She didn't think "it The resolution was left with her comwould do anything." Last Wednesday, Student Council President Bob Rom-

bouts cancelled the first organizational meeting of a noncouncil student committee on campus that wanted to work on the elimination of discrimination here. The council president reversed an earlier decision by the Organization's Bureau of the Student council which allowed the meeting, His reason was that he didn't want to see a duplication of effort and overlapping of plans. The Civil Liberties com-mittee was already working on the issue. If the committee didn't do anything in a few months then the group would be allowed to organize, he said.

There seems to be some doubts even among councilmenthat the committee is really doing something. Maybe they are. At least now they have a group of students watching them Maybe they need more help to take some action, in which case we think they could ask for some help and co-operation from students at large, especially a group of students that already has shown some interest in the same issue.

We hope Miss Smith has some work to do to keep her busy and justify the existence of her committee. If not, she might as well step down. There are other students within and without the council who seem to be interested.

or manufacturers excise tax that would have virtually an across-Recurrently there is agilation for a Federal sales tax. It is promoted most vigorously by wealth and cornorate interests as a way to reduce income taxes and shift the burden to consumer taxes. The aim of the consumer taxes. The aim of the recurrent campaigns is to es-tablish a general sales tax as a permanent part of the Federal tax structure. The theory is that, once imbedded in the law, it will be hard to eliminate. That is based on common experience of the Federal gov

ernment with tax forms. It is argued that a sales tax is easy to collect, as it is, and that it is relatively "painless" because of the very small percent-age take on each item. But, for persons of small income who count every nickel and penny, it multiplies very rapidly, and the total effect is not exactly "pain-The majority of our people always have resisted imposition of a general Federal sales tax. Only once has a really serious attempt been made to levy such a tax. That was 20 years ago. It failed. Incidents like that create attention in themselves. But, they can mean more. They can be looked on as a kind of symbol of the time.

This was the story of an MSC graduate that made good He didn't make good in industry or the professions didn't have a chance. He made good on the battlefield, about six months after parading down the Jenison fieldhouse aisle with a degree clutched in his hand.

What was the big story just before his on the wire? It was that the Chinese communists had been branded as aggressors. It got a bigger headline on the front page. It rang more bells on the teletype. It could lead to more decorations on many more battlefields.

I called the special story a symbol. That's so because, first, it demonstrated the marvelous technology that is ours, with the story being wired to us from the other side of the world simply because we flicked a telephone dial. Second, it was a war story. And it followed a story that has the potential of meaning even a greater war story. In other words, beneath the story was the fact that almost every technical means for a fruitful life is here, but the world doesn't know how to handle them. We're still fighting.


