A homemade flag bearing a star and the hammer and sickle flew from the Demonstration hall staff until a boom-climbing workman was elevated to the flag by a construction crane.

Before hoisting the pennant, the "Reds" had evidently cut the rope that lowers the flag. Once raised, the end of the rope dangled from the top of the pole.

Workmen described the flag as a 4 x 6 foot piece of cotton sheet dyed red with yellow communist symbols crudely sewn on.

MSC's only alleged Communist, James Zarichny, 24, Flint senior, was cited for contempt yesterday by the State Senate un-American committee.

He said the question was "improper" involving his "political beliefs" and that he had a "constitutional right not to answer."

Senate committee chairman, Sen. Matthew Callahan (R-Detroit) told Zarichny he "had no such right" and that he "would have to answer or stand in contempt." However, Zarichny still refused to answer and repeatedly refused to commit himself on the question.

Students Cause Disturbance

He was subpoenaed by the committee last week following President Hannah's testimony saying that there was only one Communist on the campus.

Some minor disturbances disrupted the start of the hearings yesterday. A group of students was refused admittance to the hearing. One, Robert Goy, Plymouth graduate student, forced his way past the guard and took a seat in the committee room.

Counsel Halted

Callahan also refused to let Donald W. Loria, Detroit attorney, represent or counsel Zarichny. Loria tried to present to the committee a list of objections.

Familiar With Lenin

Zarichny told the committee that he was "somewhat familiar" with the writings of Lenin, but refused to answer whether he agreed with them.

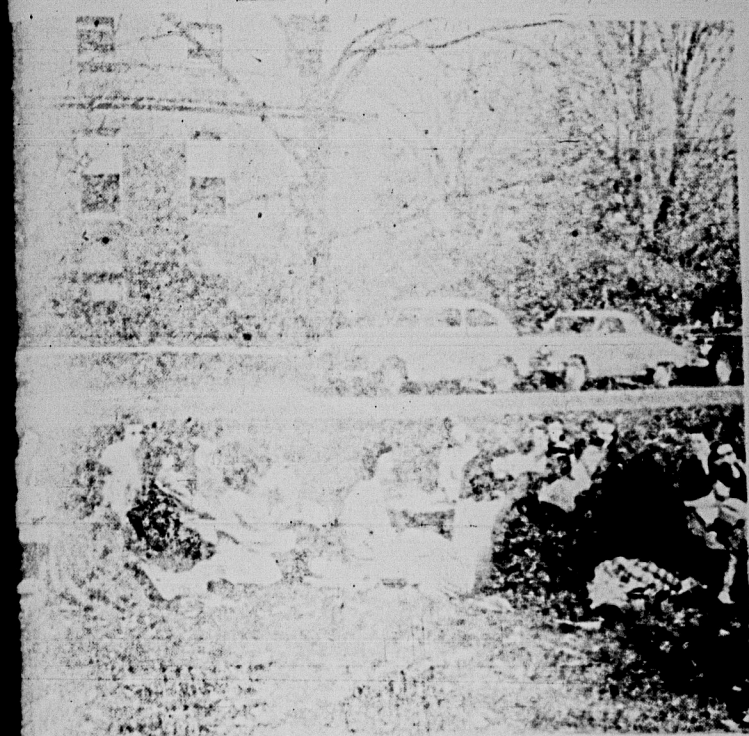

Left—All of this year's unusually warm spring weather has reached some of the students, who are enjoying the outdoors in front of Abbot Hall.

