Truce Negotiators Reaching Agreement

PYONGYANG, Korea (AP)—Sharp bargaining, accompanied by fierce fighting, brought Allied and Communist truce negotiators to agreement on all but ten positions on the 145-mile front Sunday.

References remained in center and the west dominating some 30 to 35 miles of the 145-mile front line.

Nations troops won a seven-hour fight to restore their "Little Gibraltar" position 35 miles north of Seoul.

Fighting appeared closely related with the cease-fire at Panmunjom, where staff held a four-hour session.

Though more fighting may be expected, the UN command spokesman said he was pessimistic on the way for an early buffer zone.

"I think there will be fewer than 10 places in the Monday night," he said.

Best it appeared the line would not be agreed on finally after negotiations of both sides to ratify the stop-shooting on Tuesday.

The way for the setting of the full five man committee in the line is drawn, but progress on the armistice will be impossible.

ratification of the line, it became the final buffer zone. Korea provided the two sides within 30 days on all armistice issues. If no agreement is reached on the truce, exchange of prisoners, and recommendations to the governments on withdrawals, the buffer will be revised when a full armistice is signed.

Confidence Vote Won by Premier

Iranian Parliament
Backs Mossadegh

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh won a smashing vote of confidence, 90-0, yesterday after a weeping appeal for support. It was his first visit to parliament since he returned from the United States.

The Majlis (lower house of parliament) obediently reversed its earlier decision to delay parliamentary elections until Dec. 18.

Opposition leader Jamal Tisami was threatened with death and nearly mobbed by demonstrators outside parliament for making a bitter speech against the old premier. Mossadegh was cheered hysterically.

Mossadegh, in his table-pounding speech, flayed the British as usual, praised Americans in the cities he visited, and told the Majlis:

1. He wanted national elections to the Majlis immediately for a bold test of his oil nationalization regime among the people.

2. There would be no compromise with the British on the oil question and the 10,000,000 Iranians must lighten their belts and wage a battle of austerity with the British.

3. He failed to negotiate a settlement of the six-month-old oil dispute but Iranians must make a real effort to exploit and sell their oil.

4. Things look favorable for financial aid from the United States.

Mossadegh takes his program tomorrow to the senate where political fireworks are generally lacking.

Deputy Premier Hossein Fatemi told a news conference later the government planned to start the elections within two or three days and that Mossadegh would announce the time over the national radio.

New Coed Dorm, Library Delayed

Shortage Halts Building Plans

MSC's "golden era of building" is being cramped because of the current material shortage.

Two buildings in the planning stage, a new girls dormitory and a library will have to wait until the government lifts building regulations. The dormitory will be financed on a self liquidating basis similar to the other dormitories. While the library must

await appropriations from the state.

Present plans call for a dormitory to be built across the street from the Kellogg Center. However, Emory Foster, manager of dormitories and food service, was quick to point out that it is only in a tentative planning stage. He stressed the fact that plans at the present time are very indefinite.

"Until now we have just played around with architects' drawings," Foster said. "Plans are not being approached rapidly because it couldn't be built at the present time with the current material shortage."

It is hoped the dormitory will relieve congestion in most of the girls dormitories. "The girls dormitories are as crowded this year as they have ever been, maybe more so," he added.

The dormitory will follow the same pattern as the present dorms in respect to the number of single rooms. It will differ, however, in that it will be of modern construction.

Foster pointed out that the dormitory will not replace Wells Hall but will supplement it. "As long as we have three people to a room in either the men's or girls' dormitories we will use Wells Hall."

Meanwhile three buildings now under construction are nearing completion. The Memorial Chapel and Gilmer Hall are expected to be put into use sometime next year, according to Karl McDonel, secretary state board of agriculture.

Workers are now putting the finishing touches on the two buildings. The Memorial Chapel should be ready for use about the first of the year provided the workers are not hampered by any further material shortages.

The third structure now being built is a laundry. It will be located adjacent to the food stores. The facilities of the present laundry, located behind Olds Hall, are being expanded to accommodate the extra burden placed on them by the Kellogg Center.

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Spartans Tie Record Set During 1912-1914 Era

"All coaches think their team is the best but ours is absolutely number one."

These words by Coach Biggie Munn following the Spartans' 45-7 domination of a Colorado University team Saturday express the feeling of many Michigan State followers after the squad captured its first undefeated season since 1913. It also marked the 15th consecutive victory for the Spartans, tying the school record set during the 1912-14 era.

Munn summed up the history making season by pouring praise on his "kids" who "met the test every time we needed to meet it and really won the ones we were after."

Michigan State displayed its all-around attack in rolling up 390 yards on the ground and 120 yards in the air as compared with 178 and 68 for the Buffaloes.

Capt. Bob Carey topped his college football career by scoring two touchdowns and kicking three points after touchdown for a total of 15 points while playing one of his best games of the season. Quarterback Al Dorow, also playing his last game, threw both TD passes to Carey.

In all, 15 seniors were on the roster for the Spartans but the way the squad played against the outclassed Buffaloes, it might have seemed that every one of the 11 players Munn sent into the game was playing his last game in the Green and White uniform.

Besides Carey's two TD's, Don McAuliffe scored twice, and Dick Panin, Billy Wells and Evan Slovic pushed over tallies for the Spartan cause.

