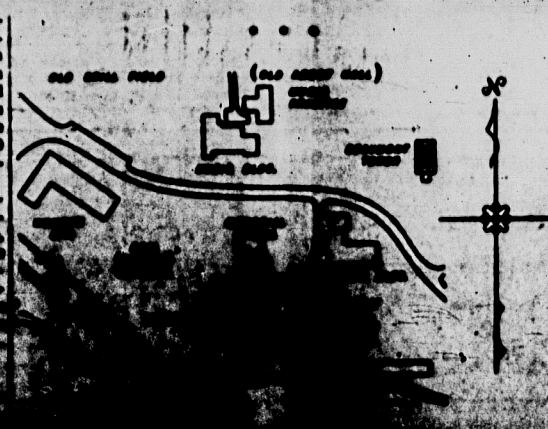

The Sigma Nu men show "Big-die" Munn holding back a cyclone, with the Spartan team laughing at the Iowa State players.

A billboard erected at Theta Chi has an advertisement of "Munn" decedant. The ingredients, our Spartan team, are

smothering the Iowa men. Farm-house fraternity features the "Cyclone Busters."

The MSC weather bureau has been located for the day at the ATO house. The cyclone predicted to arrive at 2 p.m. materialized, and is defeated by the Spartans.

Kappa Sigma is extending a warm hand to alumni with the banner "Welcome Alums" and a 1925 Oldsmobile with the typical

The construction of the annex for the Administration building was begun in January, '46. By September, '47, impatient college officials had moved in although completion is not expected before November 1. The annex and the new classrooms south of the river house most of the offices once located in the gymnasium of Demonstration hall. The offices of the Placement bureau, Housing director, Dormitory Food Service, Accounting, Purchasing, Dean of Students and Counselors for men and women are located in the annex.

Partially completed, the Science building will be the largest building on the campus, being 700 feet long and covering 36,000 square feet of ground area. It will house the offices, laboratories and classrooms for the departments of botany, entomology, zoology, geology, and geography. The insert shows the architect's drawing of the finished building.

The building will house the offices, laboratories and classrooms of the Ag Engineering department and the offices and laboratories of the research and extension staff.

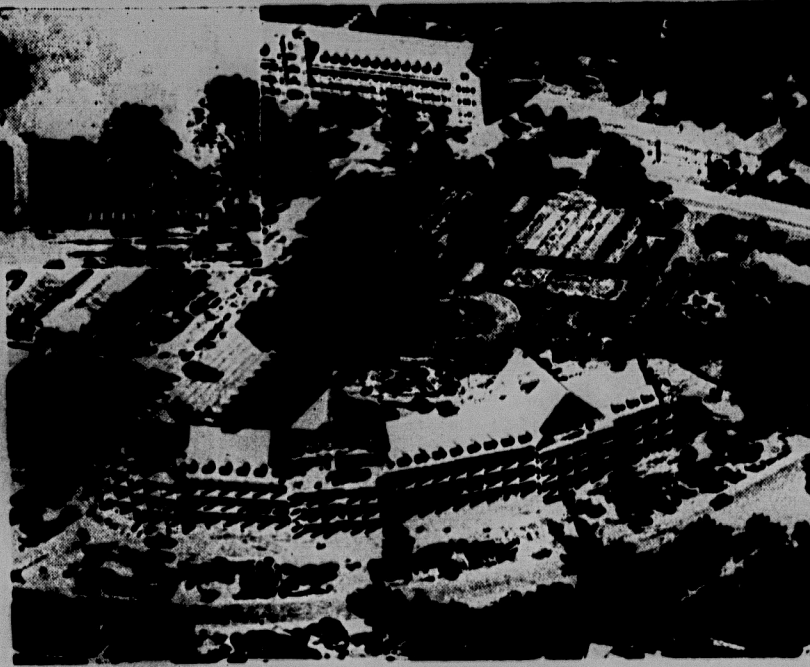

This aerial view from the southwest shows the emergency and permanent housing projects at MSC. Brick apartments, Quonset, pre-fabs and trailers are the homes of some 1,400 single students, 1,040 faculty and student couples and 621 children. This project was started early in '46 to accommodate the swelling student enrollment and provide for faculty housing. Shown on the photo are: (1) Faculty village, (2) Single men's Quonset huts, (3) Married students barracks apartments, (4) New food storage plant, (5) New power plant, (6) Partially completed science building and (7) Turkey hall.

