

Secrecy of Ag Board Meetings Declared Legal by Millard

The State Board of Agriculture and the Regents of the University of Michigan have the right to hold closed meetings, according to Attorney General Frank G. Millard.

Answering a letter from Sen. Don Vander Werf (R-Mich.) asking if such meetings are a right of governing boards, Millard replied that "each of the governing boards, which possesses the power and conduct the affairs of their respective institutions without the aid of the public being present."

At the same time, the group announced Theta Chi social fraternity will be relieved of social probation at the end of this term.

SAE is charged with registering a Sept. 28 party to be held at their house, and then holding it at the Holt Community Center. Reportedly, no chapters were present.

At the time of the SAE party, the Holt center was not approved for college parties. It has since been approved by a subcommittee of the Faculty-Student Social Committee.

Tom King, dean of students, said the decision included the factor that apparently no liquor was involved at the SAE party. The group may not hold parties or accept invitations as a group, and can have no women, with the exception of close relatives, in the house until May.

However, Mabel F. Peterson, assistant counselor for women, said the fraternity will be allowed to participate in intra-mural sports, rushing, pledging, Sparta-cade, and similar affairs.

Theta Chi, originally placed on probation until Senior Week, will be allowed to resume all activities at the end of winter term. The fraternity was placed on social probation for failing to register a term party in time. It was allowed to participate in the condition that they accept social probation.

President Notes
Strain on Economy

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman asked Congress yesterday to extend existing economic controls for two years and strengthen them to create "an invincible strength in the free world."

"We are just now entering the period of greatest strain in our mobilization effort," he said in a special message sent to Congress.

"We can prevent inflation from weakening us if we have the will to do so and the courage to take the necessary steps."

The President asked for authority to stabilize prices, wages, credits and rents until June 30, 1954. The present law expires June 30.

He called for repeal of the "terrible" Capehart amendment to the Defense Production Act and two other provisions he said "are hurting us in the fight against inflation."

"If these steps are taken, we will be far better equipped to keep our economy reasonably and effectively in balance, despite the stresses and strains inherent in our defense mobilization drive," Mr. Truman said.

College Press Prints 37 Books In Past Year

Nine books of general interest and 28 textbooks were published by the Michigan State College Press in 1951, their February report reveals.

The report compares this "modest output" with the 282 titles published by the Oxford University Press, Oxford ranks fourth as a publisher in America, behind three professional printing houses.

Harvard and Columbia each published 108 books last year. Cambridge did 90, Chicago and California issued 50 each and Princeton published 35.

Queens Mourn

King George Lies in State At Westminster Hall

LONDON (AP)—Three queens and millions of humbler Britons mourned yesterday as the body of King George VI was brought back to London to lie in state for three days in majestic Westminster Hall.

Sovereign Elizabeth II, the queen mother and 84-year-old Queen grandmother Mary, struggled with emotion as they stood in the middle of the brightly lit hall while the Archbishop of York conducted a 16-minute service.

Britain's young ruler gripped a handkerchief tightly in her gloved hand, but she did not use it to dab at the tears which seemed about to gush forth.

The queen mother's face was impassive. Queen Mary, who has seen a great deal of sorrow in her long life, was her stalwart self. Standing in front of Westminster Hall when a gun carriage arrived with the body of her son, she brushed aside her long veil and watched the solemn procession proceed intently.

Then the youngest queen, just 25, followed the coffin into the medieval hall. Because the young sovereign, her mother and grandmother followed a few paces behind her.

They stood throughout the short ceremony in the presence of both houses of Parliament, and there was no trembling or shivering of the lip to betray their feelings. They remained quiet while the choir in red and white gowns sang the late King's favorite hymn, "Adeste Veneremur."

That information has been given Congress by top treasury and revenue officers.

Reference to the tax scandals—which have shaken the Revenue Bureau—was made in hearings before a House Appropriations Subcommittee. A record of the hearing was made public yesterday.

John B. Dunlap, Internal Revenue commissioner, and his chief, secretary of the Treasury, asked the committee for \$696,300,000 to run the Treasury Department for the 12 months beginning July 1.

The Revenue Bureau is asking for about half the amount, \$305 million. This is up \$32 million over the present fiscal year.

The money would go to pay for collection of an expected \$70 billion in taxes. The cost is estimated to be 44 one-hundredths of a cent for each dollar taken in. A large part of the money asked is for 7,439 new employees.
