Close Wednesday

Adjustments are being made for the operation of housing units, ice skating rink, Union building and Jensen gymnasium during the Thanksgiving vacation.

School officials anticipate only a small part of the student body to remain on campus, which necessitates the closing of some buildings and shortening the hours of others.

Last Supper
All dormitory cafeterias will serve their last meal Wednesday evening to open again on Monday morning, Nov. 27. Although no meals will be served to those unable to get home, they may live in the dorms during the vacation period. Telephone service will also be discontinued in the dorms during the holidays.

The Union building will be open from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m. on Thanksgiving day. One meal, served from 12 noon until 2 p.m., will be served in the Union cafeteria. With these exceptions, the Union will operate on its regular schedule.

Ice Skating Continue
The ice skating rink in the demonstration hall will not be affected by the holidays. Public skating will continue from 7:30 p.m. to 10:15 p.m. on seven days, from 8 to 10:45 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and from 3 to 5:30 p.m. on Sunday afternoon.

Tentative plans call for the closing of Jensen gymnasium from Wednesday afternoon until Monday morning, Nov. 27.

Efforts to standardize the penalties will be discussed at a meeting of all dormitory standards committees in East Yakely tomorrow night.

Penalties
Dormitory house councils and standards committees now set up their own penalties for unmade beds, coke bottles in rooms, noise in the halls and full waste baskets.

Power to set up individual rules is delegated to each living unit by AWS, which also grants housemothers permission to give out late minutes, Miss Earl explained.

Discrepancies Shown
Reports made by AWS representatives of women's dorms showed discrepancies in the penalties given in various housing units.

Late minutes given for unmade beds range from three in East Yakely to five in East Mayo.

Generally messy rooms collect warnings in several dorms as well as three late minutes in East Landon and five in North Campbell, Miss Earl continued.

"Smooching" inside dorms is rewarded with five and ten late minutes in East Yakely and Gilchrist respectively, while outside it collects 15 late minutes at East Mayo.

Standards committees of dormitories establish their house rules, as well as setting up the penalties.

The committees work under the house councils which consist of housemothers, counselors, dormitory officers, and floor representatives, Miss Earl stated.

This year may prove to be worse, he added, because the longer vacation will allow more people to go home.

Although the police department makes every attempt to check during the vacation, the best protection is a locked door, Pegg concluded.

Not Adopted

Council Group Reports On Cleaning

The Student council cleaning investigation committee reported last night that the interdormitory cleaning pickup system, "crystallized" the situation but was not directly responsible for the cleaning price raise.

The committee was authorized last week to investigate charges that the 22 1/2 per cent rebate paid by the cleaners to the interdormitory council had caused the recent 20 cent boost in local cleaning prices.

One Cleaner Charged
According to the report, only one cleaner indicated that the extent of the raise was caused by the interdormitory system. Reasons for the price increase as given in the report included increased operational expenses and the pressure of Lansing cleaners.

Cleaning prices in Lansing were higher than those in East Lansing before the recent increase.

The report concluded that "the cleaning operation will work out satisfactorily for those concerned." However, the committee recommended that illicit solicitation by cleaners not operating through the interdormitory system be stopped.

Another Proposal
Another proposal was that the 22 1/2 per cent rebate be lowered as soon as possible.

The report was not adopted officially by the Student council pending study by individual members.

Last Chance
Jack Foglio will emcee the rally with Coach "Biggie" Munn and the cheerleaders lending a helping hand. The Pitt tussle is the first away game since Notre Dame and the last of this season's schedule.

If the men from State beat Pittsburgh, they can boast a record of eight won and one lost this season, their best year since 1934.

Syracuse Rough
That year, under Coach Charles W. Bachman, the Green and White lost only to Syracuse, 10-0.

In 1913, the Spartans completed their only perfect season with a 7-0 record. John E. Mocklin was mentor at the time.

