The suggested purchase of Spartan helmets to go with the new uniforms should be given due consideration.



Most students in campus and off-campus living units received seals from the Ingham County Tuberculosis and Health Society last week. Almost everybody contributed, but some wondered why they should do so when 90 per cent of funds raised in the local campaign stays in Ingham county.

Students, whether they are permanent county residents or not, do benefit from contributions to the Ingham County Society's seal drive. Every year the Society sends its

mobile chest X-ray unit to the married housing area check on the health of married students. The facilities the unit are available to all other students at any time by contacting the Society's office. Student TB cases detected are turned over to College Hospital, but are usually taken by the student's personal physician.

Throughout the nation more than 3,000 local agencies such as Ingham County's are soliciting this month, including Michigan county groups. Since Christmas is to be a special time for helping other people as well as giving, we can see no better course of action than to aid to the county in which we live for four years as well as to home town TB agencies.

Cagers Face Wayne in Opener

Jayvees Also Scheduled to Oppose Wayne Frosh

The 1951-52 basketball season will make its debut Michigan State College tomorrow night when the Spartans quintet plays host to the Wayne University squad at the gym.

MSC's Junior Varsity squad will face the Wayne freshmen in a preliminary game scheduled for six o'clock with the varsity contest following at 8 p.m. Students will be admitted by showing their ID cards.

Saturday's game will be the first of the season for coach Pete Newell and his cagers. Wayne has already played one contest, defeating Assumption College 93-39, Monday night at Detroit.

In downing the Canadian squad, Wayne rolled up its biggest score since 1939.

Charlie Primas, John Kline and Ron Condon were the high scorers, with 14 points each while Ernie Wagner scored 12 points. Both Primas and Kline are sophomore forwards who advanced from last season's freshman team that won 18 of its 19 games.

Condon is a senior guard who is rated as the top performer for the Black and Gold. The 5'11" sharpshooter set a Wayne season scoring record of 310 points last year. Wagner is another sophomore player who is slated to see plenty of action, even though he won't be in the starting line up.

Wayne's team will have the height advantage in tomorrow's game. Coach Joel Mason will use the 6'4" Primas at one forward with Kline, who stands 6'2" at the other forward slot. Eugene Bolden, just under 6'3", at the wotter forward while Condon, 5'11", and Bill Robinson, 5'9", will play the guard positions.

Newell will start Deneal Hartman at center. Hartman is a 6'3" sophomore who hails from Ft. Wayne, Ind. The biggest man on the Spartan squad, 6'6" Hugh McMaster, will see limited action at the center position. McMaster is still recovering from a leg injury suffered several weeks ago in practice.

Bill Bower and Leif Carlson will be the forwards. Bower lacks height, he stands 5'11", but makes up for it with plenty of hustle.

Two 5'11" guards, Clarence 'Sonny' Means and Gordie Stauffer, have both received the nod as starters. All the members of the starting team

are lettermen except for the man.

Wheeler plays either forward or guard. If the 5'11" New Yorker plays forward then 6'5" Jesse will play at center. Rex Corbett, of Ft. Wayne, will play the other guard position.

However, if Bennington is Wheeler at guard then Jim Harris will move to a forward position and Bob McCullough, a freshman from Grosse Pointe will play center.

As an added attraction the halftime of the varsity game MSC's athletic director, E. Young, has lined up the college table tennis team from the U. S.

Wayne's Bob Short, voted number one in the country and Michigan State's Al B. voted number two in the country, will meet each other in a contest between the halves which will continue after the basketball game if necessary.

State Swim Squad Faced With Rebuilding Task

Michigan State's national runner-up swimming squad, faced with a "rebuilding and revising task," opens collegiate competition against Bowling Green Jan. 5.

In introducing his Spartan swimmers at the Lansing Junior Chamber of Commerce All-Sports banquet last night, Coach Charles McCaffree warned that the power of the MSC tank team will be a question mark until February.

McCaffree pointed out that loss of five All-American swimmers from last year's squad and the borderline eligibility status of several present members will make it necessary for some juggling of personnel in certain events.

Chances for the Spartans to equal their high national rating of last year centers on the All-American trio of Clark Scholtes, Bert McLachlan and Hal Shoup. Graduation has left the State swimmers weak in tested breaststrokes and strong reserve power, according to McCaffree.

