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## Streamlined Constitution On Ballot

### Vote Wednesday On Revised Rule

Students voting in the final election Wednesday will find a proposed "streamlined" student government constitution on the ballot along with the names of candidates for office.

The constitution, which will provide the framework for more efficient student government, is much shorter than the present one.

Considerably shorter than the present one, it forces the making of changes in the election of officers, filling of vacancies and new duties for the council.

Streamlining was achieved by elimination of all matter thought of as non-essential. This included most election regulations which are subject to frequent change.

Future councils would be compelled to publish all council ordinances if the new constitution is approved Wednesday. In the past confusion has often arisen due to lack of information on this score.

Another provision would eliminate the practice of allowing council "late ducks" to vote in the election of officers for the council which follows them into office.

Instead, election of new officers would be delayed until the fourth meeting of newly elected councils when supposedly members would have had a chance to become acquainted and to estimate each other's abilities.

Power to President  
The 15 council vacancies the president of the Student Government would be given the power to appoint qualified residents of the district involved with the advice and consent of the council.

### door-to-door Paper Surveys Gain Favor With Papers

The journalism department's increased usage of field trips to study the theories learned in classrooms has been met with favor by all those concerned.

The field trips have been utilized wherever possible in advertising management, promotion management and reporting of public affairs. The students have found that facing the same problems the newspapers themselves must handle gives valuable experience and insight into their studies.

The students in Prof. Earl McIntyre's class in promotion management just completed a survey of the readership qualities of the Flint Journal by a door-to-door survey of the public. The students asked such questions as "Which articles interested you most in today's paper?" The tabulation of the results of such questions are the basis of recommendations the classes then make to the paper as to changes or adjustments they would advise.

The student recommendations are valued highly by the papers. The advertising management class sent an evaluation of the advertising used by the Pontiac Press based on a survey of both merchants and consumers. The editor sent a letter of thanks saying "The criticisms the students made were received in good spirit here. In fact, the most severe charge they levied against us was entirely correct and has long since been handled."

### New Council Constitution

(Continued from Page 2)

Sec. 9. The Student Council may, by two-thirds majority vote, expell any officer or member of the Student Government for cause.

**ARTICLE II — EXECUTIVE**

Sec. 1. The executive functions of the Student Government shall be vested in the office of the President of the Student Government.

Sec. 2. At the fourth meeting following the election of new members of the Student Council, the Council shall elect by secret ballot, from among its members, a President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Balloting shall continue until one candidate shall receive a clear majority. Those elected shall hold office from the time of their election until such time as succeeding officers shall have been installed. Nominations for these offices shall not be made before the third meeting of the new Student Council.

Sec. 3. The President may call special meetings of the Student Council upon twenty-four hour notice.

Sec. 4. The President shall, with the consent of the Student Council, fill all vacancies on the Student Council by appointing a qualified resident of the district in which the vacancy occurs.

Sec. 5. The President and his cabinet shall be advised and assisted by an Executive Council composed of: (1) President of Men's Council; (2) President of Associated Women Student; (3) President of Industrial Board; (4) President of Union Board; (5) Class Presidents.

Sec. 6. Each Student Council shall have a committee, as the President may deem necessary.

Sec. 7. The Vice President shall assume the duties of the President in the event of the President's absence or removal.

Sec. 8. The Secretary shall maintain complete records of the Student Government, and perform other duties generally expected of a secretary.

Sec. 9. The Treasurer shall prepare and submit for Council approval, at the second meeting of the fall term, a budget for the coming year, and perform other duties generally expected of a treasurer.

**ARTICLE III — AMENDMENTS**

Sec. 1. Amendments to this constitution may be proposed by the Student Council or by a petition signed by five percent of the re-

gularly enrolled undergraduate student body.

Sec. 2. Proposed amendments shall be put to the vote of the student body at the next succeeding regular general college meeting, or, if the course is deemed sufficient by the Student Council, at a special vote called for the purpose by the Student Council.

Sec. 3. The proposed amendment, together with the parts affected by the amendment, shall be published in the Michigan State college student newspaper or at least four separate days during the two weeks prior to the vote.

Sec. 4. Proposed amendments upon receiving the affirmative vote of a majority of those students voting on the question, shall immediately become a part of this constitution.

**ARTICLE IV — ADOPTION**

Sec. 1. This constitution shall be declared adopted immediately following faculty approval and a majority affirmative vote of those students voting on the question. It shall take effect immediately upon adoption.