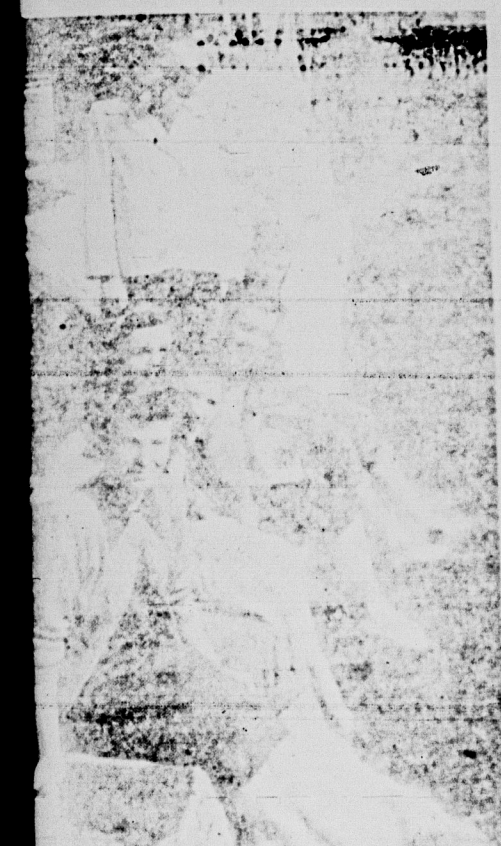

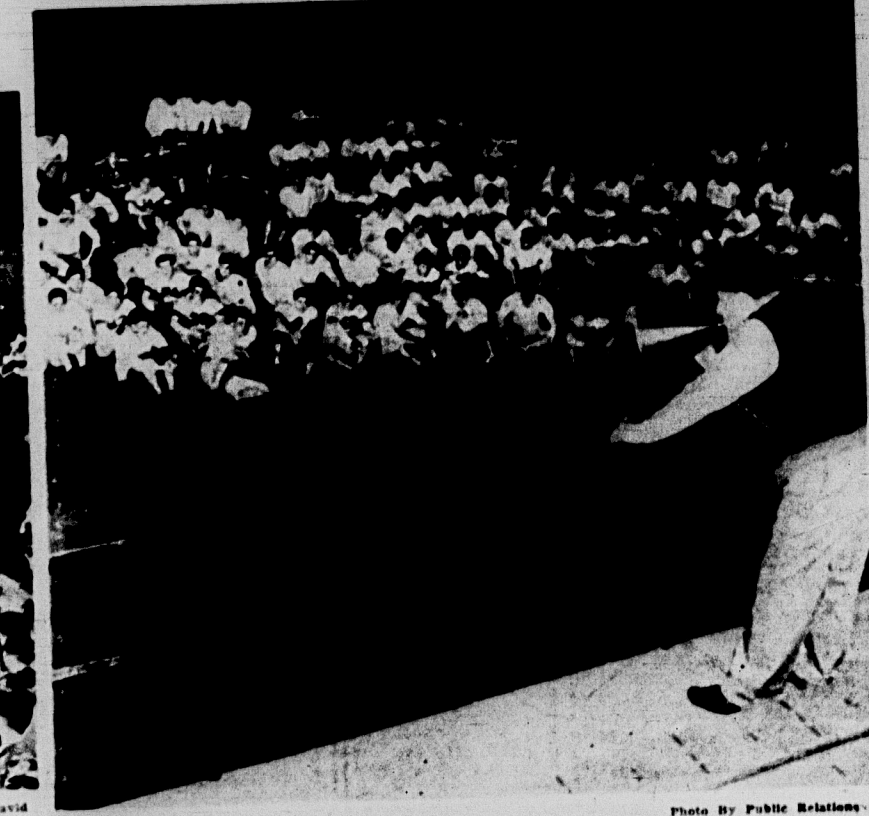

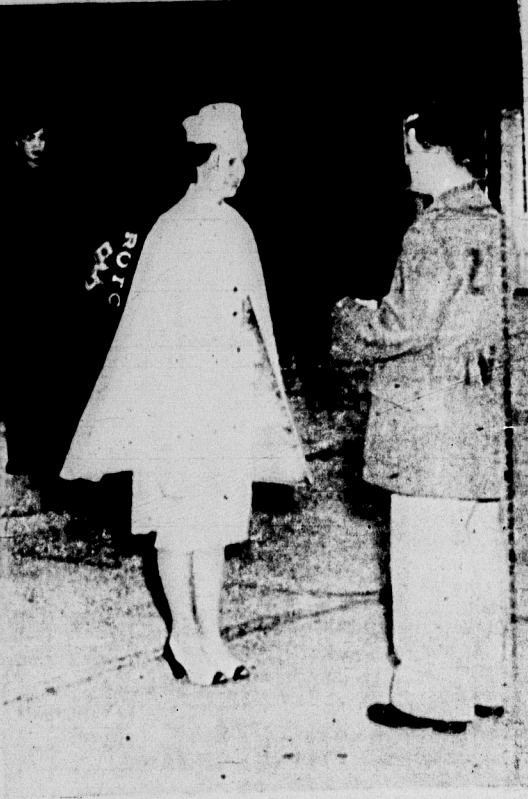


Left—The mad man of progressive jazz, Stan Kenton, leads his brass section in a frenzy as wise Spartans watch.

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Lewis OK's Miners' Return To Work

UMW Head Sends Plea To Workers Following Fine In Contempt Case

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP) — John L. Lewis appealed to his soft coal miners to go back to work tonight after he had been fined \$20,000 and the United Mine Workers \$1,400,000 for criminal contempt of court.

Many miners, protesting the heavy penalties against Lewis and the union, had refused to dig coal.

Headquarters Says Nothing

Lewis' headquarters here had nothing to say about Lewis' latest move but said that he had asked the miners to go back to work.

Text Of Message Revealed

Frank Hughes, UMW International Board member and president of District Three at Greensburg, Pa., said he had this message from Lewis:

"We are today executing bonds perfecting appeals. I do hope you will convey to each member my wish that they immediately return to work."

Oklahoma Head Got Message

District President David Fowler at Muskogee, Okla., also reported receipt of a Lewis message, with-out paying out its precise contents. Fowler ordered men in his district back on the job. Earlier he had predicted the conviction of Lewis would lose the government ten times more production than has been lost to date, and expressed doubt that "anyone can influence" the men.

Deny Knowledge Of New Move

Reachable officials at UMW headquarters denied knowledge of the Lewis message and suggested at first that district presidents orders to resume work were based on Lewis' April 12 recommendation that they resume digging.

