DETROIT, April 17 (AP)—The legislature today greets new emotions Governor G. Mennen Williams' financial message which furnished a need for up to \$100,000 in new taxes—reduced the state budget to \$10,000,000, also exceeding the larger sum by construction allocated and on which was spent in many cases.
