Haydn Life To Be Aired Over WKAR

Francis Joseph Haydn comes to life next Monday, as the second of the 1947 "Adventures in Music" series dramatizes the story behind the Andante from his "Surprise Symphony."

Under the tutelage of Kaimi's magic music wand, Johnny and Mary will travel to the Austria of George Washington's day and follow "Papa" Haydn's career through his many successes, and then travel with him to London. Will You Andante.

There, they will visit the great halls and feasts given for the famed Austrian composer, and suffer with him the pangs of over-eating and excitement.

They will hear the story of the "Surprise Symphony," written as a joke. After Haydn had noticed that fast-stuffed Englishmen too often fell asleep during the concert, he wrote the Andante movement to jolt them awake. Beginning very softly, the Andante suddenly thunders through a huge chord, which gives the symphony its name.

Featured melody repeated. The featured melody of last week's program, the "Prayer," from "Hansel and Gretel," will be repeated, and the theme from today's selection will recur throughout the program, to implant it firmly in the children's minds.

The Adventure in Music series is aired each Monday morning over WKAR, the college station, at 10, and features students in both music and dramatics.
