Coach Jake Dahlgren's netmen settled the match early, with victories in five of the six singles positions, and continued their strong play to take two of three doubles matches.

Al Reynolds, playing first singles for State, disposed of Marshall Chambers, the Bearcat ace, in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3. Reynolds was seldom in trouble and his aggressive play kept the usually brilliant Chambers on the defensive.

Norwegian Stagn Cenna

Red-headed Roger Cenna, at No. 2, was the only State player to drop a singles match, going down before Thorngren Hannes, 2-6, 3-6.

Hannes, comes from Oslo, Norway, where he was runner-up for the Norwegian national crown in 1939. Hannes wasn't played in his home country from 1941 to 43 and the Bearcat is in his first season of American tennis.

Bob Chiles, State's Hawaiian-born No. 3 man, easily triumphed over April 6-2, 6-2, and in the fourth set Jack Shingleton finished strong to win over Chuck Thomas, 6-4, 6-5.

Malaga Still Undeclared

Bob Malaga, continued undefeated, this season, with a quick 6-2, 6-1, score over Al Bond. Mackey Elliott, playing as Dahlgren's sixth singles man, assured a Spartan victory by edging out Tom Stuller, 6-7, 7-5.

With the match already decided singles points, Cincinnati's two doubles teams of Arnold and Hannes stepped Reynolds and Cenna after a terrific first set, 11-9, 6-3. The strong play of Hannes carried the match for Cincinnati.

Shingleton and Chuck teamed at second doubles to beat Chambers and Bums, 7-5, 6-2. In the last match of the afternoon, Malaga and Elliott swept past Gordon Wright and Aaron Weinstein for the Spartans' seventh and final point.