The Spartans played Saturday like they have at times throughout the season when they poured it on opponents in coming from behind as they did all during the Michigan and Notre Dame games.

State started the season with an unimpressive 6-0 decision over Oregon State. McAuliffe made the TD and Ellis starred from the safety slot. "We've got a long way to go before we're a football team," stated Munn.

Against Michigan the Spartans displayed a smothering defense to hold the Wolverines scoreless while the offense powered to 25 points. It was then that the nation took note of the East Lansing gridironers who showed that they had a well rounded ground attack and a rock-walled defense. Michigan was held to a minus 23 yards rushing.

The "Storybook Finish" at Ohio State saw MSC snatch a 24-20 win in what Munn termed, "One of the greatest games of all times." Yewic flipped a transcontinental aerial to Dorow for the touchdown that averted a near-upset.

During the OSU game State's now highly touted "pony backfield" stepped into the spotlight.

With Wells and Belden showing the way the Spartans surged to life in the final quarter to down Marquette, 20-14. Munn summed it up by wiping his brow and stating simply, "It was a tough game."

Playing sharp defensive ball and flashing long scoring runs, State smashed Penn State, 32-21. Ellis, Pisano, McAuliffe, Dorow, and Belden tallied the TD's but the defensive play of Hughes was a standout feature of the game. Again it was final half power that spelled victory for the Green and White.

Homecoming fans saw MSC play its familiar and dramatic role as a "comeback team" as the Spartans racked Pittsburgh 53-26, in a last half surge. The game featured an amazing Pitt pass combination, brilliant State ground strength, and rugged line play.

The peak of gridiron perfection was achieved as Michigan State rolled over Notre Dame, 35-0. State soared into the number one grid spot in the nation. Carey, Coleman, Dorow, and Panin were outstanding but Munn and the team as a whole were lauded across the country for their electrifying win over the completely outclassed Irish. The "long way" that Munn spoke of after the opener was reached.

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Big Ten Champions Vie With 200 Top Runners

Michigan State's Big Ten cross country champions will make their bid for top national honors in the 13th annual NCAA meet to be held on the MSC course this morning at 11:30.

Spartan Coach Karl Schlade-man has named a seven man team to compete against some 200 of the nation's best distance runners in this four-mile classic which has been held in East Lansing since its inception in 1938.

The start and finish of the race will be at Old College Field.

Making up the Michigan State entry will be Capt. Jim Kopp, sophomore; Jerry Kopp, sophomore; Wayne Scott, Pennfield, N.Y., junior; Kyle Garber, Calgary, Alberta, sophomore; Ron Barr, Crown Point, Ind., sophomore; Dick Jarrett, Oklahoma, Ill., sophomore; and Jim Arnold, Battle Creek freshman.

This crew gave Michigan State its first Big Ten harrier title with a 44-point total and last Monday finished fourth in the NCAA meet in New York City.

Entries have been received from 38 schools, from such distant points as San Francisco State, and from Tuskegee Institute in Alabama.

Penn State's Nittany Lions, defending team champion into the fourth year of the meet. The Lions added the NCAA crown to their list of accomplishments last week.

Penn State won the 1950 NCAA meet with a 53-point total, two points better than second place Michigan State.

Expected to push Penn State for top honors are Michigan State, Kansas, Wisconsin, and Syracuse. Missing from the scene is a powerful Army team, which elected to pass up the meet. They finished a point behind Penn State in the NCAA.

Kansas is led by Herb Sompers, 1950 NCAA individual champ. The Big Seven champs also have an outstanding runner in Wes Santee.

Big Ten schools competing besides MSC and Wisconsin are Illinois, Indiana, Iowa and Purdue.

From the state of Michigan are Wayne, Western Michigan, and Michigan Normal.

The competing runners will be gunning for the meet record of 19:52.3 held by Robert Black of Rhode Island State, 57 in 1948.

To the winner of the team title will go the E. C. "Bully" Hayes Memorial trophy, emblem of National cross country supremacy.

Annual Awards Highlight Grid Honor Banquet

The coveted "Governor's trophy," given annually to the team's most valuable player, plus the choosing of next year's captain will highlight tonight's traditional football banquet in the Union at 6.

Letters will also be presented to the team that racked up nine straight victories to earn the title of best team in Spartan history. The 1951 squad, which graduates 13 seniors, will be together for the last time at the fest.

Sunny Grandelius won last year's most valuable player award. Given annually since 1931, the trophy has been split up fairly well between backfield and line members. Eleven of the 20 awards given have gone to backs.

The Green and White ice hockey squad, under Coach Amo Bessone, opens the 1951-52 season against Ontario Agricultural College with a two-game series, Thursday and Friday on the Spartan home rink in Demonstration Hall.

Bessone, in his first year at the helm of the State team, will feature a lineup composed of seven lettermen and nine newcomers.

In basketball, Coach Pete Newell's eagles inaugurate their 1951-52 campaign Saturday, Dec. 1, when they clash with Wayne University in Jensen Fieldhouse.

Newell's squad is made up of several of last year's veterans plus some promising sophomore replacements. Top job for Newell has been finding a center to replace Ray Steffen, last year's leading scorer, who graduated. Hugh McMaster, a 6'6" sophomore from Harel Park, has the inside track at present with Bob Wright, a junior from Hartselle, Ala., and Deane Harrison, a FI Wayne, Ind., soph, the other possibilities.
