## Green-White Clash Offers Grid Preview

Game Ends Spring Practice:  
Over 10,000 Fans Expected

Football will dominate the spring sports scene briefly today when an estimated 10,000 to 15,000 fans will get a look at the Spartans' 1951 gridiron strength in the annual Green-White game at 2:30 in Macklin field stadium.

## Fresh-Soph Contestants Show Today

Football-War Opens  
Inter-class Battle

Head Coach "Biggie" Munn will view the game from the sidelines, watching each half from alternate sides. Lowell "Red" Dawson and Earle Edwards will handle the Green squad and Hugh Daugherty and Steve Sebo will handle the coaching chores for the White team.

Captains Elected  
Tackle Mary McFadden is slated to captain the Green team and linebacker Bill Hughes was elected captain of the White squad.

The game climaxes six weeks of spring drills for the squad and is the only chance for fans to see the gridiron in action until the opener with Oregon State next fall.

The Green backfield will have Al Dorow at quarterback, Wayne Benson at fullback, Don McAnally at left half and center Vince Pisano or Ray Vogt at right half.

Adding strength to the Green backfield will be Gene Lektoria, Don Cutler, Tom Yexley, and Al Jones.

Opening the lines for them will be veterans Bill Cates and Paul Dekker at the ends, tackles Don Coleman and McFadden, Dean Garner and Frank Kozlowski, and freshman center Jim Neal.

The starting backfield for the White team will be quarterback Johnny Wilson, fullback Dick Pugh, left half Lelloy Bolden and right half Bill Wells.

Other backs on the White squad expected to see action are Ellis and the Western conference.

## State Budget Released by House Group

Committee Okays  
\$9,375,000 for MSC

The house ways and means committee last night recommended that MSC be granted \$9,375,000 for general operations during the 1951-52 school year, the exact amount requested by Governor Williams in his supplementary message Monday.

No provision was made for the proposed new library.

The college's current level of support is the same as proposed by the committee. However, no provision is made for inflation operating costs.

Funds for completion of the veterinary building are included in a capital outlay of over \$1 million that also provides planning money for an animal industries building and a small seed storage structure.

Agricultural experiment and extension services would receive over \$2 million under the committee recommendations.

A total of \$9,375,000 is allotted for the agricultural experiment station and \$1,091,083 for extension services. These figures are not included in the college general operating budget.

LANSING (AP)—A proposed \$229 million general fund budget for state government for the next year was released yesterday by the house ways and means committee.

The proposed budget, details of which were made public only in general terms, would represent an increase of about \$14 million over the current fiscal year.

There was no immediate estimate of the deficit which would result from such an appropriation, \$24 million deficit.

On the basis of the budget department's estimate of revenues the deficit for next year would be \$24 million. But committee members hinted that the budget office estimate was too small and that their own survey, of revenues, when released, would show a much smaller deficit.

## Gabby Marek Wins Ugliest Man Contest

Total of \$442 Goes  
to Campus Chest

Gabby Marek, Harvey, Ill., senior, is the Ugliest Man on Campus in the opinion of the MSC students. He was elected to the title by 140,110 votes in the Alpha Phi Omega contest that ended last night.

Marek, sponsored by West Landon, received 137,000 votes from blood donors and \$31.10 in cash to defeat his closest opponent by an overwhelming majority.

Dick Goodrow, Saginaw junior, was runner-up in the contest with 4,200 blood slips and \$99.75 for a total of 42,975 votes. He was sponsored by North Williams.

Third place in the contest was won by Al Caputo, Chicago junior, who had a total of 33,741 votes—26,000 from blood slips and \$7,741. He was the Alpha Chi Omega candidate.

A total of \$442.18, which will be turned over to Campus Chest, was collected from the contest. The remainder of the 375,218 votes cast were from 331 blood donation slips.

Other candidates in order of their total votes are Alex Tsakiris, Gilchrist, 30,261; Ted Bowman, Gamma Phi Beta, 21,166; Dick Wolfie, Women's Co-op League, 15,993; Don Manges, Alpha Gamma-Delta, 15,414; and Sammie Hagenan, Alpha Phi, 14,079.

Others include Eugene Bonogio, Delta Gamma, 8,275; Arnold Spellen, Wells, 8,014; Bob Martin, Kappa Delta, 7,968; Douglas Clemmer, Alpha Xi Delta, 7,283; Ted Popowitz, Kappa, Kappa Gamma, 7,125; and Eric Furest, Chi Omega, 5,275.

