









## Truckers MSC for Training

### Lot Becomes Outdoor Classroom

A lot of cramming for mid-examinations? Throw those books away and learn to be a driver instead.

Department of Continuing Education now offers an intensive truck course in truck driving. After finishing the course each student receives a state of completion and a special driver's certificate. From 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. students study driver qualifications, vehicle codes, fundamentals, first aid and other subjects necessary in driving the big rig.

On the road, there is instruction in loading, hooking up a truck, inspection of equipment, etc. There is even a "truck" for coffee.

A special course is set up in Macklin Stadium for advanced practice in loading, jack-knifing, backing up.

Average number of students in the program is 15 to 20. 650 trainees have taken the course.

Each of the graduates are sent back to their companies to learn to drive a truck in order to be trained for supervisory duties. A few of the men sent by trucking companies were inspectors who were to check accidents and determine whether or not it was the fault of the driver. Some of the inspectors flunked the test.

Each of the graduates are placed. Employers report that it is not unusual for a graduate to make from \$4,500 to \$5,000 a year.

Students must be over 18 years of age and have a chauffeur's license. If they do not have a license they can apply for the Michigan State Police.

Opportunities are unlimited. According to a recent poll of 27 Michigan trucking companies, 1,200 new drivers will be needed during the next year.

State alone. Prospective state drivers will have to wait until they are 21 years of age and have a requirement of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

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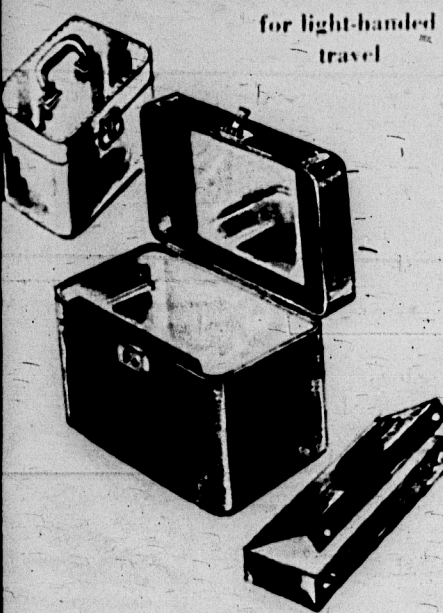

A block championship was decided last night as two undefeated W. Shaw teams battled through four regulation quarters and a sudden-death overtime, with W. Shaw 2 winning over W. Shaw 10, 15-6, on the passing of Dick Cunningham.

W. Shaw 10's Gary Simmons started the scoring when he tossed a long aerial to Jim Hall. Cunningham passed to Jim Sturdevant to knot the score.

With the score 6-6 at the end of regulation time, the game went into sudden-death overtime. Again it was Cunningham's passing, this time to Don Volz, that turned the trick and brought W. Shaw 2 the victory.

W. Shaw 2, 13; W. Shaw 3, 6. A real thriller developed between two undefeated teams as W. Shaw 1's Max Botticelli and

Don Theriault of W. Shaw 2 hooked up in a passing duel. After a Theriault-to-Howie Riska-to-Don Perry pass play had racked up a TD for W. Shaw 3, Botticelli threw to Jim Lovell in the end zone. In the final quarter, the passes of Botticelli put his team farther in front with Ted Merrian crossing the final stripe.

Abbot 13 snapped a three-game losing streak and scored its first points of the season last night. In the first half Dick Kingswood ran for the touchdown that was enough to hand Abbot 11 its second loss.

Snyder 14 powered its way to a rousing 21-0 victory over Snyder 16 led by Bob Ditch, who scored one touchdown, passed for two more, and threw for an extra point.

Meanwhile, Marshall Miles, manager of Joe Louis, said yesterday he would ask strict enforcement of the rules against hitting on the break, butting and hitting low in Friday's bout with Marciano.

Miles said he would carry his request to Bob Christenberry, new chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, at the weigh-in that day.

Dawson, the Spartans likeable backfield coach, may trail of other highly successful aides of Biggie jump into a head coaching job after this year at college.

Dawson and Frank Carver, acting director of athletics at Pitt, have both denied that a decision has been reached.

Director of athletics Ralph Young said he knows nothing of Dawson leaving. It seems that he would be the first to know if Dawson was hired by Pitt.

