### Bob McCurry Elected 1947 Grid Captain

Robert B. "Bob" McCurry, sophomore and newest center on the Michigan State college football team last fall was elected captain of the team last night at a dinner in the Union given by the coaching staff honoring spring football associates.

Jim Blenkiron, freshman fullback from Saginaw, received the watch from the coach, while coach "Big" Munn emblematic of being "most improved player" in spring drills is Munn and his son.

McCurry, who moved to 180 pounds of defensive demolition through the entire 1946 campaign, was elected a 47 captaincy by a vote of 10 to 1.

In making the presentation of the watch to Blenkiron, Munn praised the young fullback for displaying "a combination of all the qualities in a football player which make him a man who is an all-around asset to the team and himself as a player."

Munn told the more than 100 players and members of the press that the award to the "most improved player" would become an annual presentation at the conclusion of spring practice each year.

Following the presentation the head coach praised the entire squad for the spirit, stamina and cooperation they have displayed throughout the six-week practice session.

Munn concluded his remarks with the hope that every candidate would keep himself in the best physical and mental condition during the summer months prior to the squad's return to full work late in August.

## Pick Roberts To Hurl Against Wayne Nine

### Ace Pitcher Expected To Handcuff Power-Packed Tarter Sluggers

Coach John Kols' baseball team will seek its 14th triumph in 19 starts today at 3 p.m. when they meet Wayne University on Old College field in the first of two contests scheduled for this season.

After splitting a two-game series with Wisconsin earlier in the week, the Spartans will be gunning for a Tarter scalp with Kols planning to start his ace hurler, Robin Roberts. Although State will be favored to ride to victory, the Tarters are not a team to be taken lightly with their season's record of five wins and one loss.

Wayne's coach, Joe Truskowski, had hoped to counter with his top moundsmen, Roy Stevens. However, Stevens twirled the Tarters to a 7-1 victory over University of Detroit Thursday so Joe Hooven will probably take the hill against the Spartans.

#### New Faces In Lineup

There will be two Spartans making their initial starting appearance on Old College field. Ted Erickson and Ed Sobczak will be starting at first base and center field respectively according to assistant coach Al Kirchner.

With Sobczak in center, hard-hitting Paul Pepple will be switched to left field in place of Steve Serafini. Erickson will be hitting in the cleanup spot, a position he earned with his seven hits in 10 tries against the Badgers.

A lot of hitting power is expected from the Tarters judging by the scores they have run up in their first six contests. Wayne has compiled a total of 68 runs, which gives it an average of slightly over 11 runs per game.

#### Four over 400 Mark

A fact not to be overlooked however is the competition the Tarters have been facing. They have won from such teams as Toledo and Western Reserve. The single Tarter loss was to the Western Reserve girls.

A comparison of the two teams' performances against D. G. gives the Spartans an edge over Wayne. Michigan State walloped the Detroiters 9-0, collecting 12 safeties to the Titans' four and the Tarters took a 7-decision, outslitting Detroit eight to seven.

Four men on the Wayne squad are hitting over the .300 mark, two of them over .400. Jim Neibauer leads with .450 followed by BASEBALL, Page 3

## Senate OK's 2-Cent Hike On Gas Tax

### To Split Increase Of 25 Million Three Ways

LANSING, May 16 (AP) — Legislation to increase the state gasoline tax two cents per gallon, passed by the senate, led a mile-long parade of bills through the legislature today as it raced to meet its first deadline.

The deadline was ordered when the Senate agreed to a House resolution ordering adjournment June 6. It automatically means the death of all bills left in their house of origin to day.

A determined bloc of 22 senators rammed the gas tax increase bill through the senate, fighting off attempts to send it back to committee and to amend it to give the state highway department a greater share of the increase.

The boost, estimated at \$25,000,000, will be shared 37½ per cent by the counties, 37½ per cent by the cities and villages and 25 per cent by the state.

The bill went over to an uncertain fate in the house of representatives, which earlier this week killed its own two-cent gas tax increase bill with a different distribution formula.

This morning at 10 a concert of chamber music will be presented in the Music auditorium. Faculty and student singers and musicians will render "Trio in E flat Quartet in B minor" and "Four Serious Songs."

Tonight another performance will be held at 2 in the Music auditorium and then at 4 in 500-vocal mixed chorus and orchestra will combine to offer "Alte Rhyme" and "Requiem" in College auditorium.

The latter will be given in memory of the Michigan State college war dead. Alexander Ziegler will conduct.

College and conservatory head of the Midwestern Musicological Society are on campus for the festival and the semi-annual meeting will consist of dancing to a Sigma Nu three piece combo and the awarding of prizes for the craziest costumes.

The orchestra on last night's concert exhibited a remarkable understanding of the immensity of the famous Brahms works. They opened the program with the "Tragic Overture," followed with "Variations on a Theme by Haydn," which were well done.

They closed with the difficult "Symphony No. 4 in E Minor," which brought repeated applause from the small but appreciative audience.



# Marquette Expected To Give Spartan Track Squad Little Trouble Today

**State Heavily Favored To Cop 4th Win; Predicts Close '100'**

Across the lake in Milwaukee, Michigan State college's track squad will meet Marquette university this afternoon with the Spartans favored to annex their fourth victory of the outdoor season.

Marquette fans will have their first look at Jack "Rockie" Dianetti, 148 pound Spartan miler ace. Dianetti, last Saturday turned in a 4:12 mile as he ran second at Penn State. No other Midwest college mile has recorded a time this fast in several years.

Also in action wearing the prospectus of punchers who can only be counted on for next year's campaign, Zarza made a point to dodge the issue on his boxing strength come fight time.

"We intend to line up the best schedule any college team ever tried to work out," Zarza said, "but there is nothing definite on our part yet, however."

Dick VanTine is expected to get the nod over Dene Fisher in the number two position. Both men scored a point and a half against the Wolverines Wednesday, but Dick had a 78 and Fisher a 79. VanTine's season average is lower than Fisher's.

Roberts hurried the Spartans to their victory over Wayne last season in what proved to be a very close ball game in spite of the shutout score. State gathered but six runs while the Tarts collected five. In addition, Wayne performed four double plays to kill off scoring opportunities. One factor in the game, and it proved to be a large one, was the pair of errors committed by the Tarts.

Dick Buehler of the Titans amassed a total of 11½ points agains State, but his midweek play of 89 was second high for the day. Johnny Paetz came through with an 81 to lead the Titans in the triangular match.

Coach Dabigren also plans to play Mickey Elliot at sixth singles, replacing Tom Martin. Al Reynolds, Roger Cessna, Jack Shingleton, and Bob Chuck will complete the singles bracket.

Doubles combinations will remain unchanged, with Reynolds and Cessna the No. 1 team, followed by Chuck and Shingleton, and Malaga and Elliot.

Chuck and Shingleton have been the strongest doubles duo this year, and provided the winning point against the Tartars Monday. The two other teams have been erratic, with almost balancing won-lost records.

After only one match with Wayne, in the last two weeks, Dabigren's men have lost some of their sharp competitive edge.
