Student Council Survey

Constitution Rumpus

The Student council constitution rumpus seems to boil down to a few basic facts. The council must draft a constitution and submit it through channels. The present unofficial talks on the substance of the constitution serve only to help prepare a draft, which would be acceptable to the faculty as a whole.

Once a constitution is drafted it can be submitted to the Faculty committee on organizations which is headed by Tom King, Councilor for men.

If this constitution is approved by the committee, it is presented to the faculty as a whole. The faculty meets at regular intervals to discuss, solve and act on various problems concerning students and faculty. President Hannah is the presiding officer of this body.

If the constitution is approved by the faculty as a whole, the document, as far as the faculty is concerned, is operative. The Student council may then submit the constitution for referendum to the students. However, this is not a faculty rule, but rather a Student council prerogative.

If, on the other hand, the committee on organizations, or the faculty as a whole disapprove the constitution, reasons for disapproval and suggested changes are traditionally made. This does not mean that the faculty has to make the recommendations for change, but that it usually does.

If a constitution is approved, it is de facto recognition of the body's right to exist. It is upon this recognition that the present student government is built.

Conversely, withdrawal of recognition of the constitution or amendment by the faculty would bring resulting changes in the Student council.

Under any constitution, the final authority rests with the president of the college and the whole body of the faculty with the right of appeal to the State Board of Agriculture through the college president's office.

Control Of Social Affairs

One method of strengthening the Student council that would insure greater student responsibility would be to give the council actual jurisdiction over organizations concerned with social affairs.

The line of authority of many student organizations extends directly from the organization to the administration. As a result no single group has a wide enough jurisdiction to insure genuine student control.

Organizations in this category are the Faculty-Student social committee, Union board, Associated Women Students, Pan-Hellenic, Interfraternity council and the four college classes.

Under present conditions the council actually is a receptacle for all business which doesn't happen to come under another organization's jurisdiction.

When the Junior class appeared to be overcharging for J-Hop tickets the council had no authority to step in and clear up the situation. It should have that authority.

The same situation would exist if the Union board spent dance profits in an unwise manner. At the present time the council could do nothing to stop it.

Perhaps the outstanding example is illustrated by the Faculty-Student social committee. That committee makes the social rules and enforces them. In doing so it automatically takes a small bit of responsibility from each other campus organization. Yet the makeup of the committee is not representative in character. Student members do not fairly represent the student body as a whole.

The administration would unquestionably rest on the right of final approval of decisions rendered by the social committee. However, the council should have the right to review those decisions before they are sent to the president for final acceptance or rejection.

The Student council is elected to be the last word in student authority. It at is adequately to perform that function it should be given the power to do so.

NSA Guiding Principles

Those students who have been asking for a change in State's student government might be interested in a pamphlet issued by the National Student Association titled "Student Leadership and Government in Higher Education."

That pamphlet lists the following eight principles which are now pertinent to the problem here.

1. To the extent that students assume responsibility, to that same extent they will feel that the school is a cooperative enterprise in which members of the faculty are not autocrats but guides.

2. Student government is based on an authority delegated to the student body by the administration.

3. The authority so delegated should be clearly defined.

4. The responsibility in the defined areas of authority should be complete.

5. The student government should relate effectively to the rest of the curriculum inasmuch as it is part of the learning process.

6. Student government should meet minimum standards of administrative efficiency.

7. Student government should include the best in democratic governing technique.

8. The responsibility to represent student opinion outside of the areas of delegated authority should be clearly understood.

These principles might help to clear the foggy atmosphere on campus, caused by the current problems of student government.

Perhaps this fog will be cleared by March 22 when delegates arrive for a two-day clinic of the Michigan region of the NSA.

Delegations from all member schools, plus some from schools like State which have not yet formally affiliated, will honor Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public instruction.

Campus Chest Side-Stepped

Undecision to establish a Campus Chest is taken in the near future the plan will have to be scrapped for at least another year. So far a great deal of misguided discussion has taken place and very little concrete action has resulted. With the exception of a few members the Student council has side-stepped the issue in every instance.

First the council wanted to take a poll of the student body on the subject. At the present time they have tabled a motion to adopt the plan.

Council members don't seem to understand that if the plan is to go into operation next year the groundwork and organization must be established this year.

Just why the measure must be voted on by the entire student body not even council members can explain. The plan is designed to make the collection of money on the campus more efficient and to save the average student the annoyance of having someone buttonhole him to ask for money every time he turns around.

Briefly, the idea is this: to create a single centralized organization functioning under the jurisdiction of the Student council with the responsibility to pool all money raising campaigns on the campus under one title. Under the plan one big money raising drive would be held each year to replace four to six small campaigns.

Following the World Student Service Fund drive last fall the Student council turned the matter over to Blue Key, junior and senior men's honorary, which made its report at last week's council meeting.

The Blue Key report suggested that the council appoint a seven man board of directors with three main functions:

(1) To decide what organizations should be included under the chest drive.

