Druetzler Finishes Second

Lions Win 55-53
On Frozen Course

An underdog Michigan State harrier squad came within two points of upsetting the highly touted Nittany Lions of Penn State yesterday, in the 12th annual running of the NCAA cross country championship here.

The Spartan entry, led by Capt. Warren Druetzler's second place finish, had a team total of 55 markers, to take a heartbreaking second place slot behind Penn State's 53 points.

Running over the frozen four mile turf, unknowns stole the spot-light with Herb Semper, red-headed junior from the University of Kansas, pulling the upset of the year in topping the star-studded field in first place to win the annual "Billy" Hayes memorial trophy.

The entry list was cut down from the original 31 teams to 20 by starting time, many of the withdrawals resulting from poor traveling conditions.

John Stearns, Marquette sophomore sensation, unbeaten in seven meets this year, grabbed an early first quarter lead in the race. The meet favorite and winner of the ICA, Dick Shea of Army, and the Spartans', Warren Druetzler, were close behind.

The positions kept juggling back and forth with Shea and Stearns dropping, and Semper and David Wilson of Marquette taking turns at the lead.

Undisputed Competition In the stretch, Semper's position was undisputed, finishing 30 yards ahead of Druetzler.

The battle for second place featured Druetzler and Dave Allison, another unknown, from the College of Wooster in Ohio. Druetzler edged his opponent by inches in almost a photo finish for the second slot.

Druetzler's time over the MSC course was 20:39, one-tenth of a second less than Allison's. Semper's winning time was 20:31.7.

Wisconsin's Walt Dicke, capped fourth with Drake's Dewey Johnson, fifth.

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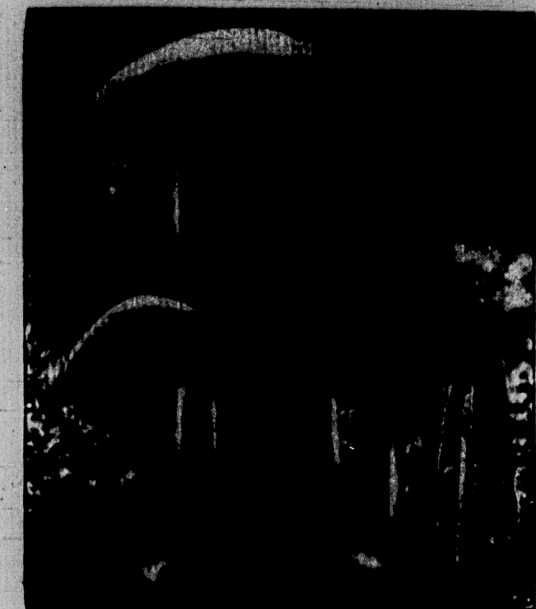

Stage Two-Day Counter Drive Through Lines

'Real Crisis' Faces
Nine Divisions

TOKYO—(AP)—Heavily-massed Chinese Communist troops cracked 20 miles through collapsing Korean Republic defenses in a sustained two-day counter drive imperiling the entire United Nations line in northwest Korea yesterday.

Dispatches from U.S. Eighth Army headquarters said "a real crisis" threatened nine UN divisions which last Friday had boldly opened an end-the-war offensive for the Manchurian border.

At least 123,000 Communist troops—including large elements of the Chinese 39th and 40th Red armies—were attacking in waves night and day.

Fresh Troops There were frontline indications they had also brought up fresh troops from Manchuria since the U.S. drive began.

Three South Korean divisions, forming the important right wing of the Eighth Army, folded under the impact.

This opened a gaping hole to the rear of six other American and Allied divisions and caused a general retreat.

Heavy Chinese pressure shifted to the center after Reds broke through a "no retreat" line Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, commanding the Eighth Army, had set for the Korean Republic (ROK) Sixth, Seventh and Eighth divisions.

Line Breached The line was breached with the fall of Tokchon, 38 miles north of Pyongyang, and a Communist attack on Maengsan, 11 miles to the south.

American, British and Turkish reserves rushed up to try to stem the Red tide, which began Saturday night after the auspicious Friday start of the Allied offensive.

Two American divisions—the 25th and Second—were confronted by 68,000 Reds in their sectors alone. The Americans fell back four miles or more.

Wading Barefoot Wading barefoot through the icy Chongchon river, the massed Chinese Communists were stopped in one counterattack Sunday night but resumed their assault throughout Monday.

