Uniform Query To Go To Alumni

Proposal Needs OK
Of Hannah, Faculty

First official approval of a proposal to stir interest among alumni groups for new band uniforms came from the faculty band committee yesterday.

The committee approved a plan presented by the Student Council's band committee to contact MSC alumni clubs all over the world and get their reaction on new band uniforms, according to Dick Dougherty, committee chairman.

The next step toward administration approval will be from President Hannah, who will either approve the proposal or send it to the State Board of Agriculture.

If necessary the proposal will also be presented to the staff, Dougherty said.

"This is all necessary red tape," he added, "but after we have cut all of it, we will have a correlated program with the full sanction of everyone." Dougherty said he thought full administration approval or rejection would be registered in two weeks.

The committee's plan is composed of a system for contacting alumni organizations. Three letters will be sent out by the committee, pending administration approval.

The first letter will ask for the group's opinion of new band uniforms. Dougherty said a postcard will be enclosed with a direct question asking for a "yes" or "no" answer to the band uniform question.

The second letter to alumni groups will be a condensation of the opinions of all the groups; and the third a request for donations for the uniforms.

"Tag Week" Plan
Dougherty stressed that the alumni groups would not be solicited unless it was necessary.

The committee has compiled lists of alumni groups all over the world, which will be contacted. A special stationary design has also been planned.

Meanwhile, plans for a "Tag Week" on campus to raise money for the uniforms have met with difficulties because of the absence of President Hannah. The president, who has been in Texas this week, was not available for approval of the project.

School Bond Issue Rests With Voters

Special Election Set
For East Lansing

East Lansing voters will decide the fate of a \$300,000 school bond issue at a special election Nov. 27. The proposed bonds are to finance a nine-room elementary school with combination gymnasium-auditorium in northern East Lansing.

Registration for the election will be Nov. 18 in the board of education office at East Lansing high school. The office will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Approval of the issue will not raise school taxes. Cecil E. MacDonald, superintendent of schools said yesterday. MacDonald stated that a separate ballot will be used to lift the 15-mill tax limit. The bond issue will be financed by an independent three-mill assessment.

Balloting will be from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. in the high school gymnasium.

If approved, the school will be constructed on North Harrison road near M-78, MacDonald said. He claimed the new building is needed as a result of a sharp increase in elementary school enrollment. Registration for the primary grades this fall was 147 above the enrollment for the same time last year.

Persons who do not know if they are registered are asked to call the superintendent's office at the high school.

Chinese Hold Key To World War III

Douglas Urges Preparedness
To Preserve World Peace

Sen. Paul H. Douglas last night declared that the decision on whether the Korean struggle "flares into World War III" rests in the hands of the Chinese Reds and their Russian leaders.

Addressing an audience of 3,000 persons in the MSC auditorium the Illinois senator said, "You cannot check the Russians with a feather duster," and called for a program of stringent military preparation and internal economic control.

Stating that the Russians are "bent on a policy of conquest and aggression" he added that the Korean communists and Chinese Reds would not have started their attack without at least having Russian consent if not insistence.

According to Douglas there will be heavy sacrifices for our preparedness policy including increased taxation and a large standing military force.

The senator called for a pay-as-you-go policy as the only means of financing our preparedness program without creating irresistible inflationary pressures.

He outlined a program of austerity in governmental non-military spending but explained that there was a limit to which such expenditures could be cut and that the major portion of such spending would have to come from increased taxes.

His fiscal program would entail an excess profits tax on corporate earnings, steeper individual income taxes, and, if necessary, an excise tax on all manufactured goods.

Borrowing and Inflation
The distinguished economist said that borrowing to meet our commitments would lead to inflation and necessitate a repeal of wartime price control.

Government borrowing would be largely through the banks, he said.

'Meet Danger Bravely' India Set For Possible War

NEW DELHI, India — (AP) — A call to the Indian people to be prepared to meet any challenge of aggression along the northern frontier was sounded yesterday by Deputy Prime Minister Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel.

He said in a public speech that Communist China's invasion of Tibet might be sufficient, in view of international tension, to start a new World War and urged that his countrymen not run away from danger, but meet it like brave men.

The government, under Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, has been a leader in efforts to restore peace to Asia. It sponsored long talks between Tibetan and Chinese negotiators here before the invasion was announced last month.

Wayne County Blunder Alters Political Picture

Gov. G. Mennen Williams moved to within 2,354 votes of his Republican challenger, Harry F. Kelley, yesterday.

Forty-eight hours after the polls closed, the most torrid gubernatorial race in the history of Michigan remained in doubt and a re-count seemed certain.

Failure of Wayne county tabulators to count straight ticket ballots resulted in a Williams' gain of 3,041 when the error was rectified.

