

Too Much Organization; Not Enough Cooperation

Single spaced, and typewritten on a two-yard-long piece of copy paper, there are about two yards worth of organ-izations on this campus, single spaced, that is, and friends, that is lots of organizations. And the general con-census—among Student council members and among students at large who check into this office occasionallyis that there are just too many organizations.

The Student council, in an admirable move to clarify the situation, set up an agency. This agency, the organizations bureau, has been trying to get campus social groups to divulge dark secrets of membership, purpose and program. At this writing, about 40 reluctant social dragons have adroitly sidestepped Student council broadsides and continue to maintain strict silence. Which is chaff and which wheat in this two-yards-long

single spaced list of organizations? Why not double space the list and read between the lines to discover which of these groups mean business and which are only chaff? Or would such a totalitarian move brand the Student council-as totalitarian?

The problem, you see, is quite grave. In the first place, students interested in getting activity points listed on their college records are being deprived of this necessary bit of collegium by belonging to clubs of which there is no record, and consequently being deprived of activity points. Sort of the false sense of security idea. Secondly, the Student council is flustered because their records are fluster-ed. This is reasonable. The cluttered state of student government might be directly attributed to the cluttered state man Alfred Oram. of its records.