Casualties were running high on both sides. Red losses included 2,300 dead, by incomplete Allied estimates. The Allied casualties were not estimated.

Senator Wayne Morse To Speak At Aud Tonight

Senator Wayne Morse, liberal Republican, will speak tonight at 8:15 in the college auditorium.

A strong advocate of the bi-partisan foreign policy, Morse entered the nation's political spotlight recently as the possible choice for a seat on the important Senate foreign relations committee.

Record Shows Despite a congressional voting record that has generally supported the Democratic administration, Morse has received the backing of Senator Arthur Vandenberg for the committee seat.

Vandenberg is the ranking minority member on the committee. Morse has strongly criticized the Democrats, however, for failure to consult Republicans on foreign policy decisions. He said to abandon the bi-partisan principle would mean "the forces which have America embark on a course of imperialism, which is the partner of isolationism, will have staged a comeback."

Many Republicans, on the other hand, feel a stronger critic of the administrative policies is needed on the committee.

Morse was reelected to the Senate by an overwhelming majority despite an enemy campaign that threatened his political skin with such labels as "rubber stamp of Truman," "socialist," and "admirer of Harry Bridges."

A native of Wisconsin, Morse taught for twenty years, and was dean of the University of Oregon Law school before entering public life.

An ace labor arbitrator, he handed down approximately 100 decisions as a public member of the War Labor Board. He was first elected to the Senate in 1944.

Fewer Male Enrollments Are Foreseen

With the strained international situation and probable military service facing most college-age men, male enrollment is expected to drop off in the nation's colleges and universities.

When questioned concerning an article published in a Lansing paper stating that MSC administrative officials believe that enrollment reduction will cause things to "get tough," President Hannah said, "It is something we are expecting and have to face, but we aren't worrying about it."

The article stated that a substantial decrease in enrollment will mean less income from now self-liquidating dormitories, plus a decrease in income from tuition.

College officials state, however, that the enrollment caused by the draft "will not come to the point that the men's dormitories at MSC will be empty."

"When it comes to that point, we'll be training men in uniform, enough to keep the dormitories full," officials said.

Donations Fall Below Quota

The Red Cross Blood Bank drive on campus got off to a very slow start yesterday, according to Dr. Harold Wiley, medical director of the regional center in Lansing.

Donations to date fell far below expectations. The day by day quota set for the campus is 100 pints of blood. Yesterday at 4 p.m. only eight pints had been received.

The bank has its campus headquarters in the basement of Olin Memorial hospital. They will receive donors every day this week from 9 a.m. to 12, and 2 to 5 p.m.

Donors can still sign up any day this week.

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More Snow Predicted For Today

Highways Still 'Very Slippery'

More snow is expected locally today and tomorrow on the heels of a 4 to 10 inch average snowfall over the weekend.

Old man winter expects to continue his attack as the East Lansing Weather Bureau forecasts variable cloudiness with occasional light snow flurries today and tomorrow with little change in temperatures.

Temperatures are expected to range between 23 and 28 degrees today.

The heavy snows forced college grounds crews to man the snow plows over the weekend. A 16-man crew worked Saturday and all day Sunday clearing campus streets and walks. One large snow plow and a road grader were used on the streets, while five smaller plows toured the sidewalks.

Rain, which fell here Saturday, made sidewalk conditions worse, the grounds department reported. A layer of ice lies under the snow. A crew was expected to continue work on the sidewalks last night.

Students returning to the campus after spending Thanksgiving vacation at home, reported traveling difficulties. Roads throughout Michigan are "very slippery," the Automobile Club of Michigan warned.

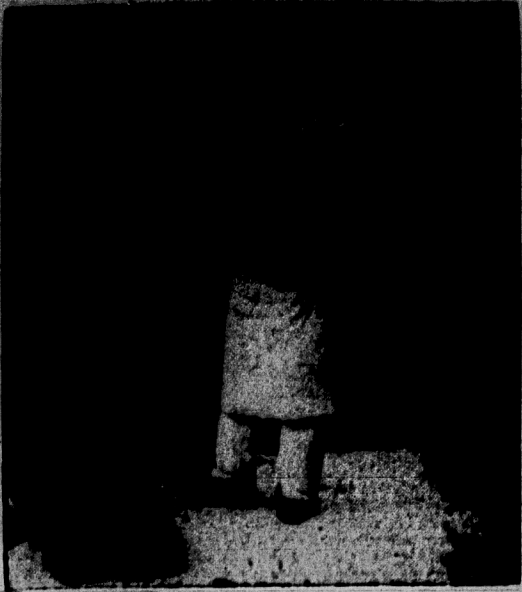

Official Election Board Orders Ballot Recount

The State Board of Canvassers ordered the first recount of a governorship election in Michigan history to be started in all 83 counties between Dec. 2 and Dec. 9.

