Jebb Says Action 'Inflammatory,'

TEHRAN, Iran—(AP)—Britain bowed to Premier Mossadegh's "get-out" ultimatum yesterday and ordered all her 350 men to evacuate the refinery at Abadan without waiting for action by the United Nations Security Council.

Columnist Flays Union Leaders

DETROIT—(AP)—Columnist Westbrook Pegler charged yesterday that Walter Reuther is "trying to buy his way out of the White House in 1956 with money extorted from labor."

Reuther would succeed, said Pegler, he would "impose the kind of tyranny that reigns in the United Auto Workers and the CIO."

Reuther, President of the UAW, said yesterday that he has spent his life in the labor movement. Pegler, one of America's most outspoken critics of union leaders, addressed an overflow crowd at an Economic Club of Detroit luncheon.

Draft Deferment Exam Announced for December 13

Enrollment of 13,428 Announced

There are now 13,428 students enrolled at Michigan State College, according to statistics issued by the Registrar's Office. An increase of 150 is expected before Oct. 22, when Agricultural Short Course students will have enrolled. The enrollment makes an overall decrease from the total of last fall by 9.4 percent.

"This decrease is felt all over the nation because of the low national birth rate in the early 1930s," Registrar Robert S. Linton stated.

"Original predictions for this fall's enrollment were 12,500. The increase over the prediction can be attributed to the stabilization of the international situation, the draft deferment program, and the ROTC program at MSC," Linton added.

The figures show that this year there are 1,542 fewer men registered than in 1950. However, there are now 977 more women on the campus than at this time last year.

Second Place Bears Edged by 64 Points

Michigan State's football Spartans yesterday were ranked as the number one college team in the nation in The Associated Press poll for the first time in the college's history. After the Michigan-Michigan State game last year, the Spartans advanced to second place in the poll, but dropped to eighth in final ratings for the year.

NEW YORK—(AP)—Michigan State College, one of the nation's leading independent football powers, yesterday was ranked as the number one team in the first weekly Associated Press nation-wide poll of the young season.

Coach Biggie Munn's Spartans from East Lansing, who spanked Michigan, their home state rivals, 25-0 last week, edged out the Golden Bears of California for first place.

The Bears took the runner-up spot by a sparse 28 votes from Tennessee, the team which was accorded the number one spot in a pre-season poll Sept. 10. In last month's balloting, Michigan State was rated the number two outfit.

UN Forces Inch Ahead in Korea

Bradley Makes
Inspection Tour

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA — (AP) — Allied infantrymen, pushing forward in an autumn offensive, partly cleared a Communist ridge line on the Korean central front Monday and inched forward in hand-to-hand combat in the East.

Hard fighting was under way as America's top military leader, Gen. Omar Bradley, made a close-hand inspection of the eastern front and Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters announced the readiness of the Eighth Army "to strike and strike hard," if the Reds insist on all-out war.

The air war raged on Monday with U.S. Fifth Air Force headquarters announcing one Russian-built MIG-15 shot down and three more damaged in a series of dog-fights over North Korea's MIG Alley. No Allied losses were reported. The air battles involved 27 U.S. F-86 Sabre Jets and about 40 Soviet MIGs.

Bradley, wearing battle dress with a gun and canteen slung from his web belt, was in Korea for a brief "survey of the situation." The chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff was accompanied by Ridgway, Supreme Allied Commander, Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U.S. Eighth Army Commander, and Charles "Chip" Bohlen, State Department Adviser on Russia.

Any Relief? Coeds Crowd Seven Dorms; Fill Rec Room

About 100 women are calling the recreation rooms in London, Yakeley, Campbell and Gilchrist dormitories home, according to Richard A. Geer, director of housing.

From past records it appears that the recreation rooms will not be completely empty until the end of fall term. Many of the women assigned to recreation rooms have been moved into single, double, or triple rooms as vacancies appeared to make room for the 90 students previously living in south campus short course housing, Geer stated.

Wells Hall, the converted men's dorm, now houses about 204 women. Of these about 30 are graduate students. Last year, 200 undergraduate women lived in Wells.

The following dormitories are filled to capacity: Campbell, 433; Mayo, 324; Williams, 374; London, 454; Yakeley, 465; Gilchrist, 278; and Wells, 204. About 100 women live in co-operative housing. The total is 2,638.

Approximately 3,303 men live in dormitories this year. East and West Shaw hold 1,100 students while 1,122 men live in Snyder-Phillips, and 1,081 in Mason-Abbott, according to Geer.

DULLES SAYS TRUMAN KNEW CONSEQUENCES

Jap Treaty Might Provoke War

GATLINBURG, Tenn.—(AP)—John Foster Dulles said yesterday President Truman made a "solemn and necessary decision" to sign a Japanese peace treaty with the knowledge it might provoke Russia and Communist China to "open war."

