



FDR's Wartime Adviser Bares Secret Strategy

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Eight months before Pearl Harbor, the U.S. and Britain had a joint grand strategy plan for use in case this country became involved in the war, Robert Sherwood says.

The Roosevelt adviser writes in Collier's magazine that demands from "isolationists" for impeachment of President Roosevelt would have been much louder if congress had known all about his secret plans.

The secret plan began in the summer of 1940, Sherwood says in an article in Collier's magazine to be published in July.

At the end of the year, Great Britain and the United States had agreed on a plan for first defeating Germany and then taking on Japan.

"It is an ironic fact that in all probability no great damage would have been done had the details of these plans fallen into the hands of the Germans and the Japanese."

This vote was August 12, 1941, four months before the Japanese attacked. The house approved the extension of the draft by only one vote, after bitter debate.

There never was any organized, formal campaign in congress toward impeachment, but bitter critics of Roosevelt raised the idea from time to time.

Sherwood's information comes from his own experiences among the inner circle of Roosevelt advisers and from 40 crates of official papers, memoranda and personal notes left by the late Harry L. Hopkins, whom Sherwood calls "deputy president."

Foreign Films Are Scheduled


A summer schedule of foreign films, to be shown in Fairchild theater, has been announced by Dean of Students Stanley F. Crowe.

Mid-American Champs Invade State For Two Games

UNDERCURRENTS

FOUR NEW COACHES completed their initial seasons at Michigan State during the 1947-48 school year. This quartet includes grid mentor Biggie Munn, boxing coach George Makris, Harris Beeman of the tennis team and George Szypula, who took over MSC's first gymnastic squad.

Munn was the first to face the firing line. In the opening game of the grid season Biggie, with a new team and equally new system of play, encountered Michigan, the eleven which was later acclaimed the best in the nation.

That 55-0 drubbing was a terrific blow to State's coach, the players and the fans. Many Spartan supporters predicted that Biggie's squad was in for a disastrous year.

Those forecasters of doom were happily mistaken. The Green and White eleven came back in a big way, defeating favored Mississippi State, 7-0, the next Saturday. They went on to build a record of seven victories and two losses for the season.

The 7-6 mid-season defeat at the hands of Kentucky, which brought with it the injury to halfback George Guerre, was a setback which would have discouraged many coaches. However, Munn proved that he had not built his system around a single star and surmounted this obstacle as he had others.

Michigan State's students and alumni are well pleased with their football staff and are looking forward confidently to another winning season this fall.

BOXING COACH George Makris also stepped into a tough spot at East Lansing. He had to send his team of ringmen against Maryland, kingpin of the Southern conference, in the Sugar Bowl for his first test.

State's boxers dropped that opener by a single point. They returned home to top Minnesota in a meet in Jenison fieldhouse and later fought to a deadlock with Maryland in a return encounter.

Faced with a rugged schedule, the mittmen managed to gather only one other victory during the dual meet season, although several of the losses were by narrow margins.

However, Makris pulled his team together for the NCAA tourney at Madison, Wisconsin to finish second to the Badgers in the final standings. Two Spartans, Chuck Davey and Ernie Charboneau, won national individual titles. At the present time Makris is training his two champions for the coming Olympic trials.

HARRIS BEEMAN, a former State net captain, had the most successful year of any of the new coaches. His team, after gaining an even split on the southern training trip, won all but one of 13 regularly scheduled meets.

The lone loss was a narrow 5-4 defeat at the hands of Michigan. Earlier State had defeated the Wolverines, 6-3. Beeman's record is surpassed only by the perfect season turned in by the 1934 tennis crew.

MICHIGAN STATE sponsored its first intercollegiate gymnastics team during the past winter and chose George Szypula, former national champion, to coach the squad.

Szypula had to start from scratch. He had no experienced gymnasts and was up against a schedule which listed many of the nation's better outfits. His team won only one dual contest, but showed consistent improvement as the season advanced.

The future for gymnastics at East Lansing promises a brighter record next year. Mel Stout, a freshman, who placed fifteenth in the Olympic trials, is Szypula's top prospect.

CONGRATULATIONS to all the new coaches. Their initial efforts have been outstanding. May the coming seasons bring them only the best.

Ohio University Boasts 5 Regulars With Averages Over .300 Mark

Michigan State will play host to Mid-American conference champions, Ohio University, this evening at 5:45 in the opener of a two-game series that brings down the curtain on the 1948 baseball season for the Spartans.

The Spartans will be trying to snap a four-game losing streak and seek revenge for two setbacks at the hands of the Bobcats at Athens earlier in the season.

Dieters To Start

Coach John Kobs will start Dick Dieters on the hill tonight against the Bobcats. Dieters currently is tied for Spartan pitching honors with Ned Ricketts with two wins and one loss.

Harry Simcox is Kobs' probable starting choice for Saturday. Simcox has not started a variety game this year but hurt a right hand in the last Michigan game.

The series will swing in the decisive playing careers of at least three Spartan regulars. Captain Ed Barbarito, first baseman, outfielder Pat Pender, and pitcher Don Poling are expected to start. Poling has been playing in right field in the last few games but will switch to third base for the final series, replacing the injured Danny ...

Barbarito, Bagdon Top Hitters

The Spartans' offensive combination of second baseman Ed Barbarito and Frank Bagdon at shortstop will try to extend their late season hitting streaks to overtake a slow start and wind up the season above the .300 mark.

Barbarito has hit safely in 15 of his last nine games and has hit the ball at a .500 percent clip in his present .290 average. He is also maintaining a perfect fielding record.

Bagdon has hit safely in the last four games collecting eight hits in 15 trips to the plate for a .533 average. He has raised his season average from .234 to .284.

Phi Conference Champs

Ohio U. will bring a 19-11 record into East Lansing tonight along with their conference crown. The Bobcats will also be winding up their season's play with the weekend series.

Coach Don Peden who is winding up his twenty-fifth year at the Ohio school, will probably start his number one pitcher,

Mark Weiss, against the Spartans tonight.

Weiss has a 2-4 season record and a .316 over the Spartans earlier in the season.

Number two pitcher, Don Poling, will probably be Poling's choice for Saturday's contest. Poling has a 4-3 season record and also holds a win over State this season.

Five Hitting .300

The Bobcats have five regulars in the starting lineup clubbing the ball over .300. Third baseman Mike Olson tops the team hitmen with 11 hits in 30 trips to the plate and a .367 clip.

Catcher Ken Weiss follows close on Olson's heels with a .351 average. Weiss also sports a perfect fielding record.

The Bobcat pitching trio consists of Bob Mills, right hander, Don Shetterly, and left hander Bill Willet. Weiss also found time to pitch in the last game, posting a season average well above the .300 mark.

Two Hitting .200

Mills and Shetterly are both hitting at a .333 pace while Willet is hitting .317.

Second baseman, Chuck Horn, leads the team in batting average with a .296 average. Horn has committed only three errors in the 39 games played to date.