The official count at midnight was:

Kelly 933,834
Williams 931,480

Just Rumors
(An unofficial report to the MICHIGAN STATE NEWS from sources close to the Democratic state committee said last night that discovery of an error in several outstate counties had given Williams a lead of 400 over Kelly.)

The blunder in Wayne county and smaller errors put more and more weight on the official canvass that will be held within the next 30 days.

Tabulations were continued last night in portions of Wayne county not within the Detroit city limits.

Meanwhile, in Lansing newly-elected Republican state officers hurriedly called a strategy meeting. They reported that the GOP had hired three attorneys to watch the Detroit canvassers carefully.

Re-elected State Treasurer, D. Hale Burke, when asked if he thought the Democrats were trying to "swipe" the election said: "All I can say is that I just can't believe that they would forget to count 8,000 straight ballots in 28 precincts. A five-year-old kid could do better than that."

Gov. Williams has declined to concede defeat until the official canvass is announced. He has made no statement all day and has not said he would seek a recount, but sources close to the governor indicated that a recount would be asked.

Closest Years
The election marked the closest gubernatorial race in 111 years. In 1884, Russell Alger won by 3,993 votes over the fusionist candidates, J. Josiah Begols.

Although at one time Kelly led Williams by some 75,000 votes, the two candidates have not been separated by more than 4,000 votes most of the time since the polls closed Tuesday night. The lead was changed several times and seems likely to do so again.

Nation-Wide
Phone Strike
Slows Service

NEW YORK — (AP) — A nationwide strike of 33,000 telephone workers yesterday slowed down America's long distance service. Most local service was not affected.

Two off-duty policemen and pickets engaged in a minor clash in Pittsburgh.

Telephone officials in San Francisco reported several wires cut there in what they described as an apparent sabotage attempt.

CIO Wages Strike
The strike is being waged by members of the CIO Communications Workers of America to enforce pay increase demands.

About 15,000 of the 33,000 strikers are employed by the Western Electric Company, Manufacturing and Installing Branch of the American Telephone and Telegraph company.

Union Rejects Proposal
They walked out at dawn after the union rejected a proposed increase of 10 to 11 1/2 cents an hour. The union announced it was demanding a "substantial boost." Present wages were reported to average \$1.55 to \$1.62 an hour.

The other strikers are employed by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company and are engaged in a separate wage dispute.

UN Discusses China As Korea War Lags

U. S. May Seek Resolution
For Removal Of Chinese

SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — Allied ground forces probed forward cautiously against light opposition and carrier-based bombers struck heavily at communications facilities in North Korea, yesterday.

Otherwise the war appeared to be marking time while diplomats over the world pondered the delicate international situation.

At Lake Success, the United Nations Security Council has been asked to explain.

Communist China has been requested to explain to the United Nations Security Council the presence of her troops in North Korea. A spokesman for General MacArthur estimated these forces at 60,000, with a like number in reserve just across the Yalu river boundary in Manchuria.

One high-ranking U.S. Eighth Army staff officer estimated on Nov. 4 that Chinese Communist reserves along the Manchurian-Korean border probably number 300,000. He added that two or three times that number—perhaps a million or more—were within "commuting distance."

In Taipei, Formosa, Chinese Nationalist intelligence officers placed the number of Chinese Red reserves in Manchuria at 150,000. These troops, they said, are Russian-equipped and are the elite of General Lin Biao's fourth field army.

Tomorrow's meeting of the council, originally scheduled to consider the Palestine question, may take up the Korean matter first, at the request of the United States. Both Palestine and Korea were on the agenda in the first resolution is not expected until place.

THIS WEEK, AFTER A 80-80 mark of 6-4, we're trying for a perfect week, although 8-2 would make us happy. Last week's 6-4 mark pulled us below the .700 line for the first time this season.

Tabulating the overall figures for this year's efforts, we discovered that we have compiled a total of 40 wins, 19 losses, and one tie. It leaves us with a percentage of .683.

We looked back in the files of last year's papers and found that our predecessor had an average of .650 at this stage of the game, and with that boost in morale, we head into this week with a surge of confidence.

Beginning in the East, it's Harvard at Princeton. This one appears to be a breather for the Princetonians. Maryland at North Carolina. North Carolina let us down last week as they lost a 16-0 decision to Tennessee. Although it is not uncommon for a team to let us down, it is never forgiven. So we'll stick on the side of Maryland. Maryland 20, North Carolina 7.

In the Midwest sector, a glance reveals Illinois at Iowa. The fighting Illini, who at present time appear to be headed for Pasadena and the fabulous Rose Bowl, clash with a hot and cold Iowa Hawkeye squad on Iowa's home grounds. Wisconsin at Ohio State. Ohio State, the class of the Big Ten, meets the once-beaten Badgers of Wisconsin, in a game that more than likely decide the wearer of the laurels in the Western Conference. No going against such a powerhouse as those Columbus boys. Ohio State 28, Wisconsin 7.

