Another alleged violation of Michigan civil liberties was presented for investigation by the civil liberties student council to the students yesterday. A report submitted by William Lewis and Wendell Robinson, stated that they were refused from a local dance hall where they had two Negro co-

Lewis stated, "when we called the advertisement of the establishment, which advised us of these facts, the manager told us to leave."

## Up-Stage

**DRAMA HAS BEEN STRONGLY EVIDENT** at Michigan State in the past week or so. Not only on the stage at Fairchild, but at the local theater.

Last week's four-day run of "All My Sons" is certainly indicative of something. Among other things it is the fruition of the drama department's plan as stated by Don Buell last fall. The fall production of the term play, "Mr. and Mrs. North," was an abject failure as far as esthetic qualities of stage drama are concerned and was summarily panned by State News Drama critic Dr. Townsend Rich. But still it packed Fairchild for the four-night run.

Whether or not "Mr. and Mrs. North" was a good play makes no difference. It provided the backdrop to put on a play like "All My Sons," a serious type of drama which students evidently won't attend in any volume.

It is shame that more students did not take advantage of the most maturely presented play ever produced here. The production was not judged on the basis of student drama, but fully merited its being considered as professional work.

Still on the stage, a new play by an MSC faculty member is being presented this week. "Bolted Doors" deserves a little attention by itself.

**THE MOVIES HAVE ALSO MADE A BIG CONTRIBUTION** to the local entertainment. Although none of them come from Ameri-

can production studios, they present a vivid picture of what can be done with the celluloid medium as compared to Hollywood's sugary clap-trap.

Last week's "Odd Man Out" at the State theater and this week's "Great Expectations" show what can be done if the producers don't let the golden fetish of what they consider box office appeal govern all their work.

**A GREAT DEAL OF CREDIT BELONGS** to Dean Stanley Crowe for initiating the foreign movies' series that opened at Fairchild last night. And if last night's crowd is any indication, the other films on the program will have to be shown in the auditorium.

"The Well Digger's Daughter," presented to MSC students with a realistic drama that is uncommon, if at all present, in Hollywood releases. In fact many may have been a little bit surprised at the frankness of the film, but only as result of a somewhat superficial morality that has grown with American culture.

The subject of illegitimate children may not be a "proper" subject for the refined interests of our day, but it is a problem that exists in life and if the film industry ignores problems of life and work exclusively in its land of fairy tales, it might just as well direct its work at the kindergarten level.



Nine student delegates leave tomorrow for Columbus, Ohio, to represent MSC at the three-day annual Legislative Conference on Public Affairs sponsored by the speech department of Ohio State University.

More than 30 colleges and universities will attend the convocation.

Functioning as a legislative assembly, students will divide into groups supporting left-of-center, center, and right-of-center views concerning the United States foreign policy towards the Soviet Union.

### Soviet Delegates

For Michigan State, Yearl Schwartz, Wyandotte junior; Robert Kuhlman, and Dorothy Sare, Detroit seniors, will support the "leftist party"; Richard Clausen, Lansing sophomore; Yvonne Waller and John Kennedy, Flint, and Detroit seniors, will argue for the "center"; while John Hamilton, Marshall junior; Zonne Haren and Belinda Marquette, Detroit, and Lansing seniors, will sit on the "right".

Professor Bernard Keppler, State's director of forensics, will accompany the delegates and act as coach.

During the conference, presiding officers will be elected, party caucuses will be held, and committees will form resolutions to present before general assemblies.