The Board said the recount should start in Wayne county at 1 p.m., Dec. 2 because Wayne's 1,700 odd ballot boxes present the biggest problem.

Succession Question

The Board also invited a court test over the controversial question of the succession to the governorship if the recount is not completed by Jan. 1.

The sale of colored oleomargarine should start Dec. 7. The same day was set as the effective date of three constitutional amendments also approved by the voters.

The official canvass figures gave Williams 935,152 votes, Kelly 933,998, a margin of 1,154. Perry Hayden of Tecumseh, running on the Prohibition ticket received 8,511 votes.

The canvass made no change in the unofficially announced results of the congressional and legislative races.

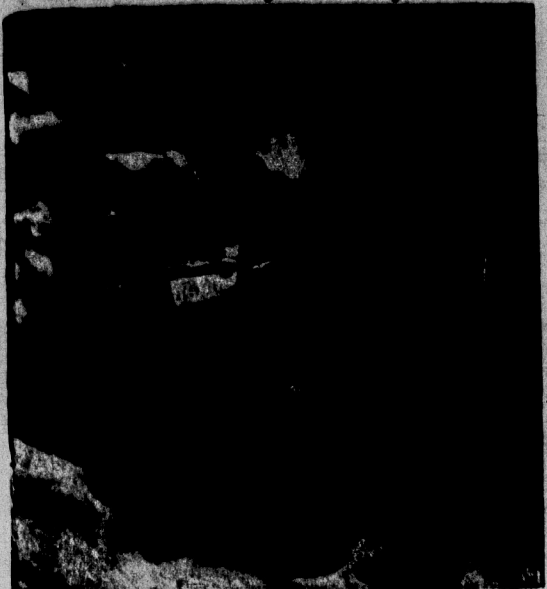
MSC Student Pleads Guilty To Hit-Run Act

Student Pays \$50 Plus Costs For Speeding

Joseph Ordling, Lansing freshman, was arrested Saturday after leading police in a 90-mile an hour chase on Michigan avenue. He was fined \$50 plus court costs after giving the excuse that he sped from police because he did not want a ticket.

East Lansing police attempted to pull Ordling to the curb on Michigan avenue because he was traveling about 10 miles over the speed limit. After attempting to lose the police car on side streets, Ordling took off for Lansing on Michigan avenue with speeds ranging above 90 miles per hour.

He lost East Lansing police in Lansing, but was tracked through a report from a motorist who nearly collided with the speeding car.

The same federal grand jury also voted contempt of Congress charges against Dr. Edward A. Rumely and two others who refused to provide information demanded by a House lobby investigating committee.

The same grand jury last week indicted 12 witnesses who refused to answer questions of the House Un-American Activities committee during investigations of Communism. The grand jury still is in session. It reportedly is considering the cases of a half dozen other reluctant un-American activities committee witnesses.

The indictment against Browder, official Communist spokesman in this country for 15 years until his ouster early in 1946, contained 16 counts, that against Jaffe, 26 counts, and the one against Field 32 counts.

Maximum penalty for contempt of Congress is a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine on each count.

NEW YORK — (AP) — Unbeaten Oklahoma will make its third straight appearance in the Sugar Bowl, Michigan and California are the two Rose Bowl opponents and Miami will be the host team in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1 following rapid-fire developments today.

Here's how the major bowl attractions on New Year's day line up now. (Team's records in parentheses)

Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif. Michigan 5-3-1 vs. California (9-0-1)

Sugar Bowl at New Orleans: Kentucky (10-1-0) vs. Oklahoma 9-0-0 with one game remaining.

Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Tex. Tennessee (9-1-0 with one game remaining) vs. Texas (7-1-0 with two games remaining)

Orange Bowl at Miami: Miami (8-0-1 with one game remaining) vs. opponent still to be selected. Alabama, Nebraska, Clemson, Wyoming and Fordham believed to be under consideration.