Informed of the text of the message, these officials said only that the district presidents' statements "will have to stand for themselves for the time being."

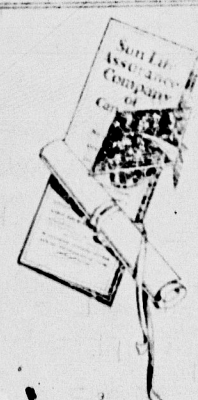
The second semi-annual conference will consider problems of leadership training, house management, membership, public relations, and other problems common to co-op groups.

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U. S. Offers Palestine Plan

LAKE SUCCESS, April 20 (AP) — The United States today made a carefully hedged offer of American troops to support a United Nations Palestine trusteeship.

Soviet Russia and Britain promptly turned thumbs down at for different reasons.

Warren R. Austin, chief U.S. delegate to the second special U.N. assembly on Palestine, proposed a trusteeship scheme for the Holy Land in a speech to the assembly's 58-nation political committee. He said the U.S. would chip in troops to back it up if other selected nations would help with their soldiers.

The statement had the evident approval of President Truman. Authoritative sources said it could be assumed that talks had been held with U.S. Senate and House members.

A British delegation spokesman declined to say whether any share in a trusteeship scheme. He said Britain would not have any troops or naval units available for day Palestine duty after August 1. That is the date the British have decided on for the final evacuation of the Holy Land.

The second turn-down came from Soviet Russia, which was not asked to contribute soldiers.

Andriy A. Gromyko, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister, declared Russia still wanted to carry out the partition scheme approved last fall by the regular assembly. He declared the "would" vote against the new American proposal for a U.N. trusteeship. The U.S. and Russia teamed last fall to put partition through the assembly.