The top Southwest attraction schedules Texas at Baylor. The Texas Longhorns, now odds-on favorites to grab the Southwestern conference top rung, travels to Baylor to meet the aerial-minded Bears. The Texas crew is bound to suffer a letdown after last week's upset win over SMU. Still, it would be hard to fall as low as to let Baylor take the contest. Texas 20, Baylor 7.

Gregory Top Ground Gainer For Gophers

Four piston-legged half-backs, who have logged the ball for a grand total of 5,661 yards for the Minnesota Gophers, will be closely watched by coach "Biggie" Munn's Spartans tomorrow.

Chief threat to the Spartans will be Dick Gregory, a 175-pound right halfback from Billings, Mont., who boasts an 4.17 average yards gained per try. Gregory is the fastest back to wear the Minnesota colors since George (Sonny) Franck of the Gopher's undefeated 1940 national champion. He is a standout performer on the Minnesota track team, where he won a letter last spring.

Another top-flight left halfback is George Hudak, 20-year-old junior from Chisholm, Minn. Hudak, who is also the top passer on the squad, has carried the ball 67 times for a net gain of 167 yards, an average of about two

and one-half yards per try. In the passing department, Hudak has completed 16 heaves in 34 tries for a net gain of 122 yards. His grand total of 289 yards leads the entire Gopher team.

Gary Johnson, a 19-year-old sophomore from Minneapolis, picked up a net of 75 yards against Iowa to top all Maroon and Gold efforts and boost this season's net to 189 yards. Point-Getter

Darrell (Shorty) Cochran, the Gopher's leading point-getter, has a fine 4.04 yards per try average. His 18 points stand out in what has been a bleak year for the Minnesotans.

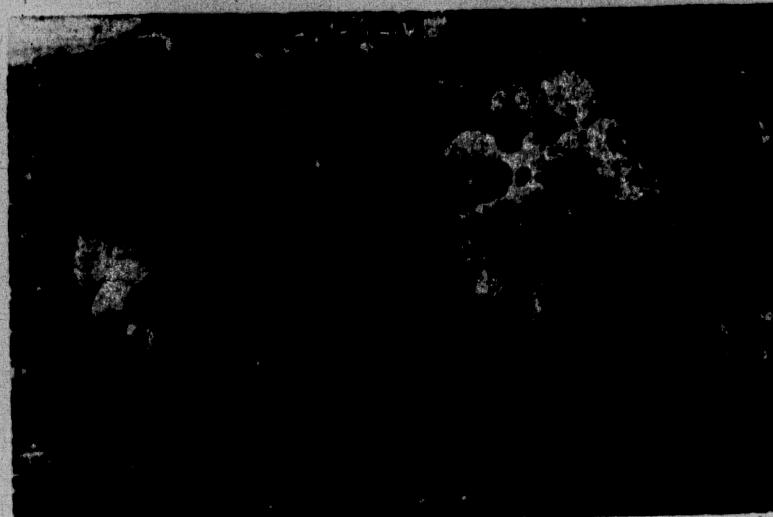
Cochran is also the second best passer on the Gopher squad, with five completions in 13 tries, good for 109 yards.

Another right halfback whose pre-season performance was the talk of the Minnesota camp is Ron (Skip) Engel. An injury has shelved him most of the season, but he may see some action this Saturday.

The rivalry which will be inaugurated Saturday has a background of cordiality very unique in college athletic annals. First of all, Minnesota was a leader in the campaign to admit State to the Big Ten.

Munn is a Minnesota graduate and an immigrant. He leaned heavily on Dr. George Hauser and Gopher coach, Bernie Bernman for advice and tips during the stages of his coaching career prior to entering the Big Ten as line coach at Michigan.

