



washington — To finance our expanded national defense, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce now comes forward with a program that would fall heavily on the little fellow. It also exhibits a lack of understanding of what the nation faces and the equality of sacrifice which that would seem to demand.

The Administration proposes to raise four billion dollars by an excess-profits tax.

suggests:

Campaigns to cut "non-mil-tary" expenditures or, by a name frequently used. "non-essential" expenditures, are familiar hero. They often are a cover to slash at the appropriations committees that is exactly what they try to do—and sometimes succeed.

If you completely stopped all

those things, you'd save only four billion dollars, for they take only that much of the 43-billion-dollar budget. If you added housing, 1.3 billion, you still would be short of six byllions. These things are what President Truman has call-ed "investments in the future of

ment does a good deal for business in numerous ways. For aviation it provides facilities; for shipping subsidies to main-tain a merchant marine; for railroads and for business and industry generally in loans through various agencies, in-cluding the RFC: in the many services of the Commerce Deservices of the Commerce De-partment: in protection to fin-ance through the Federal Re-serve System and the securities and exchange commission. 



Prospectors Add More Troubles For Geology Lab

Recent uranium strikes in the upper peninsula have added a few more throbs to an already big headache for Michigan State

big headache for Michigan State College geologists.

Since uranium was discovered near the Huron river last winter a horder of amateur prospectors, armed with picks and shovels, have joined the hunt for more of the precious metal.

Many of these people sent their specimen to the MSC department of geology and geography for identification, which is the same procedure used by potential "gold diggers" for many years.

"Flurries of rock specimen coming into my office indicate many people think they have a gold or uranium mine in their backyard," commented Dr. J. W. Trow, assistant professor of geology at Michigan State.

It is only fair to warn prospectors that so far, uranium has been discovered only in the western half of the upper peninsula,"
