



Spartan Men Storm Coeds' Dorms as Bugles Lead Mass Attack

A raucous group of approximately 500 male students attempted an invasion of the coeds' dormitories last night. The demonstration, led by bugle calls, started in front of East Mayo at 10:15, and lasted for nearly two hours until the students were dispersed by campus police in front of Wells hall.

The invasion plans reportedly began in retaliation for a song parade by coeds that awoke the men at 7 a.m. Saturday.

The men began their attack on East Mayo dormitory, where they were able to reach the third floor. They were soon thrown out by the combined efforts of the coeds, house mothers, and campus police sergeant Al Ellis.

After being driven away from Mayo, the mob proceeded to try to force their way into North Williams, Gilcrest, Yakeley and Landon.

At Gilcrest a stranded coed was finally able to gain entrance to the dormitory with the aid of police.

The rioters, being unsuccessful at these dorms, then moved on to Wells hall.

Here they were greeted with showers of water and various articles of feminine attire. The men then continued to the back of the dorm where some tried to gain entrance by using the fire escapes.

Police said no one was hurt. A few names taken will be turned over to Dean of Students Tom King.



Capacity Audience Hearsowitz Performance

A capacity audience accorded pianist Vladimir Horowitz a rapturous reception last night at College Auditorium. The program, which was originally scheduled for earlier in the season, included the Sonata in E-flat major by Beethoven, Brahms' Intermezzo in E-flat major and Polonaise Fantaisie, Bartok's Nocturne in E-flat major and Scherzo in B minor by Chopin.

The Haydn Sonata which opened the program was enthusiastically received. Failure to keep a steady tempo in the Adagio movement seemed to enhance its beauty and make the closing presto doubly delightful.

Brahms Performed

The Brahms was performed carefully with proper attention given to the detail which makes up the main substance of the piece.

This was followed by the four Chopin numbers. All were undoubtedly enjoyable with the Polonaise Fantaisie and Bartok's Nocturne especially so.

The entire second half of the program was devoted to the magnificent Pictures at an Exhibition, which was far and away the most successful number.

Interpretation Sensitive

Horowitz' interpretation was extremely sensitive and very impressive in both technique and musicianship.

Especially enjoyable was the delightful "Tales of the Hoffmann" in which the pianist indulges in his only departure from strict physical portrayal of scenes and develops a subsidiary theme in purely musical terms.

As the first of four encores, a Scarlatti Sonata provided a needed contrast.

At the insistence of the audience, this was followed by Schubert's "Träumerei," "Sparks" by Moszkowsky and as a bonus, "The Stars and Stripes Forever" by John Philip Sousa.

War with Russia can be averted if the world's democracies use constructive thinking, ideas and action in a long range peace program, Charles G. Bolte, member of the American mission to the United Nations, said yesterday morning.

Conference Hears Talk on Crises

Panel Discusses Labor, Depressions

Arthur M. Schlesinger, Jr., professor of history at Harvard university, spoke yesterday afternoon to a packed auditorium at Fairchild theater on "The American Scene in a World of Crises," as part of the Education in a World of Crises conference.

Schlesinger's talk centered around the fact that the United States is reaching toward political and economic goals which will surpass any situation this country has ever seen. He pointed out that in 1912 we were more socialist than we are now.

He explained that security and freedom are symmetrical, and without one, we can't have the other. Striving for one without the other will result in loss of both.

No Depression

Schlesinger said the world will never again accept the situation of mass unemployment as at the time of the depression in the 30's. He also stated that the country is now in a position to solve its problems day-by-day while some nations are still in a state of crisis.

The accident occurred Thursday when Mrs. Linton was driving. She pulled over to the side of a narrow road to let a truck go by and got into a rut.

As she forced the car out of the rut, it went out of control and crashed into a tree on the other side of the road.

His father called Sunday morning when Mrs. Linton was discharged from the hospital and should be home next weekend.

Mr. and Mrs. Linton Smith, also en route to the convention, were not with the Lintons when the accident happened. Smith is assistant registrar at MSC.

