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Munn Shifts Sieradzki To Bolster Backfield

Blenkhorn's Showing At Full Makes New Move Possible

With hard-hitting Steve Sieradzki back in the lineup, the Spartan ground game is due to hit its peak in Saturday's initial grid tilt with the Cyclones of Iowa State.

Sieradzki, sidelined with an ankle injury since the beginning of the season, has been working out in scrimmage all week and is a sure bet to ace action tomorrow. He made the trip to Washington State last weekend, but was forced to watch the game from the bench.

Head Coach Clarence "Biggie" Munn has shifted Sieradzki from fullback to left half where his 190 pounds will give weight to the position to relieve speedy George Guerre.

An all-state back at Muskegon High school in 1943, Sieradzki proved to be a capable line plunger last season gaining 191 yards offensively. On the defense, as line backer, his bulk plugged many holes opened in the Michigan State forward wall.

Another reason for the shift of Sieradzki is the showing Jim Blenkhorn has made in the tailback slot. Blenkhorn, moved from right half to fullback last season, was voted by the coaching staff the "most improved" player on the Spartan squad during practice and his play thus far has earned him his coaches' opinion.

The only regular to receive an injury this week, Blenkhorn came up with a bruised knee in Tuesday's practice session, but Munn

Coach John Kaba will start the same eleven today that opened the contest against the Wolverines.

Johnny Buda and Lee Dibble will be at the ends and Bob Greenwood and Tony Musica at tackles. Roger Bense will hold down the right guard spot and Howard Adams is to start at left guard.

Ralph Wenger will complete the line at center.

Speedster Marty Kelly, whose long run last week set up the first State touchdown, is Coach Kaba's choice at the right half position with passer Bob Kritzer at left half.

Bob Swett, who did an outstanding job of signal calling against Michigan, will again start at quarterback. John Hempel is to fill the fullback spot.

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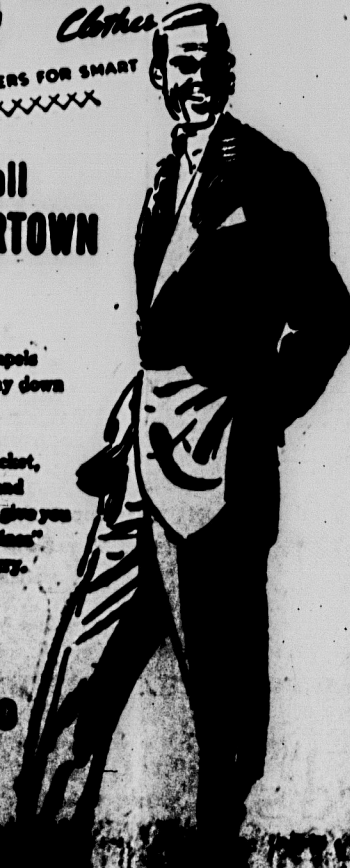