The rest are Tom Leavy, South Campbell, 4,697; Robert Scheffele, North Campbell, 3,196; and Bob Granzier, East Landon.

## This Time for Keeps Psi Upsilon Wins Trophy Again at Fraternity Sing

The traveling IFC Sing trophy has found a permanent home—in the chapter house of Psi Upsilon.

Under the guidance of Lee C. Hanson, Birmingham sophomore, the Psi U's last night won the third and final leg of the Alpha Phi Omega gold cup. It was the twelfth annual fraternity sing.

Clarence L. "Biggie" Munn, Spartan football mentor, presented the trophy to Hanson following the program, which was held in the auditorium. The crowd numbered better than 2,000. Rain forced cancellation of plans to hold the event in the bandshell.

Sigma Nu took second place and was followed closely by Theta Chi in third. In the final scoring two points separated the two groups.

Thirteen other fraternities participated. The Alpha Tau Omega entry was withdrawn yesterday.

The winners sang two numbers, the "Psi Upsilon Smoking Song" and a spiritual, "Norah." They received a roaring ovation from the spectators.

Sigma Nu sang a spiritual called "Little David, Play on Your Harp" and their popular "White Star of Sigma Nu." Edward A. Wynant, Grand Rapids senior, was their songmaster.

Bob Quinn, Evanston, Ill., junior, led Theta Chi to their third-place berth. They sang "Dream Girl of Theta Chi" and "When Johnny Comes Marching Home."

A five-piece combo from the MSC Jazz Club furnished intermission entertainment.

Sunday, May 20, will be a day of music on the campus. The MSC faculty string quartet will present a chamber music concert in the music auditorium at 2 p.m. There will be a carillon dedication at Beaumont tower at 4, and the A Capella choir will close the day with a program at Peoples church at 8 p.m.

Visitors Given Opportunity  
to Inspect Campus Life

A combined program designed to introduce Michigan State College to high school seniors and parents of MSC students opens today with more than 10,000 expected to attend.

Guy Hill, director of high school coordination, and William L. Davidson, director of the MSC fund, in charge of the day's program, said attendance of more than 2,000 parents and 60 high school senior classes is assured.

It is the college's first attempt at the combined program although last year the school held a program for the high school students.

Weekend activities include the Engineering exposition, a packed sports schedule, the Green-Splash water show, Frosh-Soph day, and a variety of other events.

The second floor concourse of the Union building Saturday will contain fourteen exhibits and displays designed to give a birds-eye-view of college departments and extra-curricular activity, according to Edna Mae Walter, chairman of exhibits.

Hannah to Speak  
President John A. Hannah will welcome the high school students and parents at 1 p.m. in the Union ballroom.

Following Dr. Hannah's speech, the movies "Waves of Green," the story of land-grant colleges, and "Postmark East Lansing," a film of Michigan State, will be shown.

The movies are also scheduled to show at 11 a.m. both Friday and Saturday.

Fond Displays  
Exhibits on the second floor of the Union will include displays by Food Distribution department, business administration department, men's and women's physical education department, social service department, education division, and a large number of other agencies of the school.

The Home Economics department will hold a special open house both Friday and Saturday displaying the activities of the students studying that curriculum.

## NEWS IN BRIEF

### Britain Stops Shipments to China

LONDON—(AP)—Britain's labor government yesterday halted rubber shipments to Communist China for the rest of 1951. Aroused American public opinion and whip-sawing attacks by Winston Churchill's conservatives provoked the decision.

### Panama's President Arrested

PANAMA, Panama—(AP)—Arnolfo Arias, ousted as president by the national assembly, was arrested yesterday after a bloody last ditch fight at the presidential palace which plunged Panama into what police called "a state of revolution."

### Allied Tanks Near Parallel Again

TOKYO—(AP)—Allied tanks smashed within 10 miles of the 38th parallel on the western front Thursday in the battle of Korea—a battle described by Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway as possibly turning the tide against world communism.

### Senator Says Mac Set Since 1945

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur was reported by Senator Smith (R-N.J.) to have been ready in 1945 to march allied troops against the Chinese Red army unless the communists laid down their arms and agreed to a free election for China.

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## An Appeal to Emotion

The expected explosive revelations of the senate hearings concerning the dismissal of General Douglas MacArthur thus far have failed to materialize. Very few previously unknown facts were brought to light either in the testimony of MacArthur or that of defense secretary Marshall.

