Possible starters for the Titans today will be either Miller or the left-handed Thielman, depending on the arrangement of the Spartan lineup.

Hard Hitters

Although hitting by an good pitching staff, the Titans' success this season lies in their power at the plate. In yesterday's game with Toledo, the squad pounded out 16 hits for a 12-6 win.

Maldegan First MSC Wrestler To Qualify For Olympic Team

Heavyweight Finishes Second To Dick Hutton In U.S. Trials

By taking second place honors in the Olympic tryouts at Iowa State college over the weekend, heavyweight Bob Maldegan became the first Michigan State wrestler ever to win a place on the United States Olympic team.

The first two men in each weight division are slated to make the trip to London this summer with the runner-up serving as an alternate starting a rally that tied the score for Trainer F.

The game went two extra innings before Trainer F. came through with two runs to give Autunio his deserved victory.

Home runs gave Autunio a 7-0 win over Abbott 12. In the first inning, Floyd Reed started a grand-tripper with two men on the sacks. Lee Seymour, the next man up, followed the example set by Reed and also slugged out a current count.

The two scored three runs in the last inning to overtake and defeat Phil Kaplan 4-3.

Cooksey, who does his game master work for the N.Y. City, N.Y., placed fourth last year. He entered the national meeting for the first time in 1952 when he made the Olympics team at the age of 17. Cooksey has placed high in all of the NAATC since that time.

Stratton looked well especially in the singles events and was looking only to the rounds that were with experience. His score was considerably higher than many contestants that are just

beginning their careers.

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
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