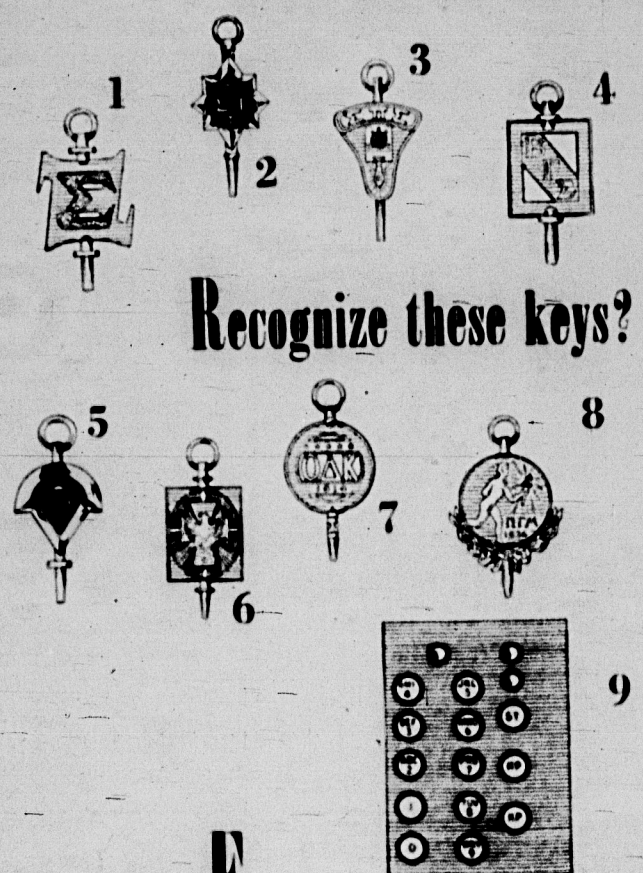

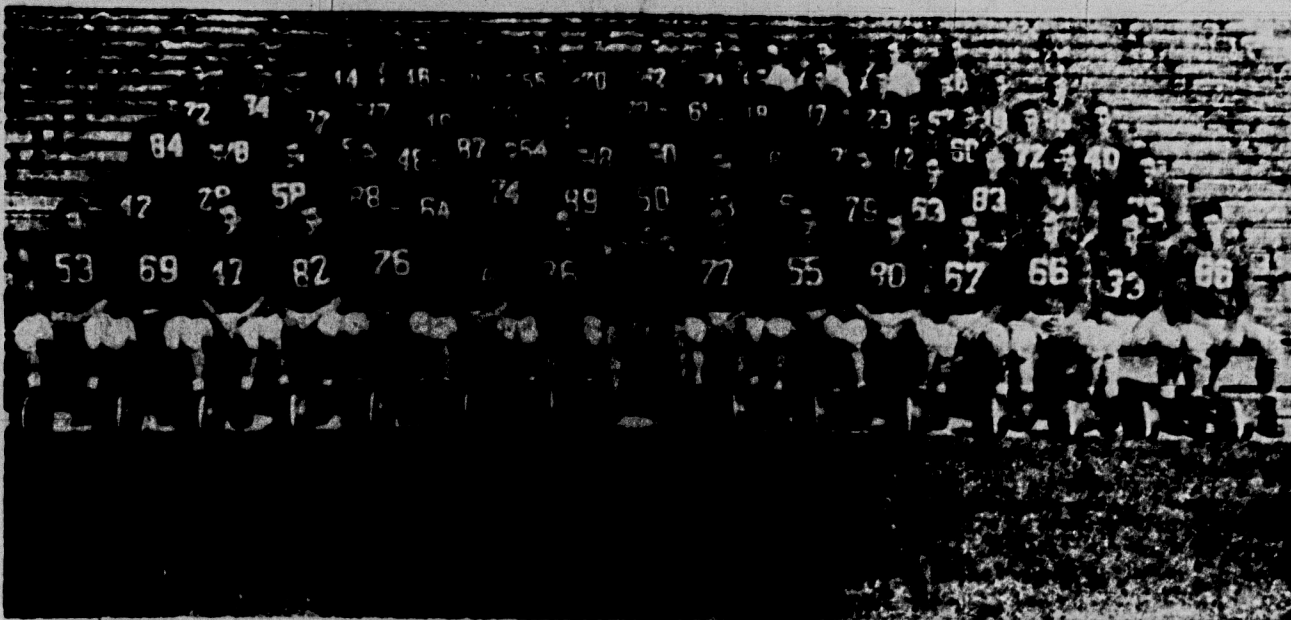

which would create checking accounts for the government in return for its bonds. This increased spending power would be used in purchasing materials and supplies in competition with private industry.

"If you increase the amount of money offered for the same amount of goods you increase the price level," said Douglas.

He also stressed the necessity of strengthening our European allies and securing the support of the Asiatic peoples.

The will to resist among western Europeans can only be maintained if we give them positive assurance that they will not be quickly overrun and subjected to another way of liberation.

"And in its result against white imperialism," said Douglas, calling for the United States to be the champion of Asiatic nationalism. "Only in that way will we have a stronger argument than the Russians."

The Illinois Democrat called for people to forget the bitterness and petty strife caused by the election campaign.

"Rise Above Parties"

"The worst is so living and dangerous that people must rise above party politics. To the degree to which we can do this the future of the United States becomes more secure," concluded Douglas.

The election of Paul Douglas to the Senate in 1942 was one more step in a distinguished career. He previously had served as president of the University of Chicago and received the Distinguished Achievement Award of the American Economic Association.

When war broke out the 36-year-old professor enlisted in the Marines, rising from the rank of private to that of lieutenant colonel. As a result of battle wounds he spent 14 months in military hospital.
