# **GOP Question Mark**

The nation now knows where General Eisenhower stands on his candidacy for president. He has thrown his hat as close to the ring as he deems necessary. If he is handed the

Republican candidacy it's sure bet he'll take it.

A second look by many elated Republicans is liable to make them slightly uncomfortable. They have little knowledge of Eisenhower's domestic policies.

His foreign policies are well known and probably supported by more Democrats than Republicans.

Some of Eisenhower's policies reveal themselves in his speeches of the last few years. But close study of these speeches emphasizes the usual vagueness of poli-tical speeches. And it must be expected that his views a couple of years ago are not necessarily the same now.

Eisenhower should be commended for staying on the job but he owes the public a little more. If he has convictions on issues other than European defense he should take them • to the American public.

If he doesn't have any convictions on labor, the Far East, the farm program, and the many other complicated issues that face a president, the presidency is not his lot.

America is more than a tool to stop foreign aggression. America is supposedly a country of 150 million informed individuals who elect to the presidency a man whose policies they favor.

If Americans elect Eisenhower they will do so because of his name and not because of his policies.

On the evidence now available, Eisenhower can not be. called a good or bad presidential candidate. He should not be called a presidential candidate at all.

If the Republicans continue to promote a man they do not know, it would seem that they are more concerned with a name to get them back into power instead of an able administrator.

Eisenhower may be a good man for the presidency but unless he comes out with more than a short statement saying he would accept the nomination, the Republicans have no business pressing him into service.

# Truce Talk Breakdown' Stumps UN

mosphere in the Korean truce negotiations probably represents more of a temporary tactical move by the Com-munists than a real threat of

Last summer the Soviets at-tempted to use a halt in the truce talks as part of their un-successful effort to thwart

successful effort to thwart American plans for a Japanese peace treaty.

Now they are using it as part of the maneuvers in the. United Nations to permote their own "peace offensive" and block the one begin by the Allies in the General As-

sembly. Communist negotiators in ating a relatively few days ago, have suddenly become disdainful and derisive of Allied efforts to reach an agreement. They are also described as giving the appearance of waiting on word-from headquarters before they

take any new steps.

They may, as some Allied spokesmen claim to fear, be going through the whole motion of negotiation as a blind for a new military buildup and a renewal of their drive to take all Korea. But the facts of the situation, with the Allies-just as canable But the facts of the situation, with the Allies just as capable of build-up and presumably overlooking no bets, seem to call for both sides to abandon the Korean war as a bad job all

The half-war in Korea, however, is just what the Kremlin likes. Without too great expenditure on her part, chaos is extended to another point. Allied resources are drained at another point, and Tass correspondents in Washington have another reason to askin "like long can the for asking "How long can the U.S. economy stand the strain?"
