Sigler, Officials Talk  
Over Governmental  
Relations For Class

Four prominent officials, including Gov. Kim Sigler, expressed disagreement over the right of the federal government to assume the functions of the individual states, at the first meeting of the political science workshop Monday.

Governor Sigler, who arrived late because of adverse flying conditions at Mackinac, expressed the fear that in the stretching of federal responsibilities "lies one of the first steps on the road to dictatorial government."

Take Care Of Own  
"I personally feel that each state ought to be permitted to handle its own domestic affairs," he continued. That is my concept of what type of government will give us the best type of government."

Joseph Kallenback, professor of political science at the University of Michigan, said that the question did not involve the assumption of additional powers by the federal government. He viewed the field of federal-state relationships as one in which the national, state, and local governments work with increasing cooperation.

Cooperative Federal Type  
Kallenback stated further that our system is becoming a cooperative federal type, wherein the central government promotes national minimum standard and practices and the state and local units emphasize administrative problems.

He said that, in order to realize further cooperation, constitutional and state governments must be eliminated.

Taking the negative Judge Lederer, of the United States district court for Eastern Michigan, asserted that "Cooperation necessarily leads to dictation from the central government."

Lederer Opposed  
He also opposed Kallenback's arguments by saying "I'm afraid that the barriers in the way of cooperation are being moved too rapidly. The federal government keeps getting stronger and state weaker."

As a result, the people are turning their attention more and more to Washington when they're looking for something.

Declaring that it is the duty of the federal government to step in when state and local governments are insufficient, George Zinky, state director of the Federal Housing Administration cited FHA and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation as examples.

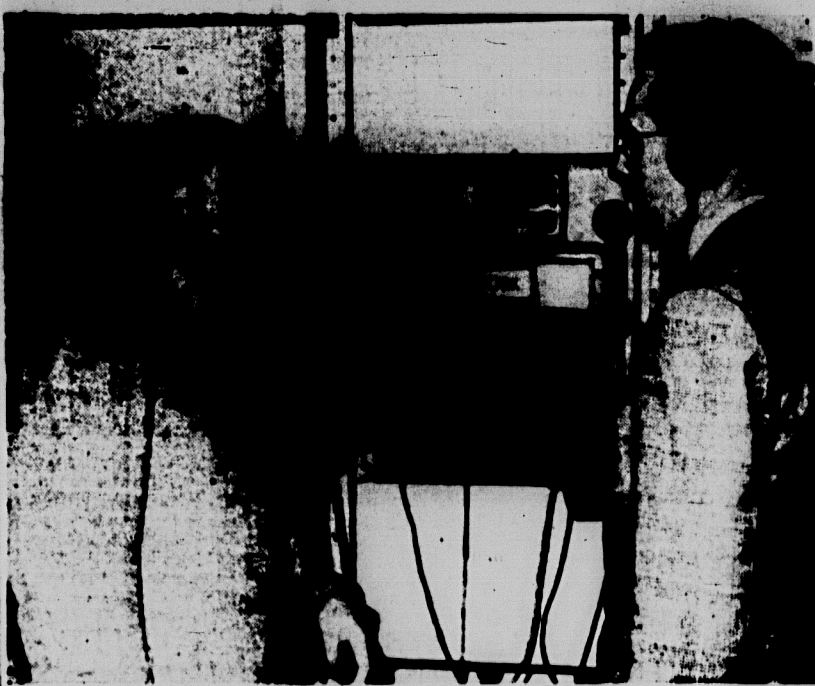

First hand knowledge of the "work a day world" is the aim of the 23 Michigan high school superintendents and principals, under the leadership of Carl M. Horn, chief of vocational guidance, state board of control for vocational education at MSC, who are touring the industries and businesses of the midwestern and eastern section of the country by airplane.

The guidance program of the secondary school is planned so as to bring first hand knowledge of actual work experience by the counsel to the student.

The progress in the field of vocational guidance is evident throughout industry. Guidance personnel are fitting men into positions as shown by special tests. Placing the men into positions of highest production is the aim of such a program.

The educators requested this type of first hand knowledge to better counsel their students. The summer graduate course was revamped to institute this novel means of covering the field and furthering the guidance program in the state.

President Hannah Says Status Of AFL Union Not Changed

Commenting on the renewed attempt of organized non-teaching employees to force recognition of their group in wage-hour bargaining, President John Hannah stated Tuesday that as far as the college administration was concerned, "The situation remains unchanged."

A delegation from Local 289, A.F. of L. State, County, and Municipal Workers, had visited Gov. Kim Sigler July 3, receiving his promise to seek a new opinion from the attorney general defining their rights to negotiate a contract with the State Board of Agriculture.

The Ag board has refused to meet with union representatives since an opinion from former attorney general F. O. Eldred last October held that the board had no legal authority to negotiate with the group.

Eldred's ruling said that the Ag board was a constitutional body, and as such, could not delegate any of its functions to any other agency. In carrying out its constitutional obligations, the opinion continued, the board was engaged in a governmental function and so a strike, such as threatened at the time, must be considered illegal.

Late Tuesday, the office of Attorney General Black reported that no prediction could be made as to the date of Black's new ruling.

## The Spanish Election

For the first time in 19 years of dictatorship the citizens of Spain have gone to the polls and voted to legalize the usurpation of power by a dictator.

