yugoslav foreign ministry asserting that his government was roundly disappointed that Yugoslavia territorial proposals have not been taken into consideration.

Assembly Must Approve

Foreign minister Carlo Sforza said in Rome that the pact would become effective only if it was approved by the Italian constitutional assembly, and that he would make public the text of the pact during a radio speech to the Italian people tomorrow.

The treaties also must be ratified by the legislative bodies of the United States, Russia, Britain and France before they become effective. Still to be drafted are pacts for Germany, Japan, Austria and Korea.

The treaties with Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania and Finland were signed with little ado, and without comment.

Italy Loses Territory

Under terms of the pacts, none of the five former satellites may maintain more than a skeleton army or navy, and all lost territory except Bulgaria.

Italy, besides being forced to give up parts of Venezia Giulia to Yugoslavia, also yielded the Dodecanese Islands to Greece, and most areas of her western frontier to France. She also lost Eritrea, Somalia and Libya, in Africa, and was forced to recognize the independence of Ethiopia and Albania, which Mussolini had added to the Italian empire.

A total of \$1,330,000,000 was assessed against the satellites, of which Russia will receive \$800,000,000. None of the other major powers claimed reparations.

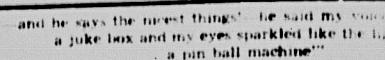



# Dianetti, Johnson Gain Laurels In Silver Anniversary Relays

Jack Dianetti and Fred Johnson, ace Spartan thin-shanks, did their share of parking among a record field of nearly 500 of the nation's great track stars entered in the silver anniversary Michigan State Relays last Saturday night in Jenison fieldhouse.

A record crowd of 5,400 saw Dianetti, running the one mile anchor leg of the distance medley relay, blast past Michigan's Don Queller in a few strides from the break after being forced twice to break his stride.

On the final curve the Wolverine anchor man slipped on the high and swerved in front of Dianetti, who was coming up on the outside to pass. Queller recovered quickly and drove into the home stretch in the lead. Dianetti came up fast and shot through a narrow gap between Queller and a tipped Notre Dame runner to win by inches as the biggest cheer of the event went up from the spectators.

# Churchill Withholds Demands On Labor Government In Crisis

Opposition Postpones Vote Of Censure As Coal Shortage Cripples Nation

LONDON, Feb. 10 (AP) — Winston Churchill withheld tonight "for another day" his awaited demand for a vote of censure of the labor government for the nation's industrial crisis which has closed down more than 50 per cent of the kingdom's industry and made more than 4,000,000 workers idle.

Churchill, leader of the opposition conservative party, opened debate in the house of commons after prime minister Clement Attlee broadcast an island-wide radio appeal to the British public to cooperate in the dangerous coal shortage which has limited electric power production and brought the closing of thousands of industrial plants throughout 38 of the 63 counties and shires in England and Wales.

## Conservatives Vow Cooperation

The conservative party vowed cooperation with the labor government to ease the critical condition which sent thousands of Britons to the dole lines today for the first time since the depression. But Churchill ended all talk of a coalition government by abruptly declaring "no coalition" during the parliamentary session.

"Things are going to get worse," Churchill prophesied dourly in the house while Attlee was on the air. "I don't mean this particular emergency is going to lay us low, but the country is going to suffer increasingly and it will learn by suffering."

## Winter and War Blamed

In explaining the crippling coal shortage to the people, Attlee said the unusually severe British winter had been to blame in part, but that the war had aided in depleting coal stock piles and that there are not miners in the duggings. He said also that the resumption of peace-time industry had taken its toll of fuel supplies. The coal mines were nationalized by Attlee's labor party cabinet last Jan. 1.

Attlee, speaking in a strained, tired voice, told the British people "we have come through greater emergencies and much more critical times. We will come through this if we pull together, each doing everything possible to help."

# Three Jews Condemned In Palestine

British Military Court Gives Decision; Fear New Reign of Terror

JERUSALEM, Feb. 10 (AP) — A British military court sentenced three suspected members of Irgun Zvai Leumi to the gallows today shortly after official Palestine today formally rejected a British request to cooperate with the police and military in combating terrorism.

A tense Palestine recalled that Irgun Zvai Leumi, underground group committed to active resistance against the British, had threatened reprisals "as soon as a military court condemns one of our soldiers."

## British Give Ultimatum

The agency's reply to the communication of last Monday from the British giving official Jewish seven days to decide whether they would cooperate against terrorism expressed the concern that the British were following a policy which would precipitate a "consequence that may well be incalculable."

The agency said it was confident that undisclosed steps it was taking would lead to "progressive improvement in the security situation." David Ramez, Chairman of Vaad Leumi, the Jewish national council, said that "this grave situation" had "so affected a small group in the Jewish community as to bring about complete alteration of mind, which is bringing them to use terrorism as a political weapon."

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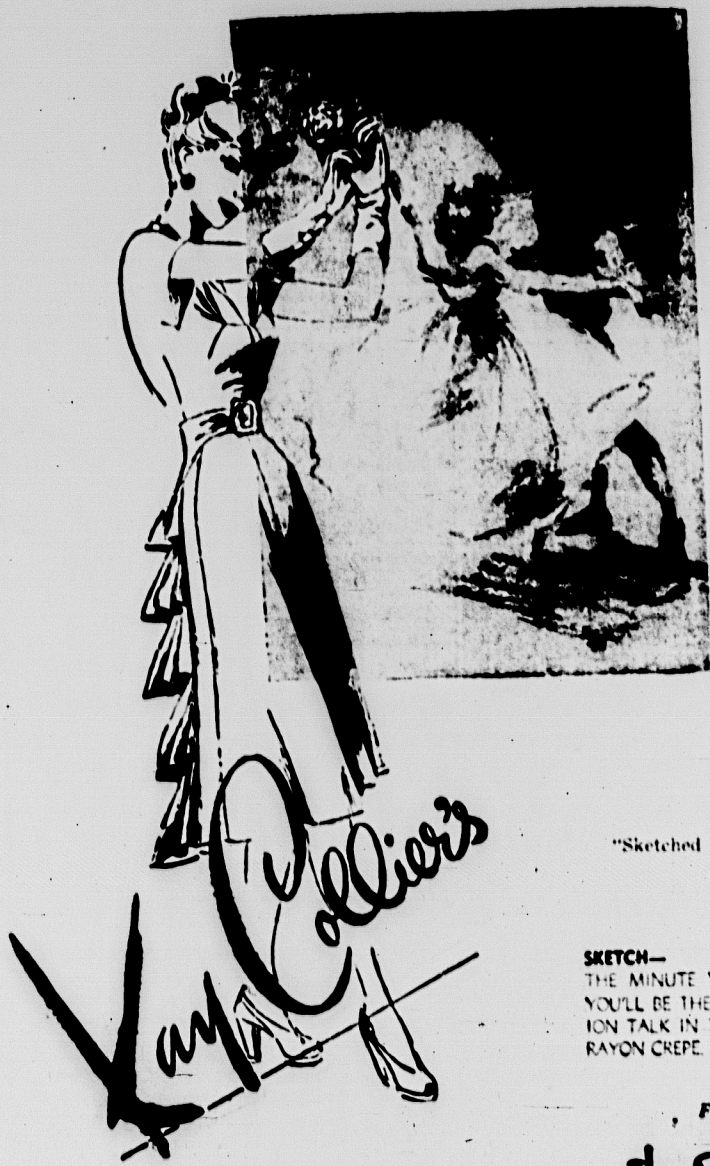
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