Gator Bowl at Jacksonville, Fla. Teams expected to be selected tomorrow.

Third Straight It will be the third straight appearance for the unbeaten California Bears in the Rose Bowl. The Pacific Coast conference champions were beaten in the 1949 Pasadena contest by Northwestern, 29 to 14, and in January of this year by Ohio State, 17 to 14.

Unbeaten String Oklahoma has an unbeaten string of 30 games that includes its two previous visits to New Orleans. The Sooners, a fully anointed new team this season, trounced North Carolina in 1949, 14 to 6, and measured Louisiana State this January, 35 to 0.

Booked Last Week Texas and Tennessee were booked for the Dallas Cotton Bowl last week. Texas' only defeat was a 14 to 13 loss to Oklahoma while Tennessee was stopped by Mississippi State, 7 to 0, in the second game of the season.

The Florida team is booked against the unpredictable Missouri eleven at Miami Friday night. Among the Hurricanes' victims this season are Iowa and Purdue of the Big Ten, Florida's Southeast Conference and once-mighty Pittsburgh.

'Mighty' Michigan Nominated To Meet Bears In Rose Bowl

PASADENA, Calif.—(AP)—California gets a third chance, come Jan. 1, to brighten the Pacific Coast's sorry Rose Bowl football record against the Big Ten.

The Golden Bears were named today—along with Michigan—for the New Year's Day classic. Neither selection was a surprise, at least since Saturday.

Then, Michigan earned the Western Conference nod by beating Ohio State, 9-3, although the blizzard-bound Wolverines could not get a single first down. They did it on two blocked punts and a powerful assist from Northwestern, which upset highly-favored Illinois, 14-7.

Tied In Last Game California, in its season finale, was held to a 7-7 tie by Stanford, which finally played the game the experts thought it could all season. It was the Bears' only blemish on an otherwise perfect record. In fact, Cal had won every regular season game for three years, only to bow twice in the Rose Bowl.

The Big Ten-Coast Conference five-year pact, which excludes any other nominees for the oldest bowl game, is in its fifth year. Here's the record to date:

1947—Illinois 45, UCLA 14
1948—Michigan 49, Southern California 0
1949—Northwestern 20, California 14
1950—Ohio State 17, California 14

Michigan was expected to be the Big Ten's powerhouse, but had to come fast at the finish to win the title. Its season record includes three losses and a tie, with one loss, to Illinois, 7-0, and the tie, with Minnesota, 7-7, figured in the conference percentages.

So remote did its chances of getting the bowl bid seem at mid-season, in fact, that Michigan didn't bother to scout California. It will have to use reports borrowed from Illinois or Wisconsin.

California is a little better off. Its scouts saw Illinois-Michigan, and at that stage probably devoted equal attention to both clubs.

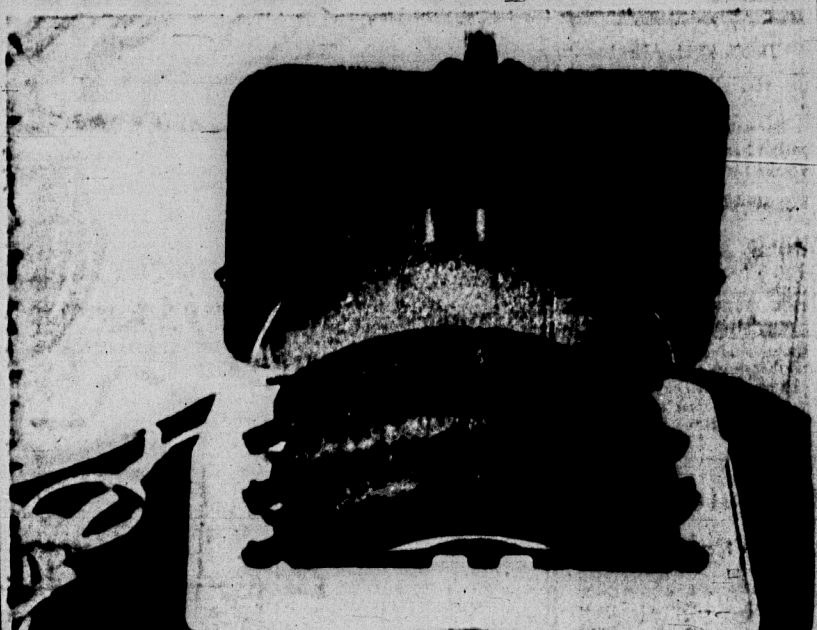
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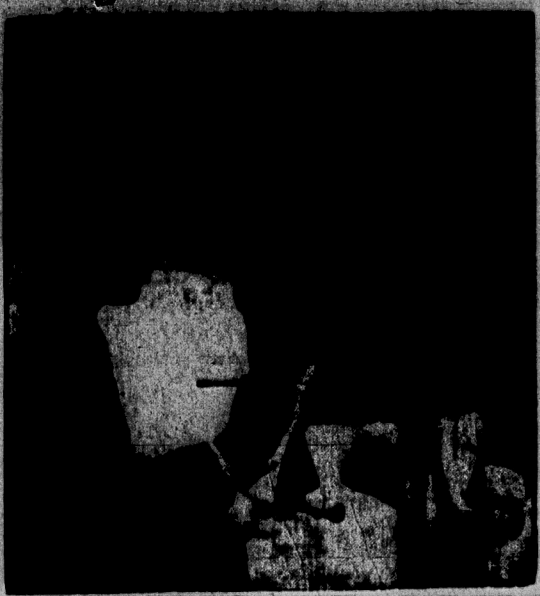

