

LFA Syllabus Offers Culture In Two Editions

The Literature and Fine Arts syllabus, published by the Michigan State College Press, crams into 413 pages the history and flow of western cultural achievement from the days of "Classical Antiquity" to the work of such contemporaries as Paul Hindemith, James Joyce, and Pablo Picasso.

'So what?" you may say. "Such work has been crammed into monastic scrolls and brains and books since earliest times, obviously, else we would not now have the material to cram into the Lit and Fine Arts syllabus. It's probably not much better than a dozen other cutural histories of the west. Besides, I've got to use it for a TEXT."

"Well hold on," we say, "Don't slam the door. This syllabus has really got something. It's unfortunate, of course, that you have to use it as a text. That is enough to dull any book. But try to look at someone else's copy or browse through a copy at the bookstore, (anything to take the taste of academics from the work). The point is you must LOOK at the book. You must look at it from the overall standpoint and you must look at it in detail."

"I don't want to look. That book just reeks of culture.

"Well then consider it this way. The college press has put the book into a paper binding and into a cloth binding. Now the cloth binding is quite a handsome edition and will take up a healthy bit of space on that bookshelf you're going to have some day. Really a fine shelf filler. And if you're having friends to dinner some night and one of them happens to pick up the book, the very brilliance of the essays (written by members of the MSC staff) will undoubtedly reflect to your credit."

Now you understand we're not trying to get you to buy this book. But look at it closely sometime. It is really a magnificant bit of work, not alone in writing, but in compilation, editing and typography. Cheers to the MSC Press, to the people who put it together, and to the people who wrote this syllabus."

washington—senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, now that he is re-elected and has a "mandate," so to speak, by his big majority, again has become the samfamiliar problem to the internationalist wing of the Republicar

The "Taft dilemma," as it b The "Taft dilemma," ns it becomes once more to that element of the party, is one of the most interesting things in our politics. For it lays bare the paradoxes, inconsistencies and confusions of our political system caused by divisions within each of the major parties on fundamental policy, both foreign and domestic.

The internationalist wing of the party was frightened and disturbed by some of the Ohio Senator's early post-election statements which, as moderated subsequently, are no more than what he has said many times before and are not out of line with his previous actions in the Senate.

It is as if, somehow or other, Senator Taft was expected to become a completely changed person after his election which internationalists, along with others, promoted so feverishly. The worry about the Senator comes out, here and there, in solemn reminders to him of his "responsibility" and hopeful expressions, plaintive in tone, that he will not interfere with basic principles of foreign policy. To the latter the internationalist wing of the Republican party generally subscribes, with some deviation as to the Far East. As a matter of fact the broad outlines of the policy were laid down with its eco-operation under leadership of Senator Vandenberg (R., Mich.).

Senator Taft's foreign policy attitudes were forgotten for the duration of the campaign when Republican ranks closed behind him. This was indicated by that same political necessity which, on the other hand, causes the Truman Fair Deal political high command to support for re-election Democratic members of Congress who afterward will oppose Fair Deal domestic reform measures.

It is a glaring weakness of our two-party system about which little has been done, or very likely can be done.