Coach Chester Brewer's 1904 and 1909 teams compiled 8-1 records. The only other Spartan team to win eight games was the 1937 edition which won eight and dropped two. This team lost 6-0 to Auburn in the Orange bowl.

Wage Hike
The student wage hike from \$65 to \$75 per hour alone will amount to a \$75,000 increase in annual costs.

Ag Board To Fix
Amount, May Says

A hike in dormitory rates is foreseen for winter term by Comptroller Philip J. May. The proposed raise is due to increased food and labor costs, May said.

The food and dormitories service plans to present findings of a recent study of price increases to the State Board of Agriculture at its meeting next Monday.

Board Decision
Amount of the increase will be decided by the Board. It will be set to meet the present costs, May said.

An estimate of the increase could not be given out yet, May said, as results of the study have not been completely analyzed and the approximate size of the increase cannot be determined.

Wage increases have been the major factor in bringing about the higher cost of operation, May said.

There are also more students being employed by the college this year than last, he said. There were 2,790 checks made out to student workers last payday as compared to 2,600 in October 1949.

In addition to the jump in student pay, a five-cent per hour increase was granted to non-student workers effective last August, which May figures will amount to an annual increased cost of \$72,000.

2,782 Unrepresented

Married Housing Area Now Lacks Councilmen

Due to vacancies, the Student council is not representing all students, Jack Sweet, council vice-president, announced yesterday. At present 2,782 persons do not have representation in the council.

There are three vacancies on the council, Sweet said. Married housing has two, and trailer village, one.

It was the absence of Senator Vandenberg on account of illness that gave Senator Taft his lead in foreign policy in which formerly the Ohio Senator had played second string to Vandenberg's first.

Beyond all that, Senator Taft does have a sense of responsibility. He has said that "only an idiot would be an isolationist today," and his bark hitherto on foreign policy has been worse than his bite, though no one can predict what he may bark as the situation develops in Europe.

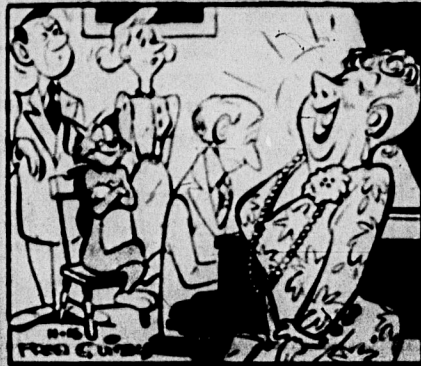

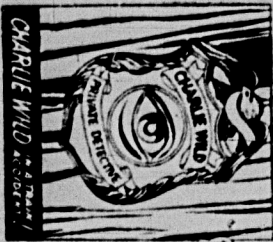

course. He took the men five miles out of town then started them back. He followed on horseback.

Schladermann made the turkey trot an annual event at the University of Kansas and brought the idea along with him when he transferred here.

The first turkey trot at MSC was run Nov. 17, 1941. There were 63 starters of which 50 finished. SAE won the race with AGR finishing second.

Since 1941 this annual event has steadily grown in popularity. This can be shown in the increasing number of participants each year.

In 1948 there were 15 teams entered with 60 participants. In 1949 there were 25 teams entered with 145 participants. This year there are 32 teams entered, with a predicted turnout of more than 200 participants.

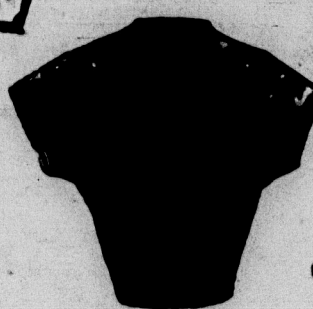
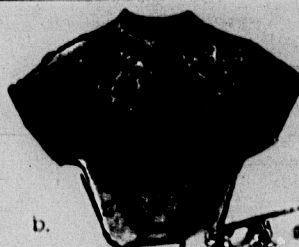