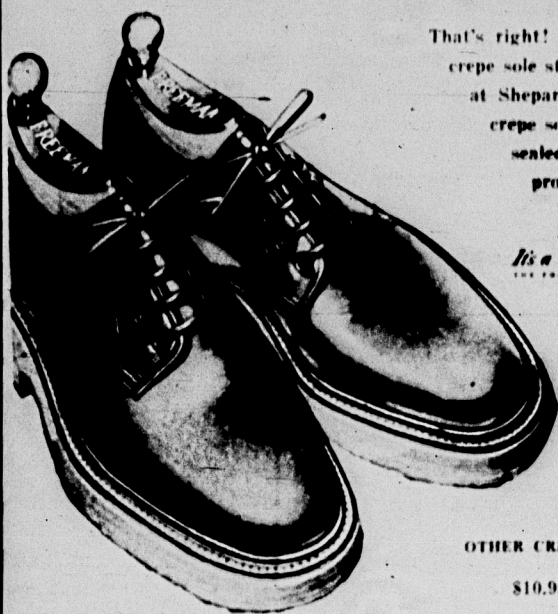

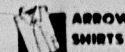

With due apologies to the power-laden Boston Red Sox I hereby pick the Yankees to come out on top of a pennant race that could be even closer than last year when the fourth-place Cleveland Indians were only six games behind the winners.

Even with the loss of Whitey Ford, the Yankees still have a good pitching staff. Vic Raschi, Ed Lopat, Allie Reynolds and Tommy Byrne make up their front line hurlers. Spec Shea and Bob Porterfield are attempting comebacks and could prove invaluable. Rookie Tom Morgan has looked good in exhibition games and could take up where Ford left off. Tom Ferick and Joe Page will take care of the relief chores.

There is still plenty of power left in the Yankee bats. This could be DiMaggio's biggest year. If not, there's still Berra, Bauer, Johnson and maybe the freshman sensation, Mickey Mantle.

This could finally be the Red Sox's year. The power of Williams, Stephens, Drogo, Goodman, Doger and the others must be respected. Obtaining Scarborough and Wight from the White Sox won't harm them either. However, the Fenway park slingers will have to do better on the road than last year if they want all the marbles.

The lack of second line pitching is the Cleveland Indians' big weakness. They've still got Rob Lemon, the league's best pitcher. Bob Feller and Early Wynn will give them plenty of victories. But after that, what?

There are too many question marks on the Tigers to pick them any higher than fourth. The only sure thing is that the Bengals have the best outfield in the major leagues.

Will Trucks be a big winner again? Can Trout equal last season's record? Is Kolloway a pennant-winning first baseman? Will Ted Gray show the brilliance he had at the beginning of last season? If the answers are affirmative the flag may fly over Briggs stadium this fall.

Bucky Harris led the Senators to the top of the second division last year and there's little reason to pick them any lower. The White Sox might give them trouble if Zarilla and Zernial get help in providing the power.

There's little to pick from between the Browns and A's. I think Jimmy Dykes' crew will manage to escape from the cellar because of a better mound staff.

In the senior circuit the story could be different. It wouldn't be at all surprising to see the Giants walk away with top honors. Stanky and Dark make up the best key-stone combination in the majors. Monte Irvin is constantly improving at first base. The outfielders are fast and they can hit. Wes Westrum hit 23 home runs last year and could improve on that mark. Last year he was hampered twice by injuries but had to catch anyway because there was no replacement. This year Ray Noble will be able to take some of the burden off his shoulders. The pitching leaves little to be desired.

If the Dodgers get some more pitchers they could make a race of it. Preacher Roe and Don Newcombe aren't enough. The Braves need more than three good pitchers to get into contention. However, Spahn, Sain and Bickford should be able to carry them to third place with help from some of the rookies.

Curt Simmons' loss will hurt the Phils. It's doubtful if Konstanty can have another year as brilliant as last season. Stan Musial is the only reason the Cardinals will head the second division although the Reds might make it rough for them. Ralph Kiner will keep the Pirates out of the cellar.

Track Prospects Bright

Michigan State's outdoor track squad will make their second bid to open their 1951 campaign Saturday when they invade the Hoosiers of Indiana in a dual Big Ten clash.

Although the squad lost two of their top dashmen in Art Ingram and Bill Williams, the general outlook is bright with a much better showing over the team's indoor performance expected.

Ingram May Complete
Ingram may be available for part time duty. He is currently fighting for a berth on Coach Biggie Mum's grid team and is given a good chance to stick. Williams was declared scholastically ineligible.

Three reasons were given by Schlemmer for expelling an ineligible team.

Number one is that the team as a whole is better adapted to outdoor running than indoor. The second reason given was that the Spartans' outstanding sophomore crop, which ran hot and cold during the indoor season, now has that much added experience.

New Talent
The third reason is the return of additional talent which is expected to make more than make up for the loss of Williams and Ingram.

The Spartans received a shot in the arm this week when Bob Carey last year's runner, one shotputler and discus thrower quit baseball and donned a track uniform.

Two lettermen from the 1949 squad, Zach Skokos and Maurice Maloney, are expected to give the Spartans much needed additional power in the middle distances. Other runners that are rated as solid favorites to make the team are Norm Harwick and Cammell.

Collins, who also didn't compete in the indoor season.

