## Spartans Tie Record Set **During 1912-1914 Era**

"All coaches think their team is the best but ours is abso-

These words by Coach Biggie Munn following the Spartans' 45-7 domination of a Colorado University team Saturday express the feeling of many Michigan State followers 1913. It also marked the 15th consecutive victory for the Spartans, tieing the school record set during the 1912-14 era.

Munn summed up the history making season by pouring praise on his "kids" who "met the test every time we needed to meet it and really won the ones we were after."

Michigan State displayed its all-around attack in rolling up 390 yards on the ground and 120 yards in the sir as commerced with 178 and 68 for the Buffaloes. Capt. Bob Carey topped his college football career-by scor-

ing two touchdowns and kicking three points after touchdown for a total of 15 points while playing one of his best games of the season. Quarterback Al Dorow, also playing his last game, threw both TD passes to Carey

In all, 15 seniors were on the roster for the Spartans but the way the squad played against the outclassed Buffaloes, It might have seemed that every one of the 41 players Munn sent into the game was playing his last game in the Greenand White uniform.

Besides Carey's two TD's, Don McAuliffe scored twice, and Dick Panin, Billy Wells and Evan Slopac pushed over tallies for the Spartan cause.

The Spartans played Saturday like they have at times throughout the season when they poured it on oppon-ents in coming from behind as they did all during the Michigan and Notre Dame games.

State started the season with an unimpressive 6-0 decison over Oregon State . . . McAuliffe made the TD and Ellis starred from the safety slot . . . "We've got a long way to go before we're a football team," stated Munn.

Against Michigan the Spartans displayed a smothering defense to hold the Wolves scoreless; while the offense powered to 25 points . . . It was then that the nation took note of the East Lansing gridders who showed that they had a well rounded ground attack and a rock-walled defense. Michigan

was held to a minus 23 yards rushing.

The "Storybook Finish" at Ohio State saw MSC snatch a 24-20 win in what Munn termed, "One of the greatest games of all times"... Yewcie flipped a transcontinental aerial to Dorow for the touchdown that averted a near-upset . . During the OSU game State's now highly touted "pony backfield" stepped into the spotlight.

With Wells and Holden showing the way the Spartans surged to life in the final quarter to down Marquette, 20-14 ... Munn summed it up by wiping his brow and stating simply, "It was a tough game."

Playing sharp defensive ball and flashing long scorings uns, State smashed Penn State, 32-21 . . . Ellis, Pisano, Mc-Auliffe, Dorow, and Bolden tallied the TD's but the defensive play of Hughes was a standout feature of the game . Again it was final half power that spelled victory for the Freen and White.

Homecoming fans saw MSC play its familiar and dramatic role as a "comeback team" as the Spartans racked Pittsburgh 53-26, in a last half surge . . . The game featured an amazing Pitt pass combination, brilliant State ground strength, and rugged line play.

# The Tax

What do you think about the student tax proposal? Its you know that if it goes through you will be paying up to 25 cents per term to support the Student Government? Do you know much about it? Or do you care?

Perhaps you know quite a lot about it, but let me repeat briefly just what the proposal is It is the first proposed amendment to the Student Cov-

ernment constitution and will levy a tax on all students not exceeding 25 cents per term to be collected at registration each term except summer

The revenue will support the Student Government and give financial backing to the powers granted the Government in the new constitution. It will enable the Government to do things it has always wanted to do, things it has been unable to do for lack of funds.

I think there are few who will argue against a student financed covernment. It seems all governments are supported by the people they govern and there are few reasons why MSC's Student Government should be an exception to

The State Board of Agriculture okayed the measure to be brought to a student vote which will render the final decision on the tax. To vote the measure in, a majority of students must vote on it and a majority of those voting must As it stands now the vote is scheduled for winter term

registration. A proposal to postpone the vote until spring term, in order to give students more time to look into the measure was voted down last week by the Student Congress who felt the measure had been sufficiently looked into by the student body.

But the Congress has slated a special meeting for this afternoon where the postponement idea will undoubtedly be discussed.

From what I have seen. I would advise the congressme to think twice before voting down the postpanement again. I, for one, do not think the tax and its purposes have been adequately explained to the students to allow them to know what they're voting on

I do not think the students should be asked to vote on a measure on which they are not well versed. I think the students should be given a chance during winter term to look into the tax and to listen to their congressmen tell them




