#### Caught Between

MSC and the University of Michigan are caught between two pincers when it comes to televising football games. Caught to the extent that direct television of football in any form will be impossible.

Here is the situation: The Western conference has a standing ruling that there will be no television broadcasts

The Big Ten makes two exceptions. 1) Certain games, decided at the discretion of the conference, can be televised over regular channels. 2) Closed circuit hook-ups, to a movie theater for instance, and delayed

TV movies, are okay.
On the other hand, the Michigan state legislature passed a resolution last week stating that no college could televise any sports event over a closed circuit to a paid audience.

This resolution was aimed primarily at the University of Michigan, legislators say, because of its practice of granting football television rights over a closed circuit to a paid

theater audience. So that is the situation. MSC as yet has not contracted

for any closed circuit TV broadcasts.

The Big Ten ban was approved because it was felt that general televising of football games would cut down on gate receipts. They have figures to substantiate their claims, and we are inclined to agree with

The legislature, on the other hand, apparently feels that no single business concern such as a movie house should reap exclusive profits from the televising of state-supported football. They believe that a state-supported institution should provide "a minimum return to the taxpayers who support it." Likewise a good point.

Television is a new medium of communication. When the kinks are worked out, it can be used to ad-

We hope the Western conference and the Michigan legislature do not consider the matter closed. We hope that standing committees from both groups will be set up, if they are not already, to investigate the matter

And we hope the day will come when TV can be used to an advantage to broadcast Spartan sports

WAKEFIELD, N:H .- (A) - The folks of this 177-yearold rural community -- 1,256 residents -- don't want President Truman impeached.


They made their views known at a special town meeting ralled last night to vote on the question:


Ten signatures were necessary to call the meeting. Sparhawk said 50 residents signed the petition.

## **Issues May** Lack Punch for 1952

WASHINGTON-An interesting paradox about the jockeying now going on here over the 1952 presidential election is that the central figures and issues now uppermost may play little part in that event. There is the illusion of shadow-boxing by straw men which is, nevertheless, fascinat-ing to watch.

President Truman, for example is the chief target of Republicans. Preponderant opinion now, however, is that he won't be a candidate unless, as some Republicans are saying and not facetiously, they, themselves, make him one.

Senator Taft of Ohio certainly is at this stage the leading candidate for the Republican nomination and concurrently, by that token, the heloved whipping boy of the Democrats. President Truman periodically throws a jab into him to keep him the symbol of Republicanism for Democratic purposes.

But there is no certainty that he will be the Republican nomi-nee; in fact, he may have reach-ed his peak already too far ahead of the convention.

And, as for the overwhellming issue at the moment, the Kor-ean war, it is probable that it will be over before next year's elections, and thus will lack the explosive qualities it concur-rently embodies as a political isrently embodies as a political is-

Something significant happened yesterday. That something was Dr. Rasch Bunche, UN official, appearing on the Auditorium stage

It wasn't significant because of:

1. A world problem being solved

2. A startling announcement being made

3. Or even anything new being said.

None of the above occurred. For those who were looking for a stout hook to hang a hat or a troubled mind on, the whole talk probably was a failure.

But it did have great merit. That merit lies in the fact that a top-leader in the world of international affairs on a MICHIGAN STATE COLLEGE stage. And MICHI-GAN STATE COLLEGE students could hear him, be stimulated by him, and attempt to think out the vital problems he flipped in their laps.

Sure, only a small percentage of the student body was at the Aud. Some of them even draped their bare legs and tootsies over the balcony above me while they listened.

I'm glad they didn't get excited and land in my lap along with Bunche's ideas. But even these students, untrained in the manner in which to act before a statesman, learned a great deal.

Bunche laid the workings of an often misunderstood and more often little cared about organization right on that

He made the UN human

He made international relations a personal problem.

He made Michigan State students think.

Dr. Bunche didn't have all the answers. No man, regardless of stature, could. But he did have a full comprehension of the problems facing this nation.

These problems included the acknowledged weaknesses in the UN, the difference between what American democratic ideals dictate an dhow they're followed, and most dramatic at this time, will the Korean war lead to world

Bunche looked at these issues and said he was optimistic. But not through "blind faith."

He didn't say there absolutely would not be a world war He did say the UN has thus far prevented world conflict and should be looked to in the future as an instrumentality that could continue to prevent a world war

But people in this nation must believe that peace is pos-They must step off the magic carpet of "we can live with the world or beat the heck out of it and let it live

Bunche said we need friends. And he laid much of the responsibility of spreading that idea on educational institutions. "Educational institutions can do a great deal in shaping