(2) To determine what share of the total money collected would go to each of the participating organizations and how much would be set aside for reserves.

(3) To appoint co-chairmen of a yearly drive to conduct the actual campaign.

The council is at liberty to make any changes it sees fit in the Blue Key proposal. Instead of discussing the matter in even turning it over to a committee for revision the council tabled the motion.

One common misconception concerning the plan is that it would necessitate non-voluntary contributions. Contributions would be voluntary as with every money raising drive held on the campus in the past.

In addition to simplifying the problem of giving on the part of students the plan would greatly aid sponsoring groups in organizing a drive. With many independently operated campaigns there is much duplication and repetition in basic organization. Each of the organizations has difficulty in getting student volunteer workers and in generating any genuine enthusiasm on the part of the student body.

Council Paradox

TWO EDITORIALS ON THIS PAGE purposely present a clear-cut contradiction, a contradiction which is at the bottom of the whole argument of student rights between students and faculty.

The editorial on the proposed campus chest points out that the council has taken no initiative in either refining or promoting the plan. The other editorial states that unless the council can realize a "supreme" authority over all student "social" activities it will remain as purposeless and fruitless as it is now.

The Margarine Laws

A test case in Pontiac last week opened the fight of the Michigan Retail Grocers association against restrictive state legislation concerning the sale of oleomargarine.

Both federal and state laws have been on the books, long since 1886, which protect the dairy industry at the expense of the manufacturers of butter substitutes.

The federal government has long argued with the following costs:

The manufacturer must pay a \$600 annual tax before he can even start to produce it. The wholesaler must pay \$480 to handle colored margarine and \$200 for uncolored. The retailer must pay \$48 to sell colored and \$6 for uncolored.

In 39 of our 48 states additional license fees and regulations against butter substitutes are on the books. Michigan has one of the most restrictive laws of all the states in that it prohibits the sale of colored margarine completely.

Michigan consumers and food retailers, responding to the need for repeal of punitive taxes and license fees on the sale of oleomargarine, should remember what happened in 1932. A popular referendum turned down a margarine tax twelve to one.

Inflation in butter prices has caused the present agitation for a review of the punitive laws against margarine.

We protest certain kinds of domestic manufacture from foreign competition with tariff laws, but in no other case is the price of one American product kept high artificially for the protection of a competing domestic industry.

The test case should clear up a lot of the old arguments about the oleo laws. The Michigan law for instance, which prohibits sale of colored margarine, is unfair. There is nothing on the face books which prohibits the makers of butter to color their products. They do it all the time. Why then shouldn't oleo manufacturers color theirs?

The objection that taxes are necessary for the consumer is not valid. The pure food laws, as a matter of routine, take care of the purity of margarine just as they do all other products, and probably a good deal better than this is the case of some others.

It is time for the state of Michigan to realize that the unfair and discriminatory taxes problem and has already called a meeting for next Tuesday.

their duties with a maturity that is certainly not evident in the present setup.

No doubt that there are students on this campus who are more than capable of shouldering the responsibilities asked in the new proposed constitution. It is fitting that an organization which is supposed to represent and voice student opinion should hold some weight in every phase of student activity.

BUT ARE THE STUDENTS CAPABLE of handling these responsibilities in a sane manner? So far there has been no evidence that they can.

The administration is in no less than an embarrassing position at all times. It must please four different groups and that is no small job. First, the State Board of Agriculture has the final authority, except it in turn must answer to the state legislature which, in its turn must maintain some manner of congenial relations with the people of the State of Michigan.

And then, in the other direction, the gripes and legitimate gripes of the students cannot be entirely ignored.

AS MIGHT BE READILY GUessed the primary purpose of MSC is to provide the college with a definite point of view. At the same time the college must conform its methods and aims to the demands of the citizens of Michigan and the legislature.

If the students are given a totally free hand and carry on in such a manner as to provoke indignation comment from any of the above mentioned groups, Presentine faces his ability to act in removing State's most urgent needs to the handicapped.

TAKING THE STUDENT COUNCIL'S action on the Campus Chest proposal as an indicator, the college authorities have an encouragement to believe that the students can conduct their own affairs in a reasonable manner.

The least the administration can do is to assert itself one way or the other on the Chest question. We think it is obvious that the plan should be adopted but even if the council rejected the plan with sound argument, it would at least be asserting itself in a rare manner.

The council is not to be considered the total evil of student capabilities. It is only one symptom—a symptom of the student body's inability to assume a grown-up attitude on its affairs.

"But," student politicians say, "you can't expect anyone to be interested in a council that can do nothing." And the merry circle is off for another spin.

We believe without reservation that the students are capable, if given a chance.

But it must start somewhere and that place lies in the Student Council. Until the council can prove itself worthy of trust in the matters it is allowed to handle now, no one can expect the administrative officials to trust it with any bigger problems.
