U. S. Students Unite At NSA Convention After Crucial Test

National Student Association To Ask Council For Campus Vote

Hurdling the southern race question and knocking down extremist attempts to sabotage the infant organization, delegates representing 1,100,000 American students successfully launched the National Student Association into the realm of national student activity during its constitutional convention at Madison, Wis., Sept. 30 to Oct. 7.

A few days later the association was recognized by the U. S. National Commission to UNESCO. Robert Smith (Yale), national vice-president for international affairs, was seated in the commission's advisory council as representative of American college and university students.

Ballot Vote
The association now faces a crucial period, when member schools will vote on acceptance of the new constitution. The National Student Association will be set to set an early date for a campus-wide vote at MSC.

The State News, in this and succeeding articles, will outline the salient features of the new constitution.

Rent Control Clarified By Lansing Head

Some State Students Being Overcharged, Rent Director Says

The possibility that Lansing and East Lansing landlords may be overcharging college persons was pointed out by Russell B. Harrington, Lansing area rent director.

Harrington clarified rent control laws now being enforced.

Three types of housing were decontrolled by the new rent law which went into effect July 1, he said. They are:

- (1) Accommodations in hotels, motor courts and tourist homes.
- (2) Accommodations on which construction was completed after Feb. 1, 1947 or which were created by conversion after that date.
- (3) Accommodations not rented between Feb. 1, 1945 and Jan. 31, 1947 other than to members of the immediate family.

He pointed out dwelling units of these types were removed

from control to induce property owners to put additional accommodations on the rental market.

Harrington said maximum rent for sleeping rooms and apartments which were rented previously are registered in the area rent office, rooms 36-38 Michigan Theater Arcade, Lansing.

"Students who wish to determine the legal maximum rent for the quarters they occupy may do so by calling at the area office," he said.

Homeowners renting non-housekeeping furnished rooms within a single dwelling unit will be able to evict tenants without reference to the rent law, according to Harrington. Some landlords, he said, had refused to rent rooms because they feared they would be unable to evict undesirable tenants.

Students or faculty who desire additional information concerning provisions of this rent law governing leases, evictions and other matters may obtain it from the area office, Harrington declared.

Record Figure Tops Old Mark Set Last Fall

Enrollment Of Women Lags Ratio Of 3-1 Still Prevails

Michigan State enrollment reached an all time high last week as 14,523 students signed up at Fall term registration in the College auditorium. College Registrar Robert S. Linton said Monday he expected this week's late registrants to boost the total above the 15,000 mark.

Final figures will not be available for at least three weeks.

Students enrolled in short courses are not included in the total number.

First breakdown of the figures indicated increase in virtually every category. Enrollment of students under the GI Bill or Rights went up from last fall's 8,123 to a new high of 8,556. The non-veteran figure increased from 1,844 to 2,097.

Lower Women
A statistical estimate which forecast an increase in the ratio of women to men students topped the figures. Figures were computed only 122 women were added to last fall's total while an additional 1,416 men registered.

Total show 11,026 men and 3,497 women, a ratio of slightly more than three men for each woman.

Larger number of students enrolled in a single curriculum was noted.

Bus-Fare Discrimination

ON SEPTEMBER 21, the first of 15,000 students began arriving on the campus of Michigan State college. The number probably would have been larger, except that Congress failed to pass an increase in the veteran's subsistence allowance the cost of living has skyrocketed since the GI bill was passed. Many students simply cannot make ends meet on the present allotment.

To Lansing merchants and other business and professional people, the record enrollment means a market amounting to several millions of dollars spent during the school year by students. It means employment for hundreds of residents in this area.

On this same day, Sept. 21, the Inter-City coach line raised its Lansing-East Lansing fare, not 10, or even 20, but 100 percent. The rate increase reeks with discrimination against the Michigan State college student body. It puts the squeeze on every student who travels from Lansing to East Lansing to attend classes here, as well as on every student who must travel to Lansing in pursuit of business or any pressure he can afford. For the single veteran living in Lansing who is getting \$65 a month to pay for room, board, laundry, insurance, travel and amusement, the 20 cents a day he must pay for bus fare automatically takes 10 percent of his subsistence for transportation.

Naturally, this move by the Inter-City coach line is not going to pass uncontested. President Hannah has requested a hearing of the Michigan Public Service commission. The city of East Lansing has also requested a hearing. Students living on the south campus are considering a petition.

The date for the hearing by the commission has not been set. However, when the protests are heard by the commission, it will not be sufficient to say, "We don't like the rate increase. It is unfair."

The persons appearing at the hearing must present facts and figures showing that the rate increase is discriminatory. The

commission will have to get a good idea of how many persons are specifically hurt by the new fare. None of this can be accomplished except by work and research.

