Senate Okays
Lilienthal As
Energy Chief

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP) — David E. Lilienthal was confirmed by the Senate, 50 to 31, today as chairman of the Atomic Energy commission which has vast, unprecedented authority over atomic power for peace or war.

The balding former head of the Tennessee Valley Authority thus emerged victorious from a bitter, 14-week fight in which he was praised as a believer in true democracy and blasted as a "soft man" toward Communism.

The commission will:

1. Own in the name of the United States all this country's atomic production plants and fissionable materials.
2. Control virtually all U. S. research and development in atomic energy, medical, industrial and scientific, including atomic weapons.
3. Have the power to force any American to stand trial for his life if he discloses atomic energy information the commission thinks should be kept secret.

Britain, U. S. Propose
Commission To Plan
German-Polish Line

MOSCOW, April 9 (AP) — Britain and the United States proposed tonight that an international commission be created to work out details of a compromise German-Polish border which would allow Poland to retain control of industrial Silesia but return to Germany some agricultural lands now occupied by the Poles.

The proposal, made in the four-power council of foreign ministers, was immediately blocked by V. M. Molotov of Russia. He argued that Poland should retain all of the 40,000 square miles of eastern German territory, including Silesia and the farm lands, which were placed under her administration at Potsdam.

Southwestern Bell Negotiations Tie Up Full Settlement

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP) — Hopes for a quick end to the cross-country telephone strike suffered a jolt tonight as the labor department announced the collapse of negotiations here between the Southwestern Bell Telephone company and striking telephone workers.

Optimists persisted meanwhile over the possibility of an early agreement in the dispute between telephone companies and their long distance workers, which is a major key to the overall situation.

Wallace Sees War Threat With Russians

LONDON, April 9 (AP) — Henry A. Wallace declared today that "World War III is inevitable" unless the United States and Russia reach an understanding, and said Europeans were watching the two countries "getting ready for a death struggle."

Wallace criticized bitterly President Truman's proposed aid to Greece and Turkey. He expressed fear that a policy of loaning money "for the political purpose of stopping Russian expansion" would establish "during the next three months a pattern which if pursued might lead to war."

The former United States vice president told a news conference of more than 200 correspondents. "We are not going to get anywhere by being anti-Russian or anti-Communist. The only thing we shall get out of that will be eventual war and the loss of our own way of life in the process. That would be the world's greatest tragedy."

Republicans Protest Shifts In Policy On Communism

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP) — A group of Republicans burst out in protest today that the United States is trying to go two ways at once on foreign policy, seeking to stem communism in Greece and Turkey and acting in a way to encourage it elsewhere.

Other Republicans meanwhile, continued to urge speed on both the Greek-Turkish question and on relief legislation designed to help Europe and China.

Both House and Senate were involved in the debate which covered the \$400,000,000 program for Greece and Turkey, the \$500,000,000 relief program for former occupied areas of Europe and the lend-lease settlements, under UNRRA supplies and bank outlays.

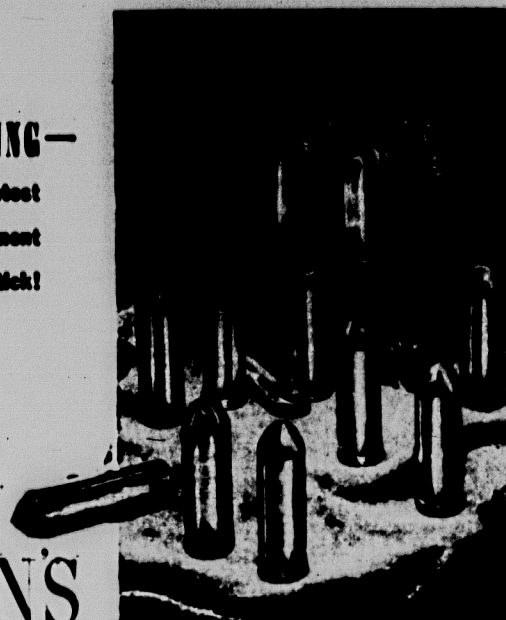

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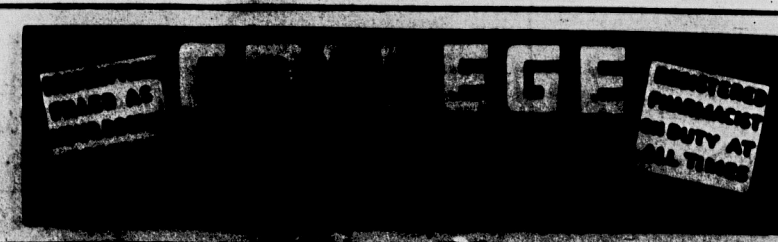

Additional bonus forms will be available early next week according to the State Adjutant General. At the same time, servicemen were cautioned to fill out applications accurately.

A booth will be set up in the Union lower lounge to issue the forms. A larger number of Navy and Marine Corps blanks are anticipated and it is expected that all vets of those branches will be taken care of.

A recent amendment by the Adjutant General allows certificates in lieu of lost discharge papers issued by county clerks to be used in filing applications.

Such certificates may be obtained from the county clerk's office where the discharges were recorded. They should be presented when applications are notarized and marked by the notary "Certified For Michigan Veterans' Military Pay."

Student veterans who can show they have developed certain chronic diseases within one year after discharge from service may be entitled to service-connected disabilities, according to the VA Columbus branch office.

This applies to diseases such as arthritis, encephalitis, epilepsy and others which veterans did not have prior to induction but which occurred within a year after discharge.

Service must have been for more than 90 days. Benefits may include compensation, out patient treatment and priority in hospitalization.

Registered nurses are being sought by the U. S. Navy to fill existing vacancies. Applicants must be between 22 and 29 years old, graduates of a school of nursing and must meet physical requirements.

Nurses now in Navy I reserve may return to active duty with the rank with which they were released for a twelve month tour of duty.
