Hoogerhyde Tops Mark In Prelims

Opens CCC Meet With Fast Time For 1500 Meters

Lanky George Hoogerhyde, Spartan middle distance star, opened the fifth annual CCC meet yesterday with a brilliant victory in the grueling 1500 meter event.

Hoogerhyde's time of 20:10.4 was almost 16 seconds faster than the winning time for last year's national championship. The churning freshman finished nearly three lengths ahead of Doug Trites of Wayne, who placed second.

Michigan State collected eight points in the first event when Hoogerhyde finished fourth behind

Wayne totaled seven points on the strength of the second and third places of Trites and Pytkus. Wayne, who placed fourth for Central in the 1946 NCAA meet, was 17th yesterday behind State's Miller.

Because there were ten entrants, Coach Charles McCaffrey split the race into two heats. The first heat matched four men: Alex Seve, Bowling Green, Mike Koster, Penn. Urban Schmidt, Cincinnati, and Joe Peter of Ill. Tech. Koster won the first heat in 21:47, but his time was not as fast as the fifth place clocking of his teammate in the second heat so he lost points in the event when he lost to the five men of the second heat.

Spartans Favored To Cop Track Title

Although handicapped by injuries of stars Horace Smith and Fred Johnson, Michigan State's indoor track and field squad goes into the 20th annual Central Collegiate conference meet

in Jensen fieldhouse today favored to annex its first indoor CCC title since 1934.

Johnson, injured, has pulled out of the meet and will not

appear in the dash and low hurdles though he will probably be in the broad jump. Smith injured a muscle in his thigh and will not again compete this season.

Both men had figured to take important place points in the hurdle events where Harrison Dillard of Baldwin-Wallace, holder of all six national hurdle crowns, figures to grab a double victory.

Dillard Record Breaker

Dillard leads the list of those who may shatter CCC records, six of which may fall. The 75 yard high hurdle mark of 9.1 seconds and the low bar standard of 6.3 seconds, both held by Charles (Whitey) Hlad of Michigan Normal, are the targets the H-W timber topper will be aiming for.

Johnson is practically a sure bet to topple the broad jump standard of 22 feet, 5 1/2 inches set by Fred Alderman of Michigan State in 1927. Johnson has done over 24 feet consistently this season, with his top distance being 24 feet 6 1/2 inches.

Michigan State, Notre Dame and Drake are the teams rated most likely to produce new records in the mile run and one mile relay.

Challenge for Mile Record

The mile mark of 4:15.8 will be assaulted by a choice field led by defending champion Bill Leonard of Notre Dame, Drake's Bill Mack, who finished second to the great Gil Dodds in the NAAT championships two weeks ago and 18 year old Spartan distance ace Jack Dierker.

Bob Swann of State threatens to crack the 32.2 seconds for the 300 yard run set by Drake's Dick Young last year. Swann has been clocked under 31 seconds several

times this season in practice workouts.

Bob Schepers, top ranking State dashman is counted on for first or second in the sprint. Shot putter Johnnie Mueller has shown steady improvement and capped his season's work last Saturday when he

topped two of the best weight men in the Midwest while winning his event in the Notre Dame dual meet.

State's pole vault trio Bob Vonburg, Bob Carr and Fred Bowers have been between 12 ft. 6

in, and 13 feet all season and figure to pull down several tallies in the event.

More points for State may come in the high jump where Jim Milne and Ray Beckord, both six feet-plus leapers will wear the Green and White.

The Spartans have a couple of strings in their bow for the hurdles too. Ace high stick man Hal Mayhew and low bar specialist Bob Fraser will be riding the jumps with Dillard.

Mayhew is one of the most highly rated high hurdlers in the Midwest. Fraser took his first dual meet win last Saturday when he edged out John Smith at Notre Dame.

Chief opposition to the MSU title quest is expected to come from Notre Dame, the defending team champions. The Irish though short of top-flight men showed a wealth of place material last week as the Spartans were forced to take the mile relay to win the meet.

Top Distance Men

In addition to CCC mile king Leonard and hurdler Smith the Irish have several high ranking middle distance men. State's victory over Notre Dame was the only dual meet loss of the season for the Irish who had beaten Wisconsin and Iowa of the Big 9 and whipped Michigan Normal and Marquette in a triangular meet.

Drake, the "dark horse" of the meet, will bring a 32 man team here including Mack and Jim DeMatias who placed in the 300 yard run at the Michigan State Relays last month. The Drake mile relay team has been under 3:25 in two meets.

Fred Feder of Drake is entered

in the two mile run and is expected to provide some tough competition. Feiler won the NCAA cross country championship in 1945 and last fall when the meet was held here, took third behind Quentin Brelstaff of Ohio Wesleyan and Penn State's Curt Stone.

Boxers Train For Last Tilt

In preparation for meeting for top-ranking undefeated Wisconsin, Michigan State's boxing team continued its week of stiff workouts last night in Coach Lou Zarza's absence.

Wisconsin comes to East Lansing Friday to meet the Spartan boxing men at 8 p.m. in the last regularly scheduled match in Jensen fieldhouse.

The Spartans are to box what Notre Dame is to football and Oklahoma A & M is to wrestling. They will play host to the national collegiate athletic association bouts March 28 and 29. Nine State boxers are entered in those matches.

A week's layoff from competition and several days of hard practice have put State's ring team in the best condition of the season.

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'W', Purdue To Complete 'Jinx' Game

CHICAGO, March 5 (AP)—The Western Conference's title-deciding 20 minutes of basketball will be played tonight in suburban Evanston by Wisconsin and Purdue. They will play the second half of their unfinished Feb. 24 game. On the result hinges the Big Nine championship.

The game is without precedent in conference history. Started Feb. 24 in Purdue's fieldhouse at Lafayette, Ind., it was stopped at the half, with Purdue leading 34 to 33, when the bleachers collapsed, bringing death to three and injury to 250.

Wisconsin, if victorious, would be undisputed champion. If Purdue wins, the Badgers will drop into a triple tie for the title with

Illinois and Indiana, who finished the season with eight victories and four defeats apiece. Wisconsin has won eight and lost three.

The sale of 2,500 has been reported to students of Wisconsin and Purdue. The game starts at 8 p.m. CST.

The game can be doubly important for Wisconsin if Bob Cook, Badger forward, makes at least five points, which would give him the Conference individual scoring championship. He now trails Minnesota's Jim McIntyre in four points, 183 to 179. Cook scored 12 points in the first half of the contest.

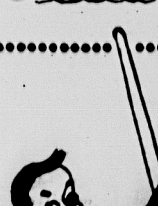

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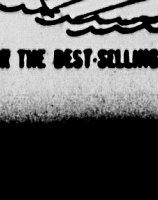