Collins is a javelin thrower. The event, however, isn't a regular event in Big Ten competition. Collins will compete in this event in non-Big Ten clashes and may be best to participate in the national classic if he makes the grade.

Thomas in Javelin

Another top-flight javelin athlete is the Spartans' four event man, Jesse Thomas. He is expected to be a regular in the javelin, a regular event, Thomas may find himself competing in five events.

As in the indoor circuit, "Varsity Jesse" is counted on heavily to lead the Green and White. He is the Spartans' top prospect in both hurdle events, broad jump and the sprints.

Sprint Team Prospects

The rest of the sprint and 220 team will probably be picked from Dick Hansen, Bob McCelland, Steve Little and Dave Moore.

Keen competition for berths on the 440 squad is expected with veterans Paul Shek, Leo Jones, Skokos, and Hansen fighting it out with sophomores Steve Little, Walt Schoeneger, Harwick, and Bob McCelland. McCelland was recently shifted from the pole vault.

Little was one of the best 440 men on the indoor team and is expected to be one of the best in the conference after the outdoor season.

Good Distance Crew

The Michigan State aggregation will probably get most of their points from the ranks of their loaded distance crew.

Senate Republicans Await Address

MacArthur to Talk to Congress

General Plans Speech Before Joint Session

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress whipped through formal arrangements yesterday for Gen. Douglas MacArthur to tell his story to a joint meeting—and by radio and television to the nation—shortly after 12:30 a.m. Thursday.

And senate Republicans, voicing delight at the prospect of hearing MacArthur, called unanimously for an all-out congressional investigation of the Truman administration's foreign and military policies.

GOP objections to the Truman program rebounded to a roar of protest with the President's dismissal of MacArthur last week, and the deposed general's flight to Washington (he's due here early Thursday) fanned the flames of controversy to a new peak.

Feet Swept
A kind of "MacArthur fever" swept the Capitol today. It brought these developments:

1—The house agreed unanimously to a joint meeting with the senate to hear the general on Thursday. Senate agreement to move into the house chamber for the speech is just another formality. It will be voted on today.

2—Thirty-three senate Republicans agreed at a closed meeting to back the proposed investigation of Truman policies all over the world "in the light of General MacArthur's dismissal. Backers of the movement said they had a two-house inquiry in mind.

3—Mr. Truman assigned his military aide, Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, to meet MacArthur at National airport. It looked as if the President would not see MacArthur unless the general asked for an appointment, and the White House said he hasn't asked for one yet.

4—Plans were rushed for a big civic reception at the Washington monument. MacArthur messaged the committee that he would be "proud and happy" to take part.

5—MacArthur also wired that he would be willing to testify before the senate armed services committee some time after his appearance at the joint session. The

U. S. Welcomes MacArthur

Gen. Douglas MacArthur returns to his homeland today, and his welcome is expected to be one of the biggest and noisiest in American history.

The ousted far eastern commander is due to step down from a trans-Pacific plane late in the day at San Francisco—the first time he has set foot in the United States in 14 years.

Even before his first footfall echoes across the nation, bells and

whistles and guns and cannon will mark his return in many hamlets and cities.

The keys of many cities are being for the asking as MacArthur begins a cross-country journey to Washington, where on Thursday he addresses a joint meeting of congress shortly after 11:30 a.m. CST.

After that, on Friday, comes the biggest celebration of all—the traditional ticker-tape parade through the canyons of New York City.

San Francisco gives the five-star general his first big hero's welcome sometime Wednesday. It was postponed a day because he gets in after dark Tuesday.

The program calls for a formal airport reception, a parade into the city, and greetings at the San Francisco city hall.

Many communities off the route of MacArthur's return will mark his arrival in their own way.

need not fear another crash like that in 1929.

Another gain of the American people is the progress toward equality of race creed and color. He said that even though the move toward this goal is slow, it is a steady and sure one.

A strong government, Schlesinger stated, is the best guard against a totalitarian government, and the United States has a strong government.

Conduct Panel
Following Schlesinger's talk, he and four MSC instructors conducted a panel discussion. Madison Kuhn, associate history professor, Carl F. Frost, associate professor of psychology, C. C. Killingsworth, professor of economics, Lawrence W. Witt, professor of agricultural economics, and Schlesinger took part.

During the discussion, Professor Schlesinger said labor does not have nearly the power that big business had in 1900. Unions, he continued, give the worker a sense of belonging, and have strengthened democracy.

In answer to a question, "Do we need to fear another depression?" Professor Witt said he expected recessions, but not another crash similar to 1929. Professor Killingsworth added, "We can keep economy on an even level if we apply the knowledge we have learned in the past two decades."