Hired only two years ago, Dawson figures prominently in the future plans of the Spartans. He was hired with a long-range aspect in mind.

Red had already carved a reputation for himself before to Michigan State. He brought 19 years of pro and collegiate experience with him. In 1932, upon leaving from Tulane, he immediately took a backfield job with Bernie Bierman at Minnesota. It was at that time Munn and Dawson became fast friends.

Red returned to the Green Wave as head coach. He piloted Tulane to an undefeated season in 1935 to lose a 14-13 thriller to powerful Texas in the Sugar Bowl. The following summer he was named to the Chicago Tribune All-Star coaching staff.

After a three-year stint with Minnesota, Red was named coach of the Buffalo Bills of the All-American Conference, resigning in the middle of the 1942

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## Gridders Drill for Homecoming

### Spartans in Final Scrimmage Prior to Panther Invasion

Michigan State's varsity football squad was put through a long drill yesterday, featured by a 50 minute scrimmage, as the Spartans made final preparations for the invasion of a winless Pittsburgh eleven for Homecoming Saturday.

Capt. Bob Carey watched the results of the scrimmage although he reminded his team, "You boys didn't block too hard tonight but just remember that you can do better."

Capt. Bob Carey watched the workout from the sidelines wearing a brace to support his badly strained neck. Carey is expected to be back in action by Nov. 10, for the Notre Dame game.

Saturday's game between Michigan State and Pitt marks the third renewal in their series, but the Panthers are still in quest of their first victory over the Spartans. The two schools clashed out East in 1945, with State winning, 12-7. Last year, the Spartans again invaded Pittsburgh and carried off a 19-0 decision.

The 1950 game resulted in a brilliant display of defensive strength on the part of Michigan State holding Pitt to a minus 11 yards to set a defensive record for the Green and White eleven.

The Panther team is considered to be a much stronger outfit than last season's club, despite the fact that it is still searching for its first victory of the year.

In the opener, Pitt lost to Duke University, 19-14. The following week it journeyed to Bloomington, where it lost 13-6 in a heart-breaker to Indiana. Two weeks ago it flew to Iowa City where the high scoring University of Iowa team smashed through to a 37-17 victory by scoring 21 points in the final quarter. They were swamped, 33-0, by Notre Dame last week.

"The only game that the Panthers were outplayed was in that Notre Dame game though," stated Munn.

Yesterday's practice was moved from the secret practice field to the field located behind Jenison Gym. The ground was still soggy and water lay along the sidelines.

## Lions Second in NFL Scoring; Fourth in Rushing, Punting

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — The Los Angeles Rams continue to pace the National Football League in total offense.

The Rams lead in yards gained passing, NFL statistics show, with 1,240, but are a close second, behind the Chicago Bears, in rushing the ball with 742 yards. This gives Los Angeles a combined No. 1 total of 1,982.

Los Angeles is the top point maker with 132. Detroit is second with 117 and Cleveland third with 110.

The Bears with 794 running and 725 passing are second in total offense, followed by Cleveland with 1,429, Detroit with 1,426 and Green Bay with 1,337.

On the ground the Bears have rushed 794 yards or an average of 4.6 per try. Los Angeles has the best average—5.3 yards—on

the ground, but its passing average is the NFL's third best. Cleveland has a 57.8 pass completion average, San Francisco 52.9 and Los Angeles 49.2.

San Francisco leads the top punters in the pro league, with their punters averaging 48 yards per kick. Cleveland is second with 47.5 followed by Los Angeles with 44.2 and Detroit with 43.9.

The New York Giants, only undefeated team in the league though tied once, have the best defensive record, allowing opponents a 2.6 yard gain on each running play. Detroit and Cleveland have each yielded 3.5 yards per try.

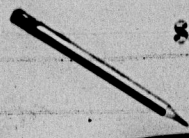

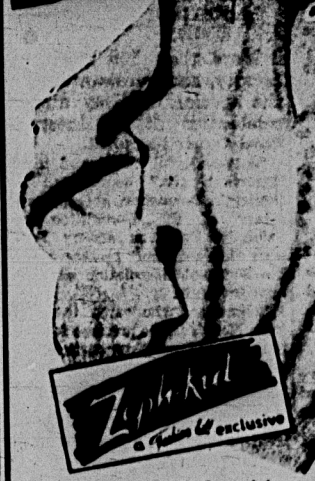

## British Navy Halts Blocking of Canal

Suez Waterway Keeps Open; Egyptian Situation Stays 'Hot'

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Egypt tried to block the Suez Canal to British shipping yesterday but the Royal Navy kept the waterway open to international traffic.