But the veteran swimming mentor was quick to admit that several newcomers help brighten the outlook. One of the prize prospects is sprinter Tom Payette.

He concluded his remarks last night by declaring, "We're coming along slowly this year, but if the spirit and determination shown by the boys so far is any indication, we should be in there with the best of them."

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

Liotta Death Investigation Underway

Philadelphia (AP)—Villanova College authorities began an investigation yesterday into the death of football star Dominic (Nick) Liotta, whose death was reported variously as resulting from a hanging or a heart attack.

Liotta, who had been chosen on the Football Writers' Association's All-America team, was found dead in the basement of his dormitory yesterday.

The Villanova College team physician said Liotta had been suffering from "mental depression" for several days.

Radnor Township police reported that the 22-year-old football star's body was found beneath a piece of piping, that a telephone wire was coiled about his neck and that the wire had been hooked over the piping.

The Delaware County Coroner's office, however, stood by its original finding that Liotta had died of a heart attack.

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UN Wary of Korean Trap No 'Premature' Letup - Truman

Press Blamed for Releasing Peace Stories

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — President Truman announced bluntly that the fighting will continue in Korea as long as there is a possibility of United Nations forces being "caught off-balance" by the enemy in a peace trap.

"The continued pressure of our forces on the enemy constitutes the strongest incentive for the latter to agree to a just armistice," the President told a news conference at this naval submarine base.

"Any premature slackening of our effort would cost us more casualties in the long run that need be lost."

The President followed the reading of his prepared statement with an off-the-cuff lecture to press associations and newspapers on what he said were fake cease fire stories that grow out of hot competition for news.

He singled out a premature armistice story by the United Press, Roy Howard in 1918 and an Associated Press story of Seoul, Korea, yesterday asserting that orders from the highest sources, possibly the White House, brought ground fighting to a halt in Korea.

Mr. Truman termed the Roy Howard story a fake and said the AP story was on a parallel with it.

Addressing himself then to the representatives of the press associations and the independent newspapers at the conference, he said they must be very careful in this very dangerous time to stick to the truth.

It seems to him, he said, that the welfare of the United States, the United Nations and the world as a whole is much more important than any competitive situation that may exist among any newshounds.

Mr. Truman said he hoped everybody understood "there has been no cease fire in Korea and that there can be none until an armistice has been signed."

He said it is our duty to continue fighting until UN objectives are achieved.

A spokesman for the Associated Press in New York said:

"There is no foundation for suggesting 'pressure' was involved in an Associated Press news dispatch from Seoul Wednesday speculating on the battle zone indications that orders causing a lull in the Korean ground fighting came from the highest sources, possibly from the White House."

"It was a fact that the ground shooting was halted as a result of orders or directives given to the UN fighting forces."

The United Press in New York had no comment on the President's statement.

Resident Assistants Act as Friend, Advisor

Known to dormitory men as the "R.A.," the precinct resident assistant is called upon to be a combined friend, advisor, study helper, and sergeant at arms. In the 56 precincts of the six-men's dormitories, these R.A.'s must be on full-time duty to assist their fellow students.

Robb G. Gardiner, coordinator of student activities in men's residence halls, explained that R.A.'s are graduate or undergraduate students selected principally for maturity, leadership, and academic competence. They are appointed by the resident advisor and manager of each dorm, with the approval of the dean of students.

"Selections are made at the close of spring term following a training program for prospective appointees," Gardiner explained further. "Training is completed with a two-day orientation session in the fall, when the new residential assistants hold discussions with the various college department heads."

R.A.'s earn their dorm board, and additional income if they undertake a special program connected with the dorm, such as a chorus, or a newspaper.

Practically unknown 20 years ago, the resident assistant program is steadily gaining popularity in American colleges. Syracuse, Wisconsin, and MSC have been leaders in its development, Gardiner declared. Copies of the MSC "Resident Assistant's Manual" have been requested by as many as 100 colleges, he said.

The "Manual" explains the functions of the resident assistant's job, his procedures, and what he may expect to get out of the work. It also lists recommended readings and other useful information.

Briefly, Gardiner listed the R.A.'s responsibilities as these: (1) orient new students; (2) work for group "esprit de corps," (3) supply information where needed; (4) keep records and reports of use to the dormitory; (5) establish an atmosphere for academic accomplishments; (6) encourage extra-curricular activity, and, (7) serve as a liaison man between students and management.