Foreign Student Enrollment Breaks Record This Term

Men outnumber women five to one among foreign students attending MSC.

A recent study made by Dr. Shao C. Lee, director of the International center, showed that foreign student enrollment this term broke last year's record with 300 students representing 57 countries. This is an increase of 34 students from 11 more countries.

More Graduates

Graduate enrollment reached 140, the study showed. With 39 foreign students the junior class edged out the sophomores, who have 34.

Special students and the senior class each have 26. There are 10 in the freshman class and the same number are unclassified.

The School of Agriculture offers the most popular field of study with over 90 foreign students in its departments. However, chemical engineering tops all departments with 19 enrolled.

Agriculture Popular
The study listed agriculture as the second most popular field with 17. Agricultural and mechanical engineering with 16 each tied for third place.

More than 100 students were listed as Protestants or Catholics. Moslems included 39 and Hindus have 23 students here.

Students Urged To Enroll In New Nursing Course

Prof. Florence C. Kempf yesterday urged non-preference students interested in nursing to enroll in that department next term. She expressed a desire to increase the size of the newly organized department to 30 or 40 students. There are now 17 students in the department.

Nursing students here spend their first two years studying the basic sciences. The last two years they get hospital experience and do clerical work.

Prof. Kempf mentioned she is greatly pleased with the enthusiasm of her present students.

Male Home Ec Majors Invade Woman's Domain

Men say that women are invading their "world," but in the MSC Home Economics department the situation is reversed. Eleven men are enrolled in Home Ec courses this term.

Nine of them are Institution Administration majors and the other two are specializing in Interior decoration with a major in Related Arts.

Jobs Available

The Institution Ad majors are interested in the food side of Home Ec courses, especially those dealing with food production in large quantities.

Men in this field can obtain jobs as dormitory managers, in hotels and restaurants, and in other branches of food service.

All 11 men take the same courses as the girls with the exception of sewing, some child development courses, and they are not required to live in the home management house.

Male Increase

Every year more men are coming into the Home Economics field because of the great employment opportunities.

MSC is not the only college with male Home Ec majors, as about 60 men are in this field in 14 of the 31 land-grant colleges throughout the United States.

A few colleges even have male professors in their Home Ec departments. These men usually teach family life and household equipment courses.

And the girls don't mind this invasion one bit.

With nine students from Greece enrolling here this year they tied Egypt and Turkey for sixth place. Last year only 5 Greeks attended MSC.

Dr. Lee attributed the increase in German enrollment to help from the Western German government. Most of these students are enrolled in special courses, he said.

Countries which are represented on the campus this year but were not last year are the Dominican Republic, Estonia, Gold Coast, Israel, Italy, Malaya, Nicaragua, Spain, Sweden, the Ukraine and the Union of South Africa.

Botanists Pick Ripe Bananas At MSC Today

Home-grown bananas will be picked today, at 10 a.m. at the tropical greenhouse according to Dr. G. Bernard Wilson of the Botany department.

Cavendish is the proper name for this variety of bananas. They are commonly known as China, Lady Finger, Canary and Mexican or Brazilian bananas. The Cavendish is a dwarf variety which seldom grows more than ten feet tall.