The student council, particularly in behalf of the students it represents in the Lansing area, should look into the matter. Here is one issue in which their work will have the full support of the student body. The council is the organization best equipped to gather material from every section of the student body for use in the fight to have the rate lowered.

Will Michigan State's student government lead the way?

IT IS NO idle gesture that the Spartan Wives organization of Michigan State college has several times been singled out from all the wives' groups in American colleges and universities for national recognition because of the excellent job they have done in community building. 2,324 in engineering. The business administration curriculum was second most popular with 2,080 enrollees.

More Vets

Students enrolled for the first time numbered 3,681. Among the new students there are 2,138 veterans and 1,543 non-veterans.

Quicker Registration

According to Linfon the right registration operation was accomplished with a minimum of friction. Increased facilities at the auditorium made it possible to register the record breaking figures more quickly and on a larger scale than in the past, he said.

Registration figures in the past indicate that the man-woman ratio is a constantly changing factor. In 1944, at the peak of the war effort, women outnumbered men by 1,851, when fall term registration figures were totaled. Two thousand eight hundred and thirty-six women registered while only 685 men signed up that year.

East Lansing Police Put Hex On Careless Drivers

Increasing accident rates resulting in high fatalities are the primary cause for the recent East Lansing police crackdown on traffic violations, according to Police Chief Charles F. Pegg.

An accident Sunday night on the bridge east of East Lansing cost the lives of a Clawson, Michigan mother and her six year old son. Five others were hospitalized as a result of the two car crash.

It is toward the prevention of this type of accident that the drive is directed, stated Chief Pegg.

The actual drive, said Chief Pegg, is through increased court action and subsequent increased work by patrol cars and Lansing police. The effort is already apparent in East Lansing by improved traffic driving conditions. Judge Lau, Younger, a former assistant in the prosecutor's office, has recently been elevated to the bench of the Lansing Municipal court, and through his efforts, according to Pegg, the present drive has taken form.

Chief Pegg lists Judge Younger as "fair-minded and determined."

Repeating ordinances governing high hikers for the benefit of new MSC students, Chief Pegg stated that both state and city laws indicate that high-hikers "shall be on the curb, not on the travelled part of the highway."

without sleep for three days, became quick-tempered. A small group, headed by retiring president Jim Smith (Texas), worked unceasingly for a solution.

In a dramatic plenary session, Smith piloted a compromise proposal to passage. It provided that NSA "will take action on national, regional, and campus levels through the corresponding organization of NSA to implement its stated principles, with regard to the legal limitations involved."

The almost unanimous vote staved off a possible southern white walk-out, and allowed the delegates to proceed with the main business at hand — framing a constitution.

The next issue to call forth warm debate was that of affiliation of the NSA with the International Union of Students.

The IUS is a Communist-dominated organization, as it is presently constituted. This fact was never seriously disputed. Knowing this, there was widespread opposition to affiliation in any form. The Michigan State delegation, along with the majority of the Michigan region, helped to lead this opposition.

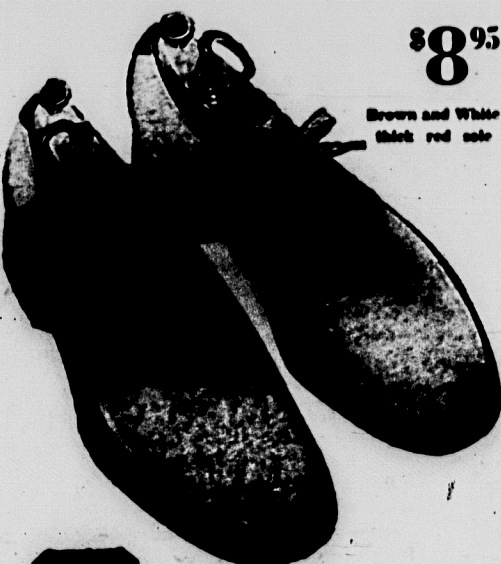

Feud Brewing As World Series Opens

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 (AP)—A smoldering set of Brooklyn Dodgers took a final sharpening-up of their home diamond at Ebbetts Field today in preparation for tomorrow's opening world series clash at Yankee Stadium with the New York Yankees, proud and inhospitable champions of the American League.

Every Dodger, from Manager Burt Shotton right down to the bat boy was doing a slow burn because the National League winners were not invited to practice at the site of the first

two games. It was believed to mark the first time in series history that a club had not been given a chance to study the hills and shadows of its rival's playing pasture.

Harris Disapproved

Shotton, 63-year-old pilot of the Brooks, suggested a week ago

that he would like his tearing tigers to work out at the stadium today. The idea was given such a cold reception by Manager Bucky Harris of the Yanks that the Dodger higher-ups recoiled and refused to make an official request that they be accepted as house guests.

Harris said today that no request had been received from the Dodgers to drill in the Stadium

and added that "we haven't asked for permission to workout in Ebbetts Field, either."