That was a risk which the President and his responsible advisers weighed, Dulles said. "To have given in to the threats would have been to invite immeasurable disaster. They did not give in, but went ahead."

Dulles, Republican adviser to Secretary of State Acheson and

chief architect of the Japanese treaty, told of the decision in an address prepared for delivery before the annual governors' conference.

He cited this as an example of the "courage" that was required to push ahead with the Japanese peace pact in the face of Communist propaganda threats of "active war against Japan."

"We could not tell certainly whether or not this was a bluff or a serious menace," he continued. "Those best qualified to judge felt there was at least some risk that the Soviet Union and Communist China

would make Japan's signature of a peace treaty and a security treaty the pretext for re-activating open war."

President Truman's decision to go ahead, Dulles said, was a solemn and necessary decision, which required courage, but it equally called for an avoidance of recklessness.

"There was a duty to proceed in a way that would reduce the risk of the awful disaster of general war. We believed that the risk would be reduced if the peace obtained general world approval."

Over-Optimism

It's here at last. Michigan State's Spartans have finally reached the pinnacle of weekly football success, the top slot on The Associated Press football poll.

State, rated anywhere from second to eighth in pre-season polls, grabbed first on the strength of Saturday's somewhat surprisingly strong 25-0 triumph over the University of Michigan.

And well they might have, for the whole thing is just one more tribute to the caliber of athletics developed at Michigan State in the past five years.

The credit belongs to no one man. Nobody in any way connected with MSC would venture to say that such an accomplishment was the work of one man. Rather, the accomplishment belongs to the combined efforts of many men, men with one idea in mind—the interests of Michigan State College.

Certainly some credit belongs to Coach Clarence "Biggie" Munn, who brought the Spartans from a 55-0 defeat at the hands of Michigan in his first year at the helm to a 25-0 victory.

Certainly some credit belongs to President John A. Hannah, who looked ahead to these years. Certainly some of the credit belongs to MSC's faculty representative to the Big Ten, Lloyd C. Emmons.

But most of all, and we feel that these men will agree with us, the credit goes to the men who actually performed the task—members of the football teams that pushed Michigan State to the top of the grid heap.

We aren't referring only to this year's team. They crowned the achievement of men like Gene Glick, Lynn Chandois, Don Mason, Ed Bagdon, Everett "Sonny" Grandelius, John Yocca, Dorne Dibble, LeRoy Crane, and a host of others.

There the credit belongs. But AP poll honors can be a fleeting thing. Seven football games fill as many Saturdays this fall. On any given Saturday, a team in the top slot can fall to an even keel with spearhead teachers.

We won't go so far as to say this is State's fate, but over-optimism a week before the Ohio State game is not the easy way to win a football game.

Prayer Wins in UN

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.—It is reasonably certain at this writing that there will be a room in the permanent United Nations home for prayer and meditation, to be opened perhaps next year.

Thus, those who believe there should be some religious observance in the United Nations have won a small but important victory over those who object, or those who, like the Russians, are merely indifferent.

There has been in the past months a grim little fight behind the scenes in the UN, where some atheists and agnostics have tried to scuttle a project to have a room in which delegates and the public could go for silent prayer or meditation. But in the last few days this was settled, at least for the present, by a declaration from a high UN personality that there will be a prayer or meditation room.

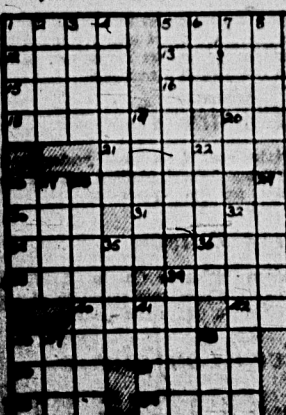
Religion has been a touchy subject in the UN since its earliest days. The problem is that there are so many sects, churches and beliefs represented among the 60 member nations that it would be impossible—and unfair—to single out any one religion or god for prayers in an official way. Also there are people who are indifferent or even who are strongly against any religion and they have their rights too. There could not be a chaplain for the UN, such as the United States Senate has; no one could agree on who would be the chaplain.

The best brains of the organization have decided the best way to handle the problem is to have one minute of silence at the opening and closing of each general assembly. During this period the delegates and others stand quietly and can pray or think or just dream.

The proposed prayer or meditation room in the new building must be simple, without religious symbols, and the prayers or meditations must be silent. It is expected the room will be ready by the time the 1952 assembly meets in Manhattan next September.

Luzon Island Terrorized by Red Guerillas

MANILA (AP)— Death, violence and charges of political terrorism mounted in the Philippines over the weekend, six weeks in advance of the Nov. 13 elections which Communist Huk are striving to disrupt.