This plant was brought from the University of Wisconsin by Dr. Wilson. It was a stem or "sucker" from which banana "trees" grow much like new potato plants grow from a tuber.

In its natural surroundings the banana takes about nine months to develop from the sucker to the ripe banana stage. This banana tree, in the artificial climate of the greenhouse, took approximately a year.

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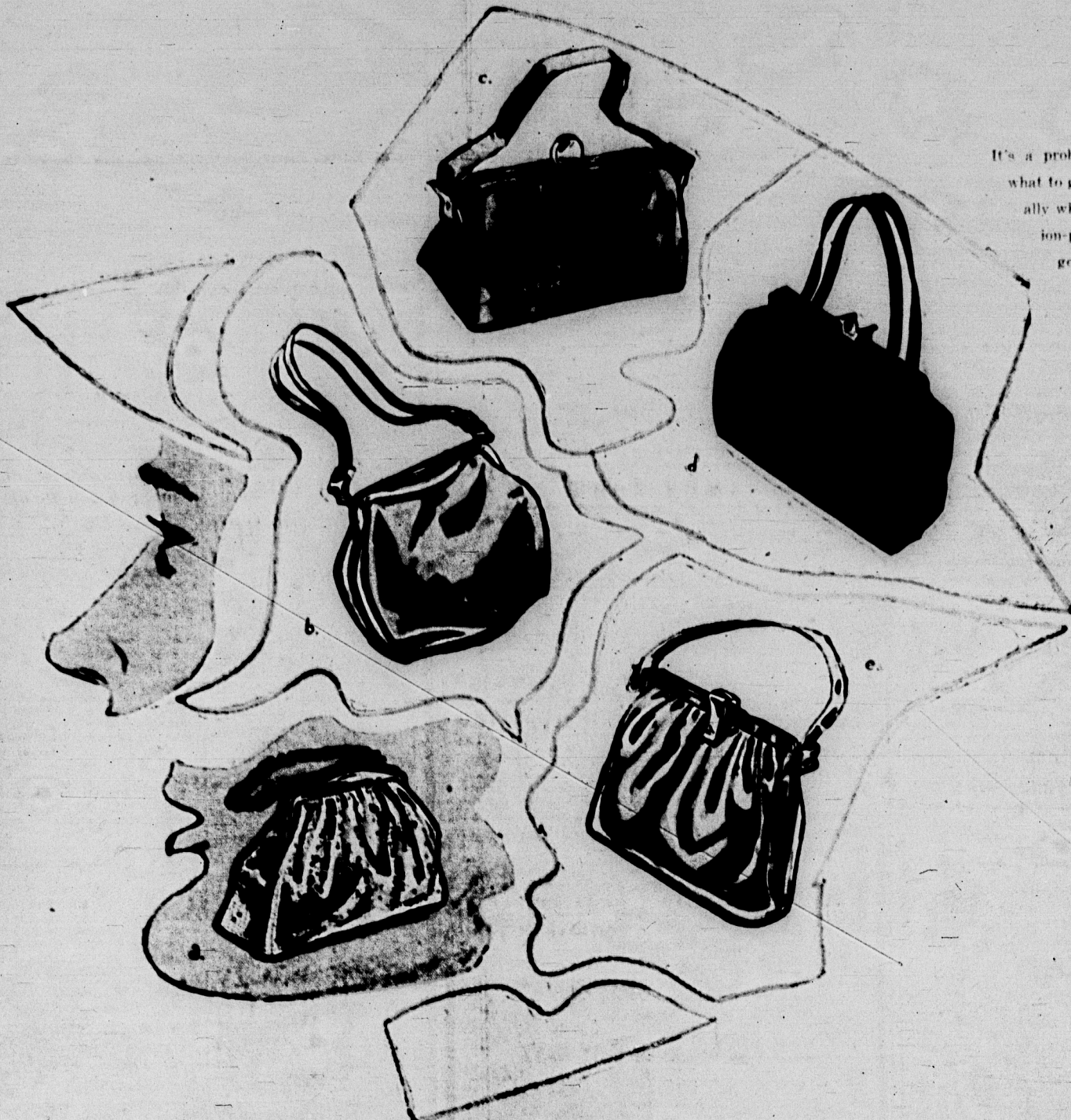
