



# The Student Tax

MSC was ably represented by local student leaders in the Midwest Student Governing conference at Northwestern university during spring vacation.

The local delegation, largest at the session, secured next November's meeting for MSC. They also pre-sented MSC student government as it would operate under the new constitution for consideration by conference.

Big Ten student leaders approved of the new constitution. They especially liked the student tax amendment. One of the outstanding problems common to all Big Ten schools was student government finance.

From the pool of ideas and methods on student government gathered at the conference, Big Ten delegates concluded that a student tax was the most efficient and desirable means of finance.

MSC leaders found that the \$1,300 allotment they receive from the administration each year is the lowest in the Big Ten.

If a student tax of 25 cents were levied, it would net about \$9,000 per year.

Student council President Bob Rombouts has complained of lack of funds again and again. He has pointed out that the Student council cannot institute a strong program of government without more money. Other Big Ten leaders support him.

Under the new constitution, local student govern-ment has some definite powers. If there is a dependable way to finance this government, it can become the kind that students have asked for, but never received.

# SOG Month Arrives



Dear Sir.

### Over the weekend this Greek found some time to clean his messy desk.

Gone is the "professional look." But it's just wonderful the way my desk looks now. So clean ... so tidy. My mother in the old country would have been proud of her son Phedonis.

I filed notes and press releases. I started a file for fan mail-just in case. By the time I was all done I came across a letter I couldn't file,

-I won't go into the story of how the letter ended up on my desk. Let me say, I have a hunch why it was left there. The letter is from Korea. It's written by Bill and Ed. I don't know either one. All I know is that they are both

marines and that one'is a Pfc, the other a sergeant. I don't think "our" marines have ever been part of the

Spartan student body. The letter was addressed to this school . . . in Lansing, Mich. Just a couple of lonely marines, then. And here's what

they have to say: +

March 24, 1951 Korea

Ed Harris and I have been here in Korea since the invasion of Inchon in which we participated on Sept. 15, 1950. It seems that ever since we have been here we have gotten less mail than any other man in our company. For the last six months it has been like this. When the mail comes in there appears to be enough for everyone, but after it is all passed out Harris and I are usually still empty-handed. It's bad enough just to be over here, and when you don't get any mail from the states, that makes it much worse. So we decided to write you and ask if you would please place this letter on your bulletin board where all that are interested may read it and get our addresses

We will answer all letters we receive and will send photos to the ones who enclose photos in their letters. We are counting on you for some mail so please don't let us down.
