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Defense Head Tells of Near Split with UN

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Secretary of Defense Marshall declared yesterday that Gen. Douglas MacArthur's war proposals had threatened to split the United Nations and force the United States to "go it alone" in Korea.

He told senators the live-fire general's outspoken opposition to the Truman administration's Korean policy raised the issue of "what voice spoke from this country on foreign policy."

"By his public statements," Marshall testified, "he set up a very serious reaction among our allies, which threatened our collective action with them, and which threatened our position in the world in relation to this great crisis, and which threatened to leave us in a situation of going it alone."

He denied, however, that foreign governments had dictated MacArthur's removal by President Truman or had even suggested such a step.

Giving his own views on the voice of authority, Marshall said: "The important aspect of the matter is there can be only one voice—there can be no voice, constitutional and otherwise."

In the decisions as to the foreign policy at the time they are given out.

"I don't mean by that that you don't debate them up here," he said, "but you cannot have two voices."

If he had been in MacArthur's place, Marshall said, he would have kept his right with him in the government and not carried it to the public. And he added if he had lost—he would have resigned.

Most of Marshall's statements were in answer to questions from Sen. Wiley (R-Wis.) who voiced doubt that MacArthur had violated directives from Washington in speaking out publicly on Korean policy.

Besides discussing problems common to each group, the delegates will elect officers.

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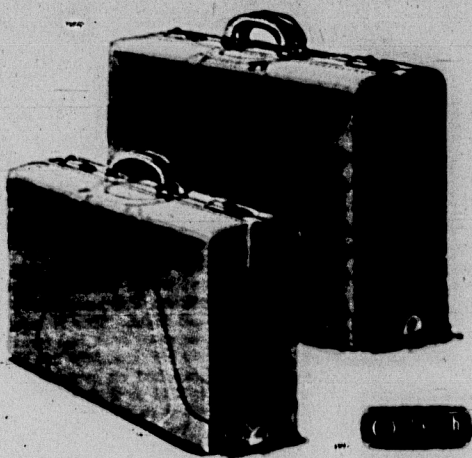

Stokes MacArthur Disregards UN Policy

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WASHINGTON—Sometimes a simple clue will open up a seemingly complex mystery.

As, for instance, the failure of Gen. Douglas MacArthur even to mention the United Nations in his recent speech to congress.

And now, reinforcing this clue, his colloquy with the 83-year-old Senator Green (D., R.I.) which lights up, like a star shell, the whole mass of testimony before the combined senate armed forces-foreign relations committees relating to Korea and far east policy.

Senator Green wanted to know if the United States wouldn't be going it alone, without the other United Nations, if we adopted the general's program for lending support to General Chiang Kai-Shek's troops to invade China and for bombarding Chinese coast cities and establishing a blockade.

"My hope would be, of course, that the United Nations would see the wisdom and utility of that course, but if they did not, I still believe that the interest of the United States being the predominant one in Korea, would require our action."

"Alone," asked the Senator, "Alone, if necessary," the general replied, "If the other nations of the world haven't got enough sense to see where appeasement leads after the appeasement which led to the second World War in Europe, if they can't see exactly the road—that they are following in Asia, why then, we had better protect ourselves and go it alone."

"The general, certainly a great military strategist, here seems to reveal a lack of understanding of over-all political considerations, of the essential pining of the United Nations, itself, which is the reason for our being in Korea, and of the world-wide calculations upon which our policy necessarily must be based if we are to win a world-wide struggle."

This common front, which from time to time may require policy adjustments and compromises, is the very essence of collective security. Nor does that mean "appeasement," a word bandied around too loosely of late.

A general who can win battles is not thereby qualified to set himself up to direct policy which must, perforce, go far beyond the area in which he operates.

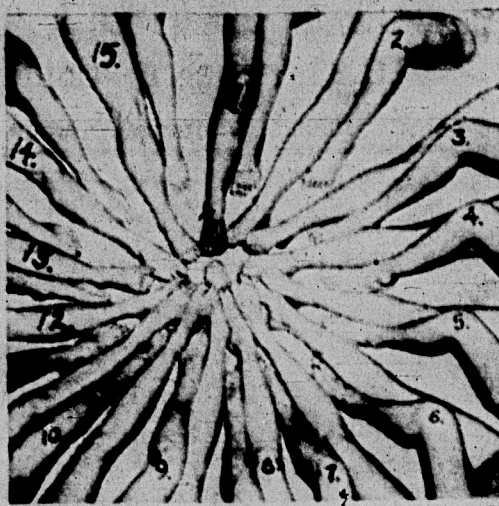
That is what General MacArthur sought to do, and still is assuming to do, without portfolio, so to speak.

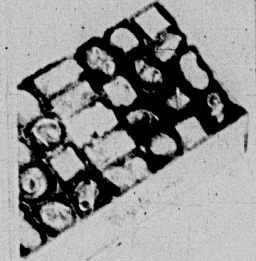

Political Progress Council Grows Fivefold Since '08 Beginning

An official resolution adopted at a student mass meeting 40 years ago called for a "Student council consisting of three seniors, two juniors, and a sophomore."

A study of the official secretary's record shows that, further, the resolution called for a president to be elected from the seniors and a secretary from the juniors.

In the years between 1908 and 1951, the council has increased from six to 30 members. Actually, council (or congress as it is now called) membership has more than quintupled, for election of officers will create legislative vacancies to be filled by appointment.

Under the new constitution, the congress will elect a president and speaker from its membership. The president has the power to appoint the treasurer and an executive secretary.

Student congressmen no longer represent classes, but rather living areas in the college.