Though Shotton had not named his opening pitcher, it appeared virtually certain he would use his ace, 21-year-old Ralph Branca, of Mount Vernon, N. Y. Branca, a 200-pound right-hander, won 21 while losing 12 during the season.

Shotton's alternate is to start little Vic Lombardi, a left-hander with good control and a tricky curve. This was considered only an outside possibility.

Shea, who pitched for Oakland in the Coast League last season, will be the first rookie ever to open a world series for an American League team. Barring a real rainstorm, a record-breaking series crowd of about 73,000 was assured. Every box and reserved seat had been sold, as well as 7,000 tickets for standing room. Twelve thousand

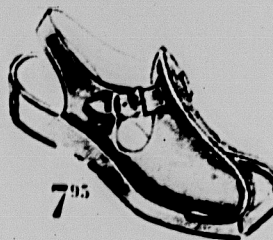

U.S. Protests Soviet Slap

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—The United States has protested to Moscow that a Soviet writer libeled and insulted President Truman by comparing him to Hitler, and Moscow has rejected the protest, the State department disclosed today.

The text of the notes exchanged between U.S. ambassador Walter Bedell Smith and Soviet foreign minister V. M. Molotov showed that Molotov not only rejected any responsibility for the offending article but also lashed out bitterly against "that American press which is so widely encouraged by the most reactionary circles."

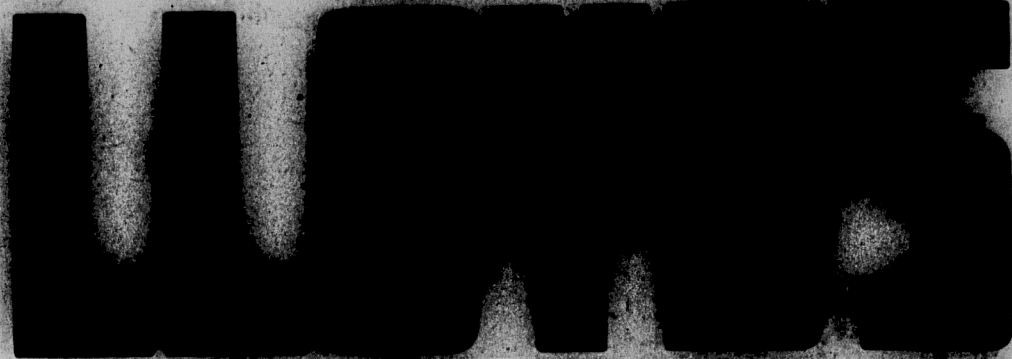

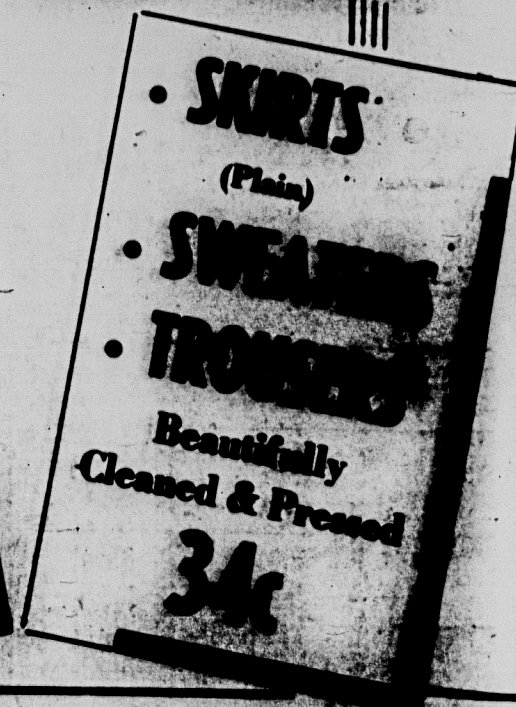
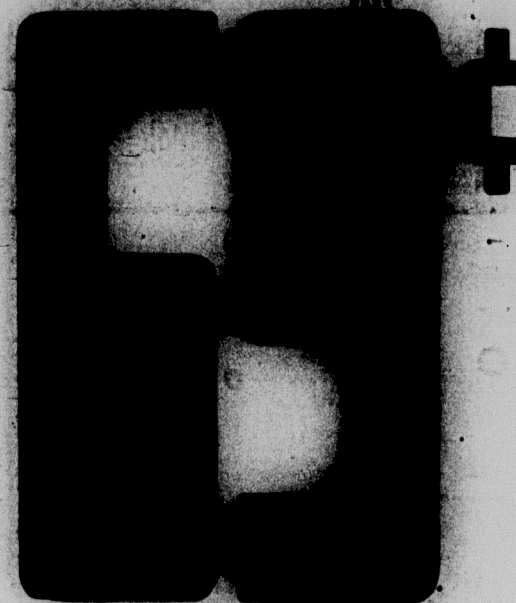