Defense authorities, who have served notice they will call out 10,000 army reserves to preserve order during the congressional and provincial elections, placed the blame for most violence on Luzon Island to Reds. They said subversive Huk literature is urging Filipinos to use the rifle and bayonet to overthrow the government instead of voting.

In the latest violence two Liberal (Administration) Party leaders in Bulacan Province, just north of Manila, were kidnapped Sunday night by Huk.

The beheaded body of one was found about 30 miles north of Manila on the eastern fringe of the Candaba swamps. The other is still missing.

The Dodgers had a mild shock going in to the last of the ninth when Peewee Reese walked with one out. It seemed Jackie Robinson, Sunday's winning hero, would get another chance to hit, but Duke Snider hit into a game-ending double play.

Swagging and confident, the Giants bounced into their dressing room under the right field bleachers at old Ebbets Field while nearby the once proud Brooklyn Dodgers walked with dragging feet after losing 3-1 in the first game of the National League playoff.

Everyone yelled, "Let 'er rip," and everyone shouted, "What a game, what a game!"—except two men.

One was Hearn, the tall, big-shouldered pitcher who had deep into the lower leftfield.

Clarence Podbielan gave up the sixth and final hit—a double by Al Dark—in the ninth.

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conquering the Dodgers in Ebbets Field where up to now this season the Giants had only won two games—both with Sal Maglie pitching—and lost nine.

The other quiet Giant, surprising as it may seem, was the usually highly vocal manager, Leo Durocher, known as "The Lip" because of his talkative ways.

"It was a beautiful game. It's a great club," he said almost in a whisper. His voice was hoarse and strained.

Baseball players usually take victories in stride, even in the World Series, but not this bunch of Giants. They really raised the roof, confident that when the best two-out-of-three series moves to their own Polo Grounds today they will be in a position to administer the killing blow.

Manager Leo Durocher announced that either Sheldon Jones (16-10) or Sal Maglie, his 23-game winner, would pitch today while Charlie Dressen will counter with either Clem Labine or Carl Erskine for the Dodgers.

If blocking and tackling are the criteria of effective football play—and most coaches will tell you they are—Don Coleman and Ed Luke would rate as Michigan State's brightest stars against Michigan last Saturday.

Coleman, the lightning-quick, 180-pound offensive tackle from Flint, made eight key blocks and numerous secondary blocks during the contest. Key blocks are considered to be those which set up a play and make sure of good yardage. On numerous plays Coleman accounted for two or more Michigan defenders by effective shoulder blocking without losing balance. As he has been for three great seasons at State, Coleman Saturday was easily the top offensive lineman.

Guard Dean Garner and tackle Mary McFadden each were credited with five key blocks by press box statisticians, while Capt. Bob Carey made four.

On the defense, Ed Luke, also a Flint product, stood out brilliantly at left end. Counting only tackles made individually and cleanly, Luke personally stopped enemy offensive operations seven times. He also gave many assists to teammates on tackles, and additionally was outstanding at keeping Wolverine running plays inside his end position where other Spartans could get good shots at the ball carrier.

Close behind Luke with six clean stops of plays was the defensive right end, Don Dohoney, an Ann Arbor product. Guard Frank Kush and linebacker Bill Haskes each accounted for five.

Soviet Example Alters Degree

BUDAPEST —(AP)— Hungary has abolished the hitherto existing system of university graduation, following the Soviet Union's advanced, scientific example.

University graduates will not become doctors, but only "certified physicians" or "certified jurists" in the future, a government decree ordered. The "doctor of sciences" grade will be the highest work of high degree, while lesser merit will be awarded with the "candidate of sciences" title. A candidate may apply for the doctor title if he can present a doctor's work, based on independent scientific research and "defends it in a public debate."

200 Seized in Argentine Police Drive

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina —(AP)— President Peron charged that former U.S. Ambassador Spruille Braden was the "originator" of Friday's luckless revolt in which hundreds of soldiers and politicians were arrested.

Sources close to the Army said 200 officers and men had been seized in a relentless police dragnet over the weekend in a move to crush out vestiges of opposition to the Peron regime before the Nov. 11 election.

Many leaders in the opposition radical, Nationalist, Communist, Socialist, and Conservative parties, were listed by political circles as in custody.

Among those arrested by secret police, informants said, was Guillermo Gainza Paz, cousin of Alberto Gainza Paz, editor and publisher of the expropriated independent newspaper, La Prensa.

Guillermo Gainza Paz was a well-known architect identified with the Radical party.

At his news conference, President Peron revived his longstanding feud with Braden, ambassador here for four months in 1945 and assistant secretary of state for Latin American affairs until 1947.

In New York Braden said Peron's charges were "perfectly ridiculous" and showed "how weak and wobbly he (Peron) is."

He added that Peron "must be in a very poor position to make wild assertions of that kind."
