The lanky red-haired author came last year to spend his last days in Rome, where he wrote his Nobel prize-winning "Babbitt" and met his second wife, Dorothy Thompson, the correspondent and columnist.



## Congressional Applause Meter Musings

WASHINGTON—It is usually possible to tell something about an audience from its reaction to a speaker. Politicians, at least,

a speaker. Politicians, at least, rely a let on that.

The longress of the United States at in the role of auditonce to hear President Truman deliver in person his annual message laying down his broad policies. Its attitude in rather important today, times being what they are.

A close observer from the galleries, just over the head of the President as he was speaking, could get certain general impressions about the "feel" and temper of the new 82nd congress from its reception of the President's address. It is the applause-meter technique here used, not necessarily conclusive, but apt, however, to be more reliable than the studied statements members later hand out themselves. In the case of out themselves. In the case of politicians, these usually aim at political effect.

Applying such a technique, it is apparent that the Hoover-Talt doctrine of reliance chiefly up-on our own strength, with little dependence upon Europe, has gained such headway among Republicans in congress.

Republicans, with but very few exceptions, sat stolidly upon their hands when the President stressed the need of our Western European allies and of building them up economically gnd militarily. They declined to join in the general applause that rose up from the Democratic, side fo the house chamber tie side fo the house chamber several times during Mr. Tru-man's discussion of this phase of our problem in meeting the communist challenge. It was clear, though, that in

dealing with congress in Euro-pean aid the President will do pean aid the President will do well to lean heavily on General Dwight D. Eisenhower, now in Europe on a preliminary survey of his hig job of organizing a unified Western army of defense. Republicans contributed warmly to the applause when the General's name was first mentioned by the President. This seemed to indicate that the Chief Executive was politically Chief Executive was politically astute in selecting this popular figure. It indicated, also, that General Eisenhower will be-come the key in promotion of the administration's policy with

congress.

There was complete silence all through President Truman's explanation and defense of our Korean operation in co-opera-tion with the United Nations, which he declared had "tre-mendous significance for the world" as "it means that free nations, acting through the United Nations, are fighting together against aggression

gether against aggression.

This frigidity contrasted with
the exultation with which congress greeted the U.N. challenge
to North Korean communist aggression six months ago. President Truman then was widely applauded for initiating the U.N.

Democrats, too, sat on their hands during discussion of the Kerean operation by Fresident Truman. Only at the end was there appliance from that quarter when the Fresident, after saying that Kerea stood as a symbol of right and juntice against oppression and slavery and that the free world also must stand from these principles, concluded "and we will stand with the free world."

The President found encouragement, however, in the ob-viously difficult task he face with this congress when it reciprocated generously with applause his gestures of concilia-ion and co-operation in his nessage. He got a warm re-

message. He got a warm response for his recognition that there must be full debate and constructive criticism and for his appeal to put country ahead of party and personal interests. It was plain that this congress liked his omission of specific consiste reforms, such as impounded to the second of the things we must normally do must be curtailed. The biggest

hand of all, in which everybody joined, was accorded his insistence that the government must practice rigid economy in its non-defense activities. This stirred a chorus of joyful whoops from the Republican side and noisy applause from Democratic ranks.

That seemed to sound the death knell for social welfare reforms in this congress, as did the silence that greeted the President's brief restatement of Fair Deal aims in broad, gene-ral terms. Some Democrats, plainly a minority in this con-gress, applauded his statement

that "in a long-term defense ef-fort like this one, we cannot neglect the measures needed to maintain a strong economy and a healthy society."

That last phrase usually has Fair Deal connotations—and it is plain that Fair Dealers are not masters of this congress.



## Meat Control Controversy Continues

WASHINGTON — (A) — The question whether the government will put price and rationing conrols on meats in the near future was still up in the air today.

After listening to meat industry arguments that such controls would cut production and create black markets, Price Director Michael V. DiSalle said no decision has been made to place meat under price ceilings.

To Try

Earlier in the week, Economic Stabilization Administrator Alam Valentine said that as soon as it could the government would "make a try" at controlling meat

Both DiSalle and Valentine sat Both Disalle and Valentine sat in on a conference at which rep-resentatives of farmers, livestock feeders, slaughterers, packers and processors urged that the indus-try be left free to make its own attempt to satisfy consumer de-mands at reasonable prices.

In a formal statement presented at the conference, the meat in-dustry said increased production, coupled with limitations on in-creases in consumer incomes, would help keep meat prices from getting out of bounds.

"If meat production is increased 12 per cent over the next two years—a definite possibility—prices could be held at present levels, provided those who are responsible for government mon-etary and fiscal policies hold in-creases in consumer incomes to not more than 10 per cent."