The Spanish government stated that 80 per cent of the electorate had gone to the polls and voted overwhelmingly to constitute Spain "a Catholic, social and representative state which, in accordance with its tradition, is a kingdom."

The referendum also confirmed Francisco Franco as the Chief of State and further gave him the power to pick his successor from a group of persons of royal descent. Not a word of opposition to the law appeared in the Spanish papers, over the radio or in any public meeting, for Franco discourages such attitudes as not involving the correct moral duty to the state.

Thus Spain becomes the first nation of modern times to regress to the type of absolute monarchy that existed before the French revolution.

The government of Britain, France and the U.S. in March 1946, published documents showing that Franco had collaborated with the Axis and called for the Spanish people to overthrow him. This is Franco's answer to this demand, his attempt to dupe the Spanish people with a forced election and then confront them and the world with a de jure government.

The permanency of such a move is extremely doubtful. Police suppressed all opposition moves during the election, but the very fact that there is opposi-

tion strong enough to require the police and army to hold it in check indicates that the line of succession set up by the new Spanish law will find tough sledding after Franco dies.

News of military activity of a different nature comes from the advanced ROTC cadets at Camp Lee, Va., where State's contingent of quartermaster students are undergoing their six week summer training.

The younger brother, Jack, writes that the daily program is hard and long, but the recreational facilities are fine, if you have time for recreation.

The cadets have classes from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. with lights out at 8:30 p.m. The classes are outdoors in the 100 degree Virginia sun and topped off by callisthenics.

Recreation for the Spartan cadets includes golf, tennis, swimming, baseball, volleyball, badminton, fishing, pool, and use of the NCO and the officers club. Free historical trips to points of interest in Virginia are planned to occupy the weekends.

The cadets are in the peculiar position of being civilians under contract to the army and not actually in the army. This, the fraternal report states, produces some amusing results and seems to perplex the officers and men in charge of the ROTC contingents.

But despite the care and tact of the army with its future mail order officers, the real army shows through the peace veneer and produces a completely realistic number of gripes.

## Civil Service Lists Exams For Michigan

The State Civil Service Commission has announced availability of applications for several positions including soils engineers of various types, tuberculosis graduate nurses, and public health nurses.

Closing date for the acceptance of these applications will be July 23 and the written part of the examination will be given on August 28.

Other positions offered with application deadline July 30 are assistant rural property assessment examiners and institution pharmacists. If written examinations are held they will be on September 5.

Positions and the salary range are: Soils Engineer, \$200-\$300 per month; Tuberculosis Graduate Nurse, \$185-\$255; Public Health Nurse, \$200-\$250; Cashier, \$145-\$190; Rural Property Assessment Examiners, \$200-\$250; and Institution Pharmacists, \$240-\$340.

Applications may be obtained at any County Clerk's office, Veterans' Counseling center, or from offices of the Michigan State Civil Service Commission. All envelopes containing applications must be postmarked not later than the final acceptance date.

## YARDLEY'S CORNER

All veterans who have not applied for their terminal leave payments are advised to do so immediately to avoid delays when their applications are received. Applications should be made to the branch of service you were connected with and not to the Veterans' Administration.

July is the month for veterans to apply for GI insurance without physical examination.

Veterans' Administration officials issued the final starting lists with the names of two-thirds of Michigan's 600,000 veterans of World War I have dropped their national life insurance.

During the last month, VA offices throughout the state are authorized to negotiate lump-sum payments of only two monthly premiums and a statement of payment will be required. Physical examination will be required after August 1.

Under the amended National Service Life Insurance Act, the Veterans' Administration has made available a "guaranteed issue" policy for World War I veterans. This policy is available to all veterans of World War I who are 65 years of age or older and who are not currently receiving a pension or compensation from the VA.

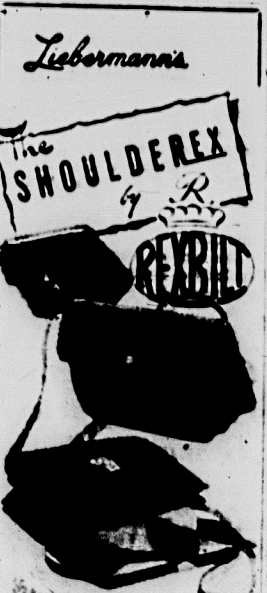

## Buckeyes Top All-American Swim Selection

Ohio State's swimming squad added more weight to its domination of American college swimming by taking 10 places on the 1947 All-American swimming team.

Coch Charles McCaffree announced the selections made by the College Swimming Coaches of America. Following Ohio State team places are Michigan with eight, Stanford, four, Yale and Michigan State, three each.

According to McCaffree, the best season produced the most varied program in inter-collegiate swimming history giving indication that the United States should have its strongest Olympic swimming team of all time in 1948.

The Ohio State swimmers won places in all 11 events. Bill Smith, Buckeye free-style star won individual places in three events, 100, 220, and 440 yard races, as a place in the 400 yard relay.

Miller Anderson of OSU took honors in both one and three meter diving. Other individual selections went to George Hooger-ude of Michigan State, Joe Ver-ur of LaSalle college, Harry pliday of Michigan and the Michigan 300 yard medley team.

Seaver, former Stanford player and recently acquired by State as an instructor, reached a play-off berth by eliminating Harris Beeman, former Spartan net captain and a State Phys. Ed. instructor.
