U of M, Muddy Field Keeps Spartan Offense In Check

Michigan State Jayvees saw their dreams of an undefeated season trampled into the sloppy surface of Macklin yesterday by a mud loving University of Michigan squad 13-7.

While the Spartans were having hard time hanging on to the slippery football Wolverines were plowing through the mud for 140 yards. The Wolverines committed six fumbles but gained only 20 yards on ground.

Michigan showed their approval of the field condition early in the game. It took the visitors just one and one-half minutes to gain 34 yards for their first touchdown.

Michigan State received the ball and got nowhere in two plays. On the third play Bud Williams backed to the Michigan 40 line and on six downs the Wolverines plowed down to the 30.

Quarterback Irv Small broke through to the Spartan six and Ed Wilcox moved it down to the three.

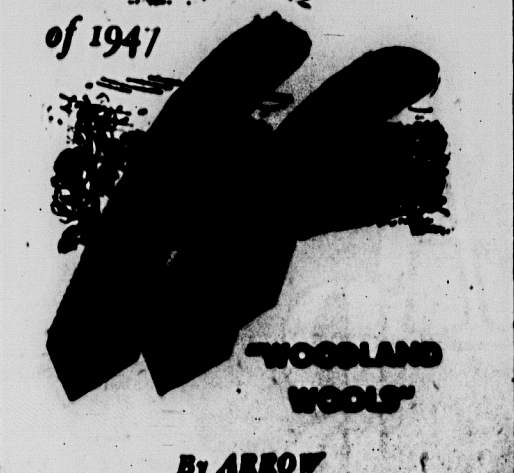

Ex-General Denies Aid From Hughes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—A fast-talking retired air force general vigorously disputed today testimony that he tried during the war to borrow \$50,000 from plane-maker Howard Hughes. He did say he tried to borrow this amount from him earlier this year.

The general, Bennett E. Meyers, also told a senate war investigating subcommittee that while he was on an official inspection of Hughes' California plant in 1944, Hughes offered him a postwar job in which he "could write my own ticket" as to salary.

"People offered jobs to me all the time," Meyers said. "They didn't mean a damn thing to me. I was only interested in winning the war."

The witness also testified—and his petite blonde wife backed him up—that Mrs. Meyers slipped an

envelope containing \$900 into the pocket of Johnny Meyer, Hughes' public relations man, in repayment of travel and hotel expenses. But Meyer took the witness stand briefly and flatly contradicted them both.

Meyers said in response to questioning that he and his wife had been entertained by Hughes offi-

cially while on the coast, but described the entertainment as nominal and less than the "usual practice."

Identifies Bill. Ferguson then had the general identify the hotel bills and cost of train fares back to Washington for Mrs. Meyers and Mrs. Howe, totaling \$1,472.64.

Ferguson asked: That was paid by the Hughes Aircraft which had this government contract?

Meyers: No, sir. It may have been originally paid by them. I left a day early and the cashier of the Town House (Los Angeles hotel) said the bill was taken care of.

The general explained that after some dispute he obtained a copy of the bill, made certain deductions and instructed Mrs. Meyers to be certain to pay it, to a total of \$900.