More Power To You

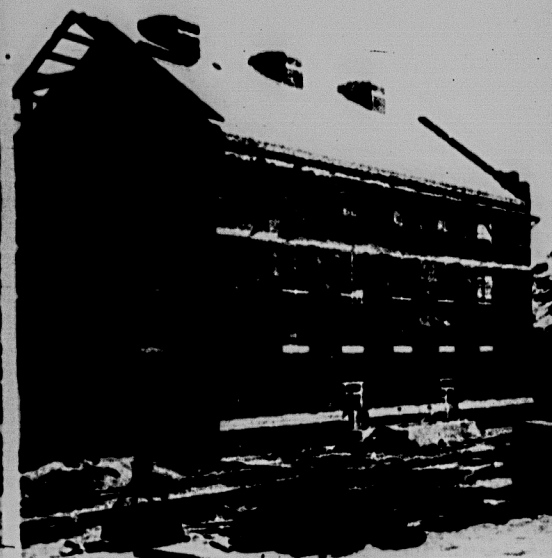

A new generator is now being built for MSC to be installed sometime in March in the old power plant.

Michigan State college's sports scene this fall presents a much-revised array for returning alumni. The football squad will trot onto Macklin field, before an expected record crowd that may exceed 25,000, under the direction of the new coach, using a new system and arrayed in new uniforms.

Biggie Munn heads the 1917 edition of Spartan tradition, history makers, operating of the "T" and modified single wing with variation. The squad now wears uniforms of green and white, the school colors.

Two Grid Victories

Using the new system, Munn's team has won two and lost one this season. Michigan poured on the heat in the season opener to win, 55-0.

The win marks Sewell as the leader of a fine seven-man squad that will clash with Notre Dame and Iowa in next Saturday's double dual meet at Notre Dame.

Acheson Second

Walt Acheson was the next man under the tape at 22:11, followed by Jack Dianetti.

Kevin Higgins (22:20), Jim Gibbard, (22:35), George Kostisak, (23:32), and Don Trull, (23:38), make up the list of seven slated for the Notre Dame clash.

Sewell led the 27-man field at the mile with a swift 4:48. The last man had passed the mile mark at 5:17. The pace slowed down 1:30 in the mile, and the last time was about six seconds slower than the best practice mark of the week before.

Course Layed Out

The course for the run started in front of Dem hall, followed the road west of the stadium, lapped the oval track once, then ran along the road winding through the trees, and wound up at the track once more.

Demonstration

Those who are in doubt about gymnastics may get a demonstration between halves of the homecoming football game. Szypula, disguised as a cheer leader, and the cheer leading corps are going to stage a tumbling exhibition as part of the half time ceremonies. Szypula stated the gymnastics team would also perform between halves of the basketball games this winter.

A gymnastics meet consists of competition between schools on the horizontal bars, parallel bars, side horse, flying rings, trampoline and tumbling.

Besides these events there are combinations on any piece of apparatus except the trampoline and tumbling. The combinations require skill and stamina and are a highly interesting sport. A combination consists of a stunt used in mounting the apparatus. Then a continuous series of seven or eight stunts flow into one another without unnecessary swinging or stops. Finally a stunt to dismount and land on the feet.

The trampoline is one of the most intriguing of all the gymnastic apparatus, and also the newest. The army and navy training programs gave it great popularity and resulted in its addition to gymnastics.

Five major and two minor letter winners from last year's squad form the nucleus on which Makris will build this year's system.

Leading the list of returning veterans in the ring is Chuck Davey, national collegiate 125-pound champion last year. Davey also won the 127-pound national collegiate title in 1943 when he was only a freshman.

Davey will also handle the team in road work and calisthenics until Makris is relieved of his duties of assistant football coach.

Other returning veterans are Edie Charbonneau who fought at 125 pounds last year, Jack Tierney at 130 pounds, Pat Daugherty at 155, John Buda, 165, and Al Hoghlett is returning at heavyweight.

Newcomers who have shown quite a bit of promise in the early workouts are Bob McRae, Lloyd Chen, Rex Sieger and Lee Dramus.

A former Badger boxer, Makris won the national collegiate lightweight title in 1942 and successfully defended his crown the following year.

Chuck Davey and his new coach both fought in the same national tournament in 1943. Davey won the 127-pound crown while Makris took the lightweight title.

Makris was also a varsity football player at Wisconsin, winning three letters at the tackle position. He is 27 year old, 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighs 195 pounds.