A British road convoy was fired upon near Ismailia, midway along the canal, a British headquarters spokesman at Fayid reported.

An Egyptian bus tried to run through a British road block in the Canal Zone and was disabled by one shot, the spokesman added. The looting of a British officer's home in the Zone was the only other incident of the day after a series of mob demonstrations in Egyptian cities Tuesday.

Government orders to police to shoot into demonstrators' ranks if they do not disperse kept the situation in hand.

Egyptian officials at Suez ordered the Suez Canal agent to refuse clearance papers to British ships seeking passage through the 104-mile privately-owned waterway linking the Red Sea and the Mediterranean.

The British Navy said it immediately issued certificates to the ships saying the required canal permits were withheld illegally, and authorizing them to proceed.

Late yesterday a group of correspondents saw a long convoy of freighters and tankers passing northward through the waterway. At least three of the ships were British tankers.

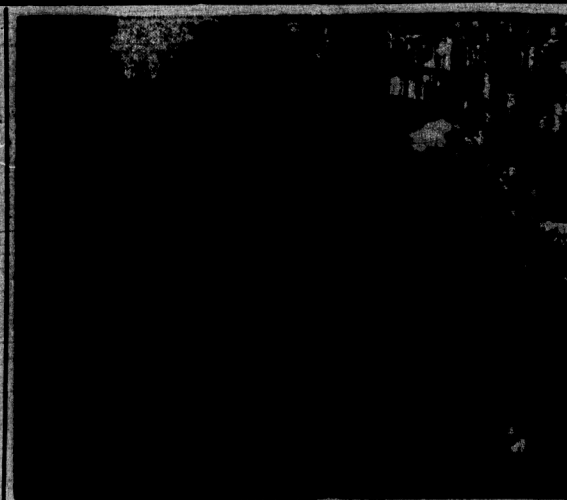
"Americans take others readily to their hearts, but they are not so skilled in opening themselves to the experience of people from other countries," he said.

## West Berliners Marooned in Disputed German Village

BERLIN (AP)—Four West Berliners were marooned last night in the embattled village of Steinstuecken which has changed hands three times in the past week.

Three West Berlin policemen and a newspaper reporter entered the village on the Soviet Zone frontier yesterday, assuming that the Russian promise to vacate it and give it back to West Berlin would be kept.

Russian military police and East German people's police unexpectedly returned, however, spent an hour in the disputed area and then left.

Communist police then set up patrols that completely surrounded the 50-family town. The patrols sealed off a field between the village and the West Berlin border. Stuck in Steinstuecken by the sudden turn of events, was one Berlin police officer, two patrolmen and 23-year-old Manfred Trebbes, a reporter for Der Tag.

One other Western German newspaperman was reported arrested by the Soviet patrols in their sudden foray into Steinstuecken.

American authorities were angry and confused by the incident.

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## Bombers, Troops Stage Rehearsal of A-Bomb Test

LAS VEGAS, Nev.—(AP)—Third Corps tactical troops went through a non-atomic preview of exercise Desert Rock yesterday, which gave observers room for belief that the first multiple A-bomb drop is in the offing.

As B-29 bombers apparently made a conventional bomb run, the GI's watched from previously-dug emplacements. The Army gave no indication of how many troops were involved, or how far forward they were in the Yucca flat test site.

The AEC gave out this brief statement: "A trial operation involving high explosives only was held to test communications and other phases of operations. Third Corps tactical troops participated as an initial rehearsal for exercise Desert Rock."

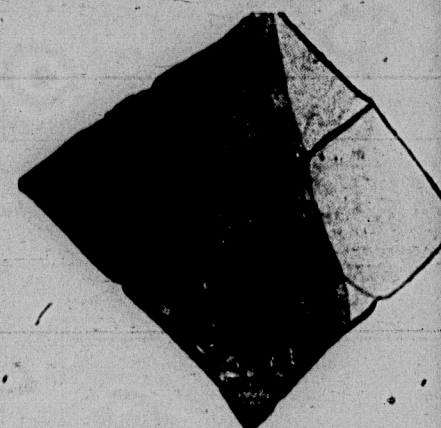
