## Peace Won't Come Through Atomic War

The earth has traveled through a history of continuous crises each growing in magnitude over the previous and leaving the world to fear its own destruction.

Today the ultimate faces the people of this world. In the hands of man is the most powerful destructive force ever developed.

When the first atomic bomb was dropped over Hiro-shima in August of 1945 many people minimized the ef-fect of the burst, quelling fears of its force by likening the bomb to discovery of gun powder.

The idiocracy of the comparison of the discovery of run-powder and development of the atom bomb must be fully realized.

The atom bomb and its successor, the H-bomb, are the most dangerous weapons ever placed in the hands of man and are probably the most dangerous that will ever be placed in the hands of man,

Now we are at war. And the head of our government has announced that

the A-bomb will be used if necessary.

In use undoubtedly would shorten the war, It would save countless lives of American GI's.

However, the A-bomb is a strategic weapon and its use is not against those under arms but civilians.

Should there be retaliation; and there would be; how many lives of innocent people would be lost?

We must not use the atom bomb. We must not use any mass-destruction weapon,

The world trembles at the thought of thousands dying in the instance of an A-bomb blast and with perfect right.

An alom bomb would mean the end of our civilization.

It would mean the end of all hope for peace and recon-

struction. Thousands, perhaps millions, of innocent would

be effected by use of mass-destruction weapons.

Today, just four days after the president's announcement, women's organizations and church groups are organizing a campaign to inform the president that their groups are against the use of atomic power.

All of us should follow this example.

Should the atomic bomb become a common weapon of war the world would destroy itself. It would take a hundred years to build up what would take the A-bomb two minutes to destroy.

Peace is our goal but it must be peace through peaceful methods for the price of a war is far too great to ever purchase a real peace.

Our one chance for survival is to resolve the differ-ences of nations. But they can not be resolved by an atom



## The Teflon\* Problem:

Given a plastic for which there is no known selvent, how would you turn it into a coating?







