

## Cooperation Asked From All Industry In Price Reduction

### Chamber Of Commerce Backs Truman's Anti-Inflation Plan

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—In quick response to a direct appeal from President Truman, the United States Chamber of Commerce today urged industry to cut prices "wherever business costs permit."

"More goods for more people at lower prices is the American formula for prosperity," said the chamber's 35th annual convention declared in a policy statement.

While saying business recognizes its responsibility to avoid the "runaway price" and has an interest in "a sound structure of fair prices than any other," the resolution added:

"The day's sessions opened with a call on the business community in a message to help the inflationary cloud now hanging over us" by lowering prices and swelling production to achieve "an ever-expanding system of private enterprise."

This, he added, is a "pressing task of all businessmen today." Taking "today" literally, the chamber delegates made the price resolution their first policy decision in the four-day meeting.

**Ford Speaks**  
The 29-year-old president of the Ford Motor company, Henry Ford II, told a dinner session tonight that industry must display "daring initiative" to lead the country on a sound economic path.

There are "no other qualified candidates," he said, adding: "We have seen people turn to government for answers and the world is littered with their tragic failures."

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The Veterans Administration said today it will be unable to send out monthly checks due tomorrow to more than 2,780,000 veterans receiving unemployment or educational allowances. It said the funds Congress appropriated for that purpose are exhausted.

## House Cuts Red Sphere Relief Bill

### Relief Program Ends Unless Reds Agree To U.S. Supervision

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The House voted today to trim a \$350,000,000 foreign relief program to \$200,000,000 and to deny aid to Russian dominated countries unless they agree to rigid U.S. supervision.

Both actions were tentative — on teller counts of 156 to 138 and 135 to 110 — and are subject to roll call votes later.

Likewise tentatively, the House voted 136 to 72 to specify the countries entitled to the aid — Italy, Greece, Hungary, Austria, Poland, and China.

Rep. Lawrence Smith who offered this amendment, told a questioning member that it is aimed at preventing any of the relief going to Russia.

The list of countries in Smith's amendment is the same as that proposed for aid by the State department.

The House action came as the Senate Foreign Relations committee unanimously endorsed the \$350,000,000 program of aid to hungry Europeans and Chinese. The committee ordered a "made in America" tag on the relief supplies.

Rep. Jonkman presented the fund-cutting amendment in the House, saying that the program submitted by the State department might lead to "permanent relief."

## Police Say 20 Dead, 115 Injured; Wind Levels All Buildings

### School Teacher's Quick Action Saves Ten Pupils From Death; Six Nearby Villages Send Aid

WORTH, Mo., April 29 (AP)—A tornado virtually leveled this northeast Missouri town today, killing at least 13 persons and injuring half the remaining population of 233 persons. The state highway patrol estimated 20 were killed.

The business district was reduced to rubble. Only a few residences were left standing after the violent storm lashed this small community at 3:30 p.m. (CDT) this afternoon.

Quick action by an alert school teacher, Mrs. Anna Trump, who headed her 10 pupils into a fruit cellar, saved them from possible death or serious injury. The school house was leveled.

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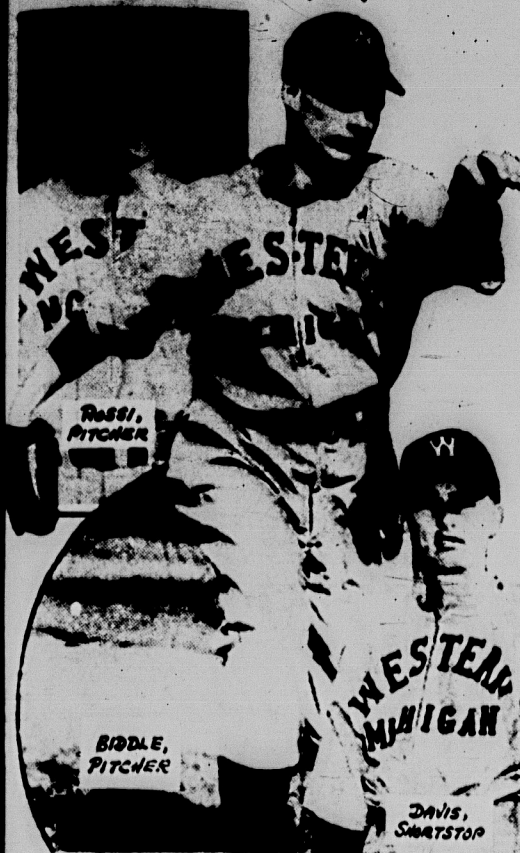
