

Truman Asks Unions To Halt World Havoc

Government Injunction Near.
Padway Warns Workers

RAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8 (AP)—President Truman appealed a message to the American Federation of Labor today to set still higher America's level of production to meet the vital conditions which threaten the well-being of the free world.

At the same time he warned of the necessity of "remedies" in the domestic economy of the nation to cope with reasonable prices and insufficient housing.

Complaint Gets Quick Action From Council

The President's message, read at the AF's 60th annual convention, called upon America's workers to share the nation's abundance with the less fortunate, increase the production level by 10 percent than ever before peace time. "The need for us," Mr. Truman added, "in my country in the year ahead will be even more acute than in past years."

Padway Colleagues
The convention was recessed after the reading of the President's message when Joseph A. Padway, the Federation's general counsel, collapsed on the platform. He was taken to his hotel in suffering what appeared to be a slight stroke.

Padway, who was discussing violations of the Taft-Hartley law, had warned the Padway. "We are on the threshold of a government by injunction—by private employees but by government itself."

World Gov't Is Solution, Says Swing

Asks More U.S.-led Cooperation Now

Radio analyst Raymond Fenton Swing, speaking before more than 3,000 persons in College auditorium last night, offered world government under law as the only method of averting continuing international anarchy.

"We are living in 1945 under the curse of 1919. Our continuance of such a policy will lead to ultimate disaster," Swing declared. "The only way we can avoid war is to lead the peoples of the world around to believing in a world governed by law."

Pointing an accusing finger at the Truman doctrine as "inflammatory" and "ideological," Swing told his audience that calamity was averted by supplementing the Marshall plan.

In a far-flung world the action of one causes an inevitable reaction on the part of the other," he stated. However, he continued, "if we do something which offers Russia more security instead of less, we may get more cooperation."

Swing offered a four-point version of what he considered a sound American foreign policy. The points were:

(1) That the United States hold on to the strategic areas of the eastern world.

(2) That we seek a basic agreement and understanding with Russia.

(3) That a strong, unified Europe is reconstituted with powers to be created.

(4) That a world government be adopted.

He insisted that no permanent policy be made but that flexibility be maintained.

Swing stressed the point that with the atomic bomb U. S. morality had collapsed. He said the indiscriminate mass destruction instruments used by the U. S. in the war severely lowered our national moral standard.

The lead in rebuilding our moral standards has not been taken by churches as it should have been, he said, but by the atomic scientists themselves.

He claimed that the United States through control of government employees and secretaries of scientific information, was slowly moving in the direction of totalitarianism.

\$65 Is Not Enough

How are you getting along on \$65 a month?

When the GI Bill of Rights was first passed, the \$65 allotment was an entirely reasonable amount for the single veteran to pay his room, board, and incidentals with. The position of the married veterans has been, and continues to be, more precarious. Veterans everywhere were grateful for the opportunity provided by their government to get a college education, and have shown that they take the grant seriously to get the better grades than non-veterans in almost every college in the country.

College enrollments this fall indicate that more than half the students are veterans—something like 80 per cent. This can be read to indicate that veterans are prepared to supplement the gap from their savings or by working in order to meet expenses.

What may be a trend, however, was evident this summer when Congress adjourned leaving a subsistence increase in committee.

Gerrymandering?

At the time of spring elections, the Marital Students' district contained barely enough students to warrant two seats on council. Shortly after, the population of the district had increased to an extent that would have allowed the area three seats had the newcomers been resident in the district at the time of official tabulation.

So the election rules were unofficially repealed for as long as it took to add a third representative from the Marital Students' district.

This action provided the precedent by which still a fourth member was brought into the council at its last session, five months after the election. The student population of the area is now approximately five times that counted in last fall's census.

This apparently means that the council has taken unto itself the power to increase or decrease representation on the council at any time. This policy, followed to its logical conclusion, could lead to violent repercussions.

We are not contending that the married students should not have representation proportional to their numbers, and to their stake in campus life. Neither do we mean to reflect upon the ability of the new men brought to the council from that area.

But we do firmly believe that the present election rules should be so modified, in a legal manner, that in the future, we will know the makeup of the council immediately after the votes are cast.
