## British Army Tanks Tonight Seized Egyptian State Railway's Workshops

British army tanks tonight seized the Egyptian State Railway's workshops just outside Suez, southern terminal of the canal. Egyptian residents of the town feared they soon would be entirely cut off from the rest of Egypt. Egyptian Interior Minister Fuad Sirag Ed Din said 20 tanks took the shops and 25 locomotives. An Associated Press dispatch from Port Suez reported 10 tanks were involved.

If this was the baby A-bomb, as some speculated, it was indeed the smallest infant yet reared in the American atomic family.

While Atomic Energy Commission scientists maintained silence, newsmen pondered the implication of an explosion whose flash was visible for only a tenth of a second or so.

To some observers it appeared a vest-pocket version of the great granddaddy of the A-bomb family, the original Trinity blast at Alamogordo, N.M., on July 16, 1945. Like Trinity, today's nuclear mass was shot off a tower, but flared into only the briefest ball of fire and quickly dissolved into the familiar mushroom type cloud. But other onlookers, who had been expecting something resembling last winter's full blown experiment here, got the impression that the experiment was a fizzle, perhaps a break-off or only partial detonation of a larger mass. Yet, as AEC chairman Gordon Dean has said, the scientists headed by Dr. Alvin C. Graves have been working on an all-A-weapons program designed to put various new tools in the American arsenal. Control of nuclear fission in a small mass has long been the atomic scientists' dream.

## Tourel Set to Appear on Series

### Ticket Distribution Starts Wednesday

Jennie Tourel, versatile mezzo-soprano embarking on her seventh consecutive tour of the U.S. and Canada, will appear in the Michigan State College Auditorium Nov. 2.

She returned from a summer that combined appearances at the major festivals of Europe. At the Venice Festival she created the mezzo-coloratura role in Stravinsky's "The Rake's Progress," acclaimed as one of the major musical events of our time.

Virgil Thomson, New York Times music critic, summed up Jennie Tourel's art when he wrote, "She moves around in each tongue as if it were a whole new landscape and climate, untranslatable, untranslatable and unique, Miss Tourel is, I believe, unequalled among living singers for the high concentration in one artist of local mastery, sound musicianship and stylistic flexibility."

For her MSC concert, Miss Tourel will include Schubert's "Ständchen," Debussy's "Mandoline" and the letter scene and drinking song from "La Perichole."

Student tickets for the event will be distributed at 1 p.m. Wednesday at the second floor check-room of the Union.

## Civil Service Trainee Jobs Announced

An examination for Civil Service positions in the fields of chemistry, physics, mathematics, metallurgy and engineering has been announced by the U.S. Civil Service Commission.

The positions pay yearly salaries of \$2,650 and \$2,875. They are offered through the Student Aid program which gives sophomore and junior students a chance to participate in special training programs of various federal agencies while they are still going to school.

To qualify in the examination, applicants must pass a written test and must have received at least one-half of the total credits required for a bachelor's degree in their specialized field. Age limits, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, are from 18 to 25.

Information and applications may be obtained from most first and second class post offices, Civil Service regional offices, or from the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C. Applications will be accepted in the Washington office until Dec. 4.

## Ban Placed on Civilian Rail Freight

NEW YORK—(AP)—A snowballing wildcat strike of rebel dock workers sealed off the port of New York yesterday and led to a railroad freight embargo.

An estimated \$4,200,000 pile of merchandise lay unattended on piers throughout the vast port area.

Only one of two piers were reported operating.

Union longshore leaders who are anti-strike planned a new try at getting their stevedores back to work. They had no luck yesterday.

Of roving pickets who swept the docks all but clear of stevedores during the day, Union Organizer Harry Bowers said: "We are going to make a counter move . . . We will help the men to return to work."

"If the police allow any mobs to come into our section, there will be trouble. Let them (the strikers) stay in their own back yard."

Bowers did not say how his group hopes to win over stevedores who have quit in sympathy with the original wildcat strikers.

First violence of any account in the week-old strike came in Brooklyn when dockers fell on one another with fists and stones. Five men were slightly hurt by thrown rocks.

Two men were arrested on assault charges, including Gerardo (Jerry) Anastasio, who spells his name differently but is a member of the notorious racketeering Anastasia family.

A freight embargo was ordered by the Association of American Railroads on all shipments consigned for the New York and Jersey docks to keep railroad cars from piling up in the area. Military freight was not affected. Neither was oil, grain and other freight that can be unloaded in storage bins rather than directly onto ships.

The rumble of revolt fanned northward from New York as 180 Boston stevedores quit their jobs, apparently in sympathy with the New York strikers.

## Letters Oppose Truman Action on Vatican Post

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The White House said today that a "few hundred" letters and telegrams—most of them critical—had come in since Mr. Truman announced plans for diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

Presidential Secretary Joseph Short gave this information to newsmen in response to questions. Other White House sources said it is unlikely that Mr. Truman will give a recess appointment to his choice for the ambassadorship to the Roman Catholic church state, Gen. Mark W. Clark.

A recess appointment, made when Congress is not in session, would permit Clark to begin serving before the Senate acts on whether to confirm his nomination. However, it was said that the prevailing opinion is that Clark could not be given such an appointment unless he retires from the army.

Mr. Truman nominated Clark for the post Saturday, just before Congress adjourned. The Senate took no action on this, nor on a companion request from the Pentagon that Clark be exempted from a law forbidding army officers from holding civilian government posts.

## Jessup Gets Recess Bid as Delegate

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman last night announced a recess appointment for Ambassador Philip C. Jessup as a delegate to the United Nations, and declared that some of the accusations raised against Jessup "bordered on fraud."

Mr. Truman fraudfully denounced what he termed "partisan politics" in the congressional row over Jessup. He also scoffed at fears expressed by some Senators that the American people have lost confidence in Jessup, declaring:

"The American people make their judgments on the basis of facts and on the basis of performance."

By implication, the President took a slap at charges aired by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), who had accused Jessup of following "every twist and turn of the Communist line" in helping shape U.S. policy in the Far East.

Jessup, a top advisor to Secretary of State Acheson, has sworn he never followed the Communist line, never advocated measures to undermine the Chinese government, and never helped bring about the Red conquest of China.

"The record of the (Senate) hearings shows that charges to the effect that he was sympathetic to Communist charges were utterly without confirmation and some of the so-called documentation introduced in support of those charges bordered on fraud," Mr. Truman said in a statement.
