Don't Blame The Cops

No amount of enforcement by college police will completely wipe out campus accidents. Instead, cooperation and rational thinking on the part of drivers and pedestrians alike is needed.

Excuses could be made for accidents such as the serious one which occurred recently. The campus of Michigan State could be compared to a small town suddenly awakening amidst a gold rush. Confusion, hustle and bustle, inadequate facilities, insufficient services to meet the surging influx of those seeking the valued nuggets of knowledge. But all of this is pure rationalization when the lives and safety of thousands are at stake.

There is no excuse for traffic accidents on the confines of the campus, but there is a cure: cooperation with the laws and traffic rulings of the East Lansing police department who use tactics of law administration based on science and experience.

Students at the University of Michigan are envious of the right of State students to possess automobiles. But that valuable right may become a faint memory if accidents and traffic violations continue to occur on the campus. College officials will be forced, for the sake of security and safety, to make and rigidly enforce laws prohibiting the use of automobiles on the campus.

Severe? Bureaucratic? Even despotism, perhaps, but only of a necessity. Carelessness and apathy where human lives and safety are concerned are just as criminal as deliberate murder or arson, and more dangerous to society.

Roberts has appeared in six games this season, pitched 24 innings allowing 16 hits and nine earned runs. He has struck out 23 opposing batters and compiled an earned run average of 3.75 in his first season. He pitched 50 innings in his first year, and his record stands at two wins and no losses.
Notre Dame has a good ball club this year. They feel it's the best in their history, which is no novelty for nearly every school in the country has a team this season surpassing anything in the past.

THIS afternoon on Old College field, Michigan State will be seeking more than a baseball victory over Notre Dame.

The Spartans will endeavor to prove the popular phrase "Luck of the Irish" is a whimsical one which really doesn't exist every time a Notre Dame team takes the field.

As dusk fell across the spike-scarred diamond by the banks of the Red Cedar on the evening of May 11, 1946 you probably couldn't have sold this contrary idea to a Spartan rooter for five cents if you'd thrown in part ownership of the ball park.

It was on this day nearly a year ago Michigan State led Notre Dame 4-1 for seven innings, saw the Irish tie the score in the eighth and go on to win 5-4 in 10 innings only after fate had stepped into the fray chanting that same hymn, "Luck of the Irish."

In the home half of the first the South Bend outfit thought the roof had fallen in.

Pete Fornari, a catcher by trade, playing left field for St. because of his hitting ability, singled. Pete's presence in the outfield became more significant in the later stages of the game.

Max Klein, captain of this year's team, was the second man to bat. He drove the first pitch into the right field screen, leaving Fornari home ahead of him.

Our health is protected by a fine hospital and the staff is working diligently to provide adequate care for those that come to the hospital. But what of the emergency cases that are unable to walk to the hospital? These are the cases that need immediate attention and a delay of a minute might mean the difference of life or death.

Three cases in the last two weeks bear this fact out. A student in Mason hall who had cut the side of his head and neck, waited forty minutes in a pool of blood for an ambulance. George Hay waited twenty minutes after being struck and possibly run over by a truck before an ambulance arrived, and one of the workers on the class-room building, after falling from the third story, waited for an ambulance from Lansing.

A few minutes is a short time, but when a student's life is in the balance, I feel that the administration might take a few minutes and consider procuring

some sort of an ambulance facility for the students.

I also feel that the MSC police force should spend more time putting tickets on the fast moving cars and construction trucks rather than the parked cars. The cars that are parked aren't the ones that swerve around the corner by Ag hall and make the students jump for their very lives.