One thing the battle of administration generals versus anti-administration generals has established is that this is not merely a personal feud between MacArthur and President Truman.

MacArthur testified that his views were identical with those of the joint chiefs of staff and suggested that they were overruled by the defense department or Mr. Truman. He cited four points of the joint chiefs' January recommendation to the defense department which were in full accord with his views.

Marshall's testimony revealed that the chiefs of staff were not in complete agreement with the general. He emphasized that there were points in the recommendation, none of which advocated bombing of communist bases in Manchuria or any other large scale active extension of the war by US forces.

The four points upon which MacArthur based his "full agreement" with the JCS were: 1) An economic blockade of trade with China; 2) A naval blockade of China when our position in Korea is stabilized; 3) Removal of restrictions of air reconnaissance on China coastal areas and Manchuria; 4) Removal of restrictions on the operations of Chinese Nationalist forces and logistical support of those forces.

MacArthur's policy calls for an extension of the war outside of Korea, a move that the administration feels would result in a third world war.

He stated that we have only three choices: extension of the war, surrender, or "the present stalemate, sacrificing thousands of men."

The administration war plan, according to the defense secretary, is based on the theory that if allied forces can kill enough Chinese in Korea, thereby breaking down their morale and destroying the trained fabric of their armies, the Chinese Red leaders will be forced to sue for a settlement of the war.

Whereas an extension of the war outside of Korea might plunge us into a global conflict that would cost millions of lives.

Repeated reference by MacArthur to "American blood" and "American lives" must have swung some public sentiment in his favor but does nothing to strengthen his arguments.

Certainly, "American blood" and "American lives" are of prime concern to the administration too.

Marshall expressed disturbance at the possible effect of MacArthur's personal views which accentuate our losses in Korea and his opinion that the losses are without justified cause.

The morale of fighting men can hardly be expected to remain at a high level if their commander expresses the opinion that their suffering is wasted.

General MacArthur's ability as a public speaker cannot be overlooked; he is a hero to the public, his use of phrases that stir the public is unsurpassed, and his manner is awe-inspiring.

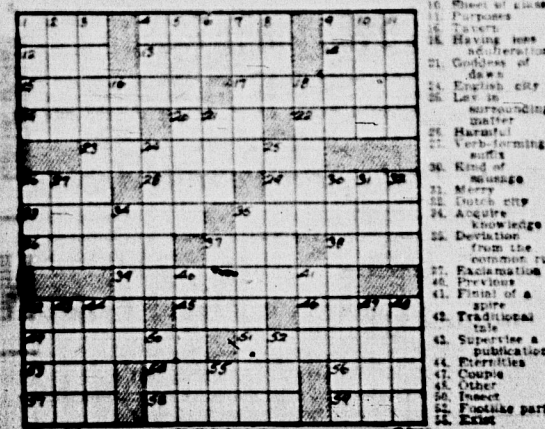
But, in deciding the merits of conflicting views, it is wise to ignore statements that do little more than arouse the emotions.

### Reds Crack

### Down on Students

TO THE EDITOR:

On the assumption that you might be interested I am sending you some excerpts from letters which I have received recently from former students now in Hongkong.

"It has been about a year since I last wrote you while I was in Hongkong. There were times when I have thought of writing you, but being under the Communist regime, it was difficult to express my thoughts freely in letters because they were often being censored.

"I was studying hard in the Lingnan medical school and tried my best to stay out of politics but it was impossible to do so because every student was assigned to act according to the order of the government.

"We were forced to do all kinds of propaganda work for them. The non-participants were considered not neutral but reactionary. Under such circumstances one had to obey if one wished to stay under their regime without getting into trouble. Recently, the Communists enforced a new regulation on the exit and entry permits, which changed the bamboo curtain into an iron curtain.

"Had I gone back to finish my medical education, I would not be able to leave China so I did not think it was wise for me to continue studying with such a task.

"If I had completed my medical education, I am sure that I would have to serve on the Korean front since many of the medical staff of our hospital have already been forced into it. If I had to serve, I would rather serve Uncle Sam and not the Communists."

In another letter from Hongkong, also written by an MSC graduate, there is a paragraph that reads as follows:

"A meeting for the university students in Canton was called by the Communist government for the purpose of deciding what to do with the American doctors in the area. A resolution to stone them to death was turned down."

Messages such as these should give food for thought to every one concerned, not least to those who have red, pink, or near pink brains.
